

Algerians Still Hopeful Of Peace; Bombings Hit

ALGIERS (UPI) — Algerians spoke hopefully today of a new era of cooperation between Europeans and Moslems despite a weekend of bombings by Secret Army Organization extremists that damaged 40 public buildings.

Five Moslem parties began reading their appeals to an estimated 5 million persons who will be eligible to vote July 1 on whether to create an independent Algeria which will retain cooperative ties to France.

Strife Continues
Over the weekend the OAS refrained from attacking individual Moslems but stepped up the "scorched earth" policy of destroying public buildings to leave the Moslem majority as little as possible to take over.

Newton Creek's Church To Open

This is the first unit of a building which Whitford says will be larger in the future when funds become available. This will be the educational unit. The sanctuary unit is next. The first unit will measure 38-by-60 feet.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—It was the Dorsey High School prom. The girls stood around and talked about their babies. Several have two, three, or four—and one has eight.

The boys compared advancing waistlines and receding hairlines, and discussed the stock market. But it wasn't the class of 1962 with tinkling glasses in hand at the Rodger Young Auditorium. The celebrants were the class of '42.

"We're 20 years late," said Robert Watkinson, 37, vice president of a truck body firm, "but we couldn't very well hold a prom in '42 with the war on and blackouts and gas rationing."

So he and some fellow graduates got together and spent two years planning their big night. They contacted most of the 420 grads. Nearly 200 made it Saturday night from as far as Missouri and Illinois.

At Least 42,000 Doses Of Sabin Vaccine Given

The known number of doses of Type III Sabin oral vaccine given at the last series of clinics totaled more than 42,000.

The latest addition is the total from the Reedsport clinic where 4,100 were given. This was 100 more than had been given at the first clinic.

Added to this is the more than 38,000 given to people at the central Douglas County clinics. Others in the northern Douglas County area went to the Cottage Grove clinic staged by Lane County.

Graham Won't Extend Series

CHICAGO (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham has decided against extending his Chicago crusade—one of the most successful he has ever conducted—because suitable facilities will not be available.

The crusade, which has attracted 400,000 persons to its first 12 sessions, went into its final week today. It will be concluded with a giant rally in 92,000-seat Soldier Field next weekend.

Graham said the 45,000-seat McCormick Place Convention Hall will be unavailable after this week and he has been unable to locate another suitable site.

Sunday a crowd of 37,000 heard the evangelist warn the United States that as a free nation "we must be finished."

He said the days are "already numbered for the people of the United States, who have more than anybody in the world. The hour glass is already turned over."

Graham said "God drives people into a corner" and forces them to make a choice. "He divides homes, businesses and families. Your money cannot be first. Your TV cannot be first. Your choice must be first," he said.

Graham said it is the common people who follow Jesus. "He always identified himself with the suffering, the alone, the bereaved." He said Jesus never said it was wrong to be rich. "It is your attitude that makes the difference."

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate and House plunge into a full week of business this week for the first time this year.

A little bit of something for almost everybody but the taxpayers is on an unusually heavy docket. Two appropriation bills top a group of four big bills in the Senate. They call for an outlay of \$48 billion to finance the Defense Department for the fiscal year starting next month and \$932 million for the Interior Department. Both have passed the House.

Once they are out of the way, the Senate plans to take up bills dealing with all-channel television and a space communications satellite system. They, too, have passed the House.

The House starts its week with a bill to take care of women workers. It would provide that women should receive the same pay as men if they do the same work.

Tuesday the House will take up the controversial Fryingpan-Arkansas reclamation project. That will be followed on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday by bills to increase the statutory national debt limit to \$308 billion and to write a controversial new farm program.

Committee activity will be highlighted by continuation of the Billie Sol Estes investigation by a House Government Operations subcommittee and by renewed wrestling with a general tax bill by the Senate Finance Committee.

On Tuesday the Senate investigations subcommittee will begin peering into the shady side of night life.

Canada Navy Has Big Day

PORTLAND (AP) — Some ships of the Canadian Navy are visiting Portland for the Rose Festival celebration, and the Canadians are having an exciting time.

Sailors from the ships had a scheduled water battle with the Portland Fire Department Saturday.

But the sailors took a trophy of war in the mistaken belief that it belonged to the firemen. The trophy was the large United States flag that flies from the mast of the Battleship Oregon, a memorial on the downtown waterfront.

The flag was hoisted on the mainmast of HMCS Cowichan Saturday night, but it didn't stay up long. Canadian officers saw it, had it removed and re-raised it on the memorial with honors.

An apology was telephoned to Mayor Terry Schunk by the flotilla's chief officer, Cmdr. Maurice Faulkner Oliver, who explained it was all in fun and that no reflection on the American flag was intended.

Lt. Cmdr. Richard Okros, commanding officer of the Cowichan, said he planned no disciplinary action.

A truck belonging to one of the Canadian vessels had all four of its tires deflated early Sunday. It was parked along the waterfront near the ships.

Ollie L. Lewis
Funeral services for Ollie Leonard Lewis, a victim in the May 13 accident at Round Butte dam site, were held in Redmond June 2. Lewis, 28, of Sandy, had lived in central Oregon.

His survivors besides his wife, Barbara, and three children—Ann, 5, Larry Ollie, 4, and Carol Kay, 5—months—include a brother, Terry of Roseburg; and his father and stepmother, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Lewis also of Roseburg.

Lewis died May 31. Interment was in Pilot Butte Cemetery.

Gen. Franco Cracks Down On Dissidents

MADRID (AP) — Hundreds of opponents of Generalissimo Francisco Franco's dictatorship have been reported arrested in a sweeping roundup of dissidents of all political shades.

Five leading monarchists were caught in the dragnet as they returned from a meeting of Spanish oppositionists in Munich, Germany. Three of them refused an offer of exile and were flown to day of forced residence in the Canary Islands. Two went into exile in Paris.

Those flown to Fuerte Ventura, second largest of the Canaries, were Joaquin de Sastre, an executive of the Spanish affiliate of the American-owned Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co.; Fernando Alvarez de Miranda, 40, nephew of the Marquis of Valdivia and a Madrid city employee; and Jaime Miralles, member of a prominent old family.

Families of the three men said they were not allowed to visit them or speak to them after they were arrested during the weekend. Under a new decree they can be kept in forced residence for two years.

The monarchist leaders who chose exile were Jose Maria Gil Robles and Jesus Prados Arrarte, a noted economist and professor at Madrid University.

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"By associating themselves with the left-wingers at Munich, the more moderate dissidents from the Franco regime, such as the monarchists, have permitted themselves to be tarred with the same brush as the Communists," said one expert.

Arriba, organ of Franco's Falange party, branded the Munich conference as "a reconciliation of traitors."

Official sources said many of those arrested were involved in the wave of coal field and industrial strikes that recently gripped northern Spain. They were arrested after the government issued a decree restricting the movement of Spaniards in the country.

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
