

Commissioner Candidates Differing On Some Proposed County Plans

Two candidates for the office of county commissioner, Elmer Metzger, Republican incumbent, and Ivan Edwards, Democrat, were speakers at the last meeting of the Cow Creek Valley Development Association at the Glendale City Hall.

Mrs. Gerald B. Fox, correspondent, said topics under discussion included the federal program for area redevelopment for depressed areas and the retraining program coupled with it; the surplus foods program; and the county dam and reservoir proposed for Windy Creek, north of Glendale.

Court Reluctant
Metzger explained that the county commissioners have been reluctant to become involved in the surplus foods program because they felt that many of the items were not actually surplus but were being purchased by the government particularly for the program. He said the "program" doesn't ring true and funds too much like socialism. Fifteen counties are in the program, he said, and some of them regret their participation.

Edwards countered by stating that while not all foods distributed are surplus, they are already being subsidized and might as well be included among the surplus foods. He said he was in favor of the program.

Standard Finds No Oregon Oil

PORTLAND (AP) — O. N. Miller, president of the Standard Oil Co. of California told the annual meeting of the Associated Oregon Industries Friday night that his company has found no oil in Oregon.

However, Miller said, the company is not discouraged and thinks there is still some potential. He said new state laws permitting offshore exploration in state-owned submerged land aided exploration.

Henry E. Baldrige, executive of the Publishers Paper Co., Oregon City, was re-elected to a second term as president of the group.

A. J. Rawlinson, Portland, was elected vice president; Wilfred E. Jossy, Portland, secretary, and Ralph H. Millspaugh, Portland, treasurer.

Earlier, the AOI members heard a panel discussion of legislators and listened to talks by two avowed conservatives.

One of the speakers was the Rev. Edward W. Greenfield Buena Park, Calif. He said the business community has never been in such great peril as it is now from socialism. There has never, he said, been "so steady and insidious a growth of disguised and diluted socialism."

The other speaker was Scott Stanley Jr., a 1960 Indiana college graduate, who told the businessmen of his efforts to build a conservative campus organization, said a primary economics textbook that Oregon universities use is socialist.

Glendale Assembly Sets Bible School

The Glendale Assembly of God Church will use a unique program arrangement for carrying out its theme, "Adventuring With Christ" in Vacation Bible School sessions, beginning June 11 and running through June 24. Youngsters in attendance will become "knights" and "ladies," and the church will become a "castle" with an appropriate drawbridge built into the entrance which the children must cross.

School hours will be from 9 to 11:30 a.m. each week day, according to Mrs. Gerald B. Fox, correspondent.

An attendance contest will be conducted, the winner to receive a free boat ride on the Rogue River. Contestants in the contest must be present the first day of the school in order to qualify, according to the Rev. Bruce Manning, pastor of the church and principal of the school.

All boys and girls of the community from 5 to 14 are invited. The church bus will pick up children on two roads, North Reuben Rd. and Tunnel Rd., each morning, bringing them back at the close of the school. The bus will begin its run at the end of North Reuben about 8:30 each morning. It will go as far as a short distance past the Humphrey Addition Rd. intersection with Tunnel Rd. to pick up youngsters there.

Winston Man Finishes Course With Honors

Alfred I. Crook of Winston has been named an honor graduate from the Heavy Equipment Operators Division of the Northwest Schools of Portland.

He was graduated from the course with an over-all grade point average of 96.4 per cent. He is the son of Harriet Olson of Reedsport.

When asked why Douglas County had not participated in the government-sponsored redevelopment for depressed areas program, Metzger stated he believed the program had to be initiated from the federal level. Douglas County, with several bright spots in the labor picture, had not been designated as a depressed area, he said, since over-all employment figures did not indicate a severe need.

Understanding Different
Members stated that it was their understanding that the program, on the contrary, had to be initiated at the county level. One member even suggested the southern part of the county's secession from Douglas County in order to get the attention for its needs.

