

Shad Run Begins In Umpqua River; Fishermen Seek Migrating Fighter

The Umpqua River each year enjoys a migration of these fish, usually in June and July.

The shad has long been known as a commercial fish. It hadn't been given much consideration by the game fish angler until recently. But in late years it has yielded more and more to the sports side of the fishery.

The shad is a silvery fish which moves into fresh-water streams on its spawning migration. The commercial fishery has long taken the shad, principally for the roe from females. The fish have utilized oil and the flesh has gone into fertilizers. The shad has had little demand as a food fish until in fairly late years.

Sweet Meat

The meat is sweet and rich, and is becoming prized by many people.

But, because the shad is an extremely bony fish, it hasn't been greatly prized for food.

The pressure cooker, however, has brought about a much higher use of the fish for food.

A favorite method is to kipper and smoke the fish, then subject

it to heat and pressure in the pressure cooker and can it. The heat and pressure dissolve many of the small bones, making the canned, kippered meat a delectable item.

Another method is to split the fish, then broil each half until well done. The meat then may be shaken off the bones.

Sporty Fish

Shad are a sporty fish, taken on light tackle.

In the tidewater, the favorite lure is a red-head shad fly. But that lure doesn't do too well in fresh water. Further upstream a small wobbler, small spinner, red fly, even a piece of red flannel fished as a fly, will get results. A wet fly, run fairly deep, is preferable to a dry fly.

The mature male shad will run around 2 to 2½ pounds in weight. Females are heavier. They'll average around 3 to 4 pounds, with

an occasional specimen up to 7 or 8 pounds. Females are particularly desired because of the roe, a prized delicacy.

Traced To Fairgrounds

Jerry Bauer, biologist in charge of the Umpqua River study, reports from the regional office of the Oregon Game Commission in Roseburg, that shad have been traced in the South Umpqua River as far upstream as the Fairgrounds. They are believed to migrate some small distance beyond that point. More go to the South Umpqua, the warmer stream, than to the north fork. But a few fish have been taken below the Winchester power dam. None has ever been observed at the fish counting station in the dam.

Considerable fishing for this species of fish has been done in the lower river, particularly around Kellogg and Elkton.

Marion Shippy of Grants Pass, Ed Phillips of Myrtle Point, Ray Gardner of Bandon and Gary Smith and Arden Weaver of Crescent City are expected to be on hand for Saturday's races.

Among the Roseburg newcomers to the hardtop circuit will be Dan Pitt. Pitt will be driving 44R sponsored by Glen Young and Bill Patrick, owners of Glen and Bill's Douglas Service on Garden Valley Rd.

SEATTLE (AP) — An array of tennis talent from as far off as South Africa appears in Seattle next week for the National Hardcourt Championships.

Rafael Osuna of Mexico City is seeded No. 1 in men's singles. Ranked after this member of the powerful USC tennis team, are Larry Nagler of Los Angeles, Bill Bond of LaJolla, Calif., Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, Rodney Mandelstam of South Africa and Bill Lenoir of Tucson, Ariz.

Nagler is the Big Five champ from UCLA, the Bond is ranked 10th in the nation, and the veteran Seixas is former Wimbledon and Forest Hills titlist.

Marilyn Montgomery of San Antonio, Tex., is seeded first in women's singles. Carol Hanks of St. Louis is second, and Janet Hopps Adkisson of Seattle third.

In men's doubles, the combination of Bill Hoeks Jr. and Jim McManus of Berkeley, Calif., top seedings. Next come Bond and Dennis Roston of Bakersfield, Calif. Osuna and Ramsey Earnhart of Ventura, Calif., are third.

In women's doubles, Marilyn Montgomery and Janet Adkisson are top seeded.

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Arnie Giving Field Break In Tourney, Says Nicklaus

CLIFTON, N.J. (AP) — "Arnie is just giving the field a head start this week."

That was the laughing analysis offered by two-time National Amateur champion Jack Nicklaus when 45 players scored better than Arnold Palmer in the first round of the \$100,000 Thunderbird Classic tournament at the Upper Montclair Country Club.

It was given, however, with a slightly rueful chuckle that indicated nobody, least of all his privates, figures Arnie will be far away when the \$25,000 first prize is handed out Sunday night.

Guy Brewer, heavy-hitting Kentucky-bred pro who plays from Crystal River, Fla., solved the tricky greens on the 7,055-yard course to take the first round lead with 33-33-66.

He was one stroke ahead of Gene Littler, who is tuning up here to defend his U.S. Open championship at Oakmont, Pa., next week, and Earl Stewart, 40, a club pro from Dallas, Texas.