Both Metzger and Edwards promised investigation into the matter. In discussing the proposed Windy Creek Dam and Reservoir which is being urged for the Glendale area, it was indicated that county surveys have already been made. The dam, if built as proposed, would be 57 feet high and of earth-fill construction. It would back up a 65 to 68-acre lake, located about eight miles north of Glendale, with access from the Windy Creek Rd. which now comes to within about two miles of the proposed site. It would be on state land and would be a cooperative project of both state and county. Cost of the project was estimated at \$37,000.

Petitions Eyed
Members voted to get out petitions and send a delegation to the County Court to ask that the Windy Creek Dam and Reservoir be included in the coming year's budget.

Given an opportunity to outline their platforms, Edwards stated he is supporting surplus foods distribution.

Victim Of Accident In Critical Shape

Howard George Gallios, 19, of Friday Creek, severely injured Friday in a Douglas County traffic accident, remained critical today at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

The hospital said Gallios, who suffered a skull fracture, has not regained consciousness.

Roseburg state police said Gallios was driver of a 1949 pickup involved in a collision with a 1962 two-door sedan driven by Philip David Pursian, 21, of Renton, Wash. The accident occurred about 7:45 a.m. Friday at the south end of the Boomer Hill interchange north of Myrtle Creek.

Investigating officers said both vehicles were southbound on a four-lane divided highway. As the vehicles approached a point where the highway narrows to two lanes, Pursian attempted to pass Gallios, police said.

Pursian's car reportedly struck Gallios' car, causing his vehicle to swerve to the right and strike the pickup in the rear. The impact knocked the pickup sideways and caused it to overturn, according to the police report. Gallios was thrown from the truck.

Neither Pursian nor a passenger with him, Mrs. Carolyn Smith, 21, of McMinnville, was injured. Only fender damage was caused to the car and it was driven from the scene.

The pickup, demolished, was removed by Myrtle Creek Body Shop.

Budget Levy Hearing Scheduled At Riddle

A hearing on the 1962-63 budget for the Riddle Cemetery Maintenance District will be held Tuesday at 7:30 p.m., reports Erma Best correspondent.

The hearing will take place in the Strabridge Insurance Agency in Riddle. Copies of the proposed budget are posted at the insurance office, at the Riddle City Hall and at the cemetery grounds.

The tax levy is estimated at \$6,273.50, which is about 8 of one mill, or about the same levy as last year.

Major items to be accomplished under the budget are the completion of purchase of additional construction of a storage building to house equipment, the purchase of heavy mowing equipment and continued improvement in landscaping and planning. Some legal work will also be necessary, Mrs. Best states.

Three Fishermen Draw Fines For Violations

Three angling violation cases were handled in District Court of Gerald R. Hayes Friday. In each case the accused pleaded guilty and each paid fines of \$25 and \$5 costs.

They were listed as Gordon Ingraham, 18, of San Francisco, angling without first obtaining a non-resident's angling license; Douglas Hayden, 21, Toketee Ranger Station, Idleyld Park and Donald K. Murphy, 25, Myrtle Creek, both angling prohibited method.

The arresting officers report stated Ingraham and Hayden were angling in Lake Creek, the outlet of Diamond Lake. They said Hayden, using a short line and a lure as a snag hook, snagged a spawning fish in the fin, then handed the pole to Ingraham to play the fish until it could be landed.

Murphy was accused of fishing with means other than a fly in waters of the North Umpqua River above Rock Creek.

Bohemia Tracts Of Timber Sold

Two Culp Creek area logging operators were successful bidders on Bohemia District timber sales conducted in Roseburg by the Umpqua National Forest Friday.

Bohemia Lumber Co. won the Silica Creek sale on 183 acres 30 miles southeast of Cottage Grove. It paid \$55,125 for 7,300,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$54,830.

It paid \$6.55 per thousand for 5,900,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$8.50 and the appraised prices of \$3.30 for 1,200,000 feet of western hemlock and other species and \$3.60 for 200,000 feet of western red cedar.

Other bidders were Morrell Logging Co. of Cottage Grove and Johnson Lumber Co. of Junction City.

Otto Janisch of Culp Creek was the winner of the Lower Junetta Salvage Sale on 10 acres 29 miles southeast of Cottage Grove. Janisch paid \$41.40 per thousand for 830,000 feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$27.45.

Total price paid was \$34,562 for the 850,000-board-foot tract appraised at \$22,983.50. It paid the appraised price of \$19 per thousand for 20,000 feet of western hemlock and other species.

Other bidders were Morrell, Bohemia Lumber, Robert W. Kenda of Eugene, Cline and Ladd of Cottage Grove, D.C. Logging Co. of Cottage Grove, and Johnson Lumber.

The Umpqua National Forest sales are scheduled Monday.

House Probers Seek Long List Of Recipients Of Estes' Cash

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House investigators today hunted for Billie Sol Estes' cash gift list, which was reported to be so full of high-ranking officials that Estes couldn't keep track of who was on it.

Chairman L. H. Fountain, D-N.C., of the House subcommittee investigating the Estes case, said the search would start at the Post Office Department. He hoped to learn some of the names on the list by looking over records of money orders Estes mailed out of Pecos, Tex.

Former Assistant Agriculture Secretary James T. Ralph told the subcommittee Friday that he got money from Estes for no discernible reason. He said it embarrassed him so much that he complained and was told that the Texas financier didn't know his name was on the list.

Ralph, who got fired because of the Estes cause, said Estes was "just the kind of man my mother wanted me to be. He did not smoke, he did not drink and he did not chase women."

Perhaps, he said, he should have followed the advice of a "wise old sergeant" who once warned him "a man who neither smokes, nor drinks, nor chases women — stay away from him."

Manuel Mentions List
The gift list was first mentioned by Robert Manuel, an ousted counsel for the Republican minority on the subcommittee.

Manuel, in a statement Friday, said testimony in a closed session of the subcommittee told of "a list of individuals to whom Estes allegedly sent gifts in the form of money orders."

Fountain denied any such testimony was taken. But he said the

subcommittee had heard of the possibility of such a list and was hunting for it.

Ralph admitted Estes sent him two \$100 money orders, and also testified his assistant William Morris, received money orders. But he said both he and Morris endorsed them over to the Democratic party — one of Ralph's to the party in California.

Ralph testified that Morris told Estes of the embarrassment the money caused his boss. Ralph said Morris told him "Billie Sol didn't know my name was on the list."

Manuel told reporters it was his understanding Morris had a copy of the list. Morris was fired by the department for refusing to explain his connections with Estes.

Demoted Over Policy
Ralph was first demoted from assistant secretary because of

policy differences with Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman. He was later fired, while training to become an agriculture attaché to the Philippines, because he charged personal telephone calls to Estes.

Ralph also reviewed for the subcommittee his personal relationships with Estes.

Japanese Trial For U. S. Sailors Expected To Start Early In Fall
TOKYO (AP) — San Francisco lawyer George T. Davis said today the Japanese trial of five young American sailors indicted in connection with the fatal shooting of a policeman would probably begin in August or September.

Davis flew here recently to represent two of the defendants, seaman Harry E. Williams, 20, of Scotts Mills, Ore., and seaman apprentice Eugene R. Pacelli, 19, of Dumont, N.J.

Only one of the five sailors involved in the predawn brawl at Yokosuka May 5 was charged by the Japanese prosecutors with murder. He is Richard Lee Jackson, 19, of Kansas City, Kan.

Williams, Pacelli and two others were charged with murder and obstructing justice by police, but the prosecutors dropped the murder charge. Maximum penalty for

obstructing justice is three years at hard labor.

Charge Is Serious
The lawyer of the Caryl Chessman case fame, however, said it was "a very serious charge in a very serious case because there was a death, and that of a Japanese policeman."

He said if convicted in a Japanese court, Williams as well as the others—may be dishonorably discharged from the Navy.

Williams' case, Davis said, is "of considerable difficulty. According to the investigation, he has admitted he was holding the policeman when the shot was fired. But he said he was trying to protect him from injury and had no idea that a shot was to be fired."

The lawyer said the Japanese "must have given this considerable credence, otherwise he would have been indicted on murder charge."