Palmer, winner of six tournaments this year, favorite to add to his immense earnings here and probable favorite for next week's National Open, had a 73, one over par. He was still feeling the effects of a cold that has bothered him for more than a week.

Two players, Fred Hawkins and Dave Ragan, had 68s and six had 69s, among them Nicklaus.

Cardinals Ready For Giant Series

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Stimulated by a psychological boost that carried them out of a great depression, the St. Louis Cardinals are primed for the first place Giants who open a four game series here tonight.

Manager Johnny Keane said the great lift came Tuesday night when the Cards pulled from behind an 9-1 deficit and went on to beat the Cincinnati Reds 10-9 in 11 innings on Stan Musial's homer.

"They wouldn't have gotten the same boost if they had won the game 5-3 in nine innings," Keane said after the Cards had completed a three game sweep of the series with the Reds, winning 8-2 on 18 hits. The victory string followed eight straight losses.

"It takes a long time to fall back into a slump once you're out of one," the manager said — obviously pleased that the darkest slump of the year was behind him.

The Giants are 10 games in front of the Cards but they come here with a two game losing streak.

NCAA Track Championships To See Tight 440 Action

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Adolph Plummer, speedy junior from the University of New Mexico, defends his national collegiate 440-yard dash championship against a nifty field when the 41st annual NCAA track and field championships unfold at Hayward Field, June 15-16.

Plummer, who won last year with a time of 46.2 at Philadelphia last year, has the best collegiate time recorded this spring with a 46.0 to his credit. Earl Young (46.1) of Abilene Christian College just missed nipping Plummer at the wire a year ago. Both men were given the 46.2 clocking and Young will be back to give the defending best of 25-3½, and Jerry Close of camp a tussle.

Considered Favorites

Favorites have to be Plummer and Young on the basis of their one-two finish last season and their one-two timing this spring. They'll be pushed, however, by Charles Mays of Maryland State and Dave Mills of Purdue, both with 46.2s to their credit, and Southern California's Tex Crowley and Charles Strong of Oklahoma State, both with 46.3s in the books.

Cawley is also rated the nation's finest intermediate hurdler. He might bypass the flat quarter-mile to concentrate on the hurdle race. The field will also include Oregon State's Norm Monroe (47.1), who placed fourth last season, and Jim Baker (46.7) of Missouri, sixth place finisher at the 1961 meet. Other solid competitors, all with 46.7s, include: Hubert Brown of Morgan State; Lynn Eves of Oregon State; Elzie Higginbottom of Wisconsin; Bob Johnson of Oregon State; and Jay Luck of Yale.

Hard-Pressed

Don Meyers of Colorado will be hard-pressed to retain his broad jump title. Meyers, who won last year with a leap of 25 feet, has been bothered by injuries this spring and lists a best for the current season of 24-2.

Five competitors have soared over 25 feet this spring. Oklahoma's Tony Watson leads the nation's broad jumpers with an effort of 25 feet 8½ inches.

Bill Miller of McMurry has gone 25-6, Ken Tucker of Los Angeles State has jumped 25-5½, Abilene Christian's Jerry Dyes boasts a

host Oregon has turned in a jump of 25-1.

Oregon's Mel Renfro and Ohio State's Paul Warfield, a pair of outstanding football halfbacks, are nudging the 25-foot barrier. Renfro has jumped 24-11½, while Warfield has done 24-11¼.

No Defending Champ

In the hop, step, and jump 1961 champion Luther Hayes of USC is not back to defend. Dyes (48-11½) will double back here and figures to battle Wisconsin State's Elif Fredricksen (50-4½) for Hayes' vacated title.

Grant Krow of Albright, who has not jumped this year, was fourth a year ago, while Winston Doby (48-7) of UCLA took home fifth place in the 1961 meet. The field also includes Samir Vincent (48-8½) of Boston College, Walt Roberts (48-8) of San Jose State, and Dave Thomas (48-5½) of Los Angeles State.

Ed Bailey (200-0) of Harvard heads up the field in the hammer, where 1961 champ Tom Pagan of Cal. Poly is not back. Bailey's toss is almost eight feet better than his closest competitor, Ed Burke (192-3½) of San Jose State. Bailey grabbed a fourth place finish a year ago at Philadelphia.

Other leading hammer throwers are Kevin Kilgallen (186-5) of Holy Cross, George Desnoyers (181-6½) of Boston College, Arthur Doten (175-0) of Harvard, Clark Ballard (174-10) of Army, and George Frenn (173-2) of Abilene Christian College.