Davis said the fact the prosecutors did not press murder charges against all sailors "was a gesture which indicates the humane and very individual approach of Japanese law to the question of individual responsibility."

Williams, who is not a juvenile by Japanese law, was indicted to stand trial in a district court. The other four were referred to family court which may in the next few days decide to retain jurisdiction or send them back to the prosecutors to stand trial as adults.

Davis said he believed all five will be tried as one case in district court.

But he said he was trying to get a separate trial for his other client, Pacelli, whom, the lawyer asserted, "was a bystander, not a participant in the case."

Asked if he expected an acquittal for Pacelli, Davis replied, "I do," and added:

"He was not really guilty of the crime charged but of bad judgment in being with that group that night."

Projects Keep City Crews Busy
Improvement projects at Legion Field and Roseburg Municipal Airport have kept crews of the Public Works Department on a busy schedule this week.

Department Director Kenneth Meng said engineering staff and Fire Department personnel devoted time this week to replacing and readjusting lights at Legion Field. This involved setting out a series of stakes to determine correct light distribution.

The Fire Department utilized the snorkel to reach the flood lamps. City crews also smoothed out the area around the grandstands and construction of a fence around the bath house was planned this week.

Roseburg Jaycees were planning to stripe the tennis courts at the new Stewart Park tennis facility and also paint the wooden wall at the north side of the courts this weekend, weather permitting.

Meng said his department has also started an improvement at the airport parking lot. A fence installed by the Roseburg senior class has been painted and the city proposes to provide landscape improvements sometime this summer and also establish an oil cover for the parking area.

The street department was busy striping streets this week. The director said the city is experimenting with glass beads in a few trial sections of striping. The beads, applied in conjunction with the paint striping, provide reflective characteristics at night.

Meng said the city is now adhering to new state regulations requiring white rather than yellow markings on streets. This applies everywhere except where no passing is permitted. In Roseburg, yellow markings are permissible only on Diamond Lake Blvd.

Methodists Name Oregon Ministers
SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Methodist Conference ended its annual meeting Friday by appointing ministers for churches throughout the state.

Seven churches, including First Church, Eugene have not yet received ministers for the coming year. Bishop A. Raymond Grant said in announcing the appointments.

The Methodists also adopted resolutions taking stands on national and international events, morals and ethics.

They adopted resolutions that: Asked the preaching of total abstinence from alcohol and calling on congregations to avoid all other detrimental habits; affirmed that planned parenthood practiced in Christian conscience fulfills rather than violates the will of God; deplored the use of capital punishment, and supported the strengthening of the United Nations.

American Swims Perilous Strait
MESSINA, Sicily (AP)—American Fred Baldasare, during treacherous currents and sharks today swam the hazardous Strait of Messina under water.

The Cocoa, Fla., long-distance swimmer made the unprecedented underwater crossing of the three-mile strait in 3 hours 42 minutes.

Baldasare actually swam more than three miles as the strong currents kept pushing him northward. He crossed from Capo Del Foro (Lighthouse Cape) on the northeast tip of Sicily to the village of Scylla, on the Italian mainland north of Reggio Calabria.

His arrival at Scylla was about half a mile farther north than his original target of Punta Pezzo. No sharks appeared during his crossing, but the menace of the marine killers was always present.

A banner stretched across one of the boats following him read: "Good Luck With The Sharks."

The record for a surface swim across the strait is 52 minutes 27 seconds, set by Pippo Dominici, an Italian, in 1930. Dominici was in a motor launch following Baldasare today.

The 38-year-old American is the first to ever try swimming the hazardous strait under water. Few have even attempted it on the surface.

Baldasare used oxygen. Five Italian spin divers on his pilot boat kept pumping into the water to change oxygen tanks under water, watching the white-painted hull of his pilot boat as a guide.

Surplus Food Plan Funds Requested
The County Court Friday said it has consulted with the County Budget Committee to set aside money for the surplus food program — if needed in Douglas County.

Commissioner Elmer Metzger said if the county is "crowded" into the program this fall, it can be ready for it by making a budget allocation now.

He noted the economy of the county is "generally improving" and that it might be unnecessary to introduce the program.

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
