Laos Coalition Agreement Made Official As Pact Okay Is Given

KHANG KHAY, Laos, (UPI)—The three rival princes of Laos today signed a formal agreement designed to restore peace to this tiny Southeast Asia kingdom.

The agreement was signed in this rebel-held headquarters by neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma, his half-brother, Prince Souphanouvong of the pro-Communist Pathet Lao, and right-wing Premier Prince Boun Oum.

In the leaders of the three factions which have been warring for years agreed to share the burden of bringing peace to Laos.

Drafting committees representing the three factions—pro-Western Boun Oum, neutralist Souvanna Phouma and leftist Souphanouvong — started work on the wording of the document early this morning to have it ready for the signing.

The agreement, by which Souvanna Phouma will be premier

of a coalition government, drew blessings from such diverse capitals as Washington and Moscow, London and Peking.

Aid To Resume

Officials in Washington said the United States was considering quick resumption of financial aid payments to Laos to help Boun Oum's present government meet its financial obligations before turning over power to the coalition.

The United States suspended the \$3 million monthly payments last February in an effort to persuade Boun Oum and his deputy, strongman Gen. Phoumi Nosavan, to proceed with the coalition negotiations.

Moscow Radio hailed the coalition agreement as "a great victory for the peoples of this small, Indochinese country" but warned the Laotian border situation remained tense because of U.S. troops in neighboring Thailand.

Troops Asked For

President Kennedy ordered 5,000 American military men to Thailand last month when a rebel offensive in northwestern Laos threatened to spill over the border. Thailand asked for the troops.

The British and French foreign offices both expressed satisfaction at the agreement and Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai sent "warm" congratulations to Souvanna.

Whether the coalition could actually bring peace and maintain a truly neutral country remained to be seen.

Blaze Hits G-P Coos Bay Mill

COOS BAY, Ore., (AP)—Firemen were mopping up today a blaze which caused heavy damage to a section of the big Georgia-Pacific sawmill just outside this coastal city late Monday.

No injuries were reported among firefighters battling the blaze in the green chain section of the sprawling complex which also includes hardwood, plywood and resin plants.

Value of the complex has been estimated at \$1 million.

The Coos Bay Fire Department, which summoned aid from several nearby communities, said the fire was brought under control about an hour and a half after being reported.

Winds of 26 miles an hour helped start several spot fires and threatened to spread the blaze through the entire mill before dying down.

One vessel at a nearby dock had to be moved back about 300 yards. The Coast Guard Cutter Modoc was alerted, but did not take part in the firefighting.

Help came from Coquille, Empire, North Bend and the Coos County Forest Protective Service.

Big Crowd Goes To World's Fair

SEATTLE (AP) — The second-largest crowd in the young history of the Seattle World's Fair, 68,532 persons, paid homage to Minnesota Monday under sunny skies and near-perfect weather.

With vacated schools boosting attendance, Minnesota Day was led by Gov. Elmer L. Anderson who led the largest state delegation—500—to honor an individual state.

Six different musical groups were here from the Gopher State to treat the throngs to gaiety and fun. All six performed in a special program held in the Plaza of the States.

Groups included high school bands from Proctor and Fairmount, Minn.; the Owatonna High School chorus; Minnehaha Academy band, the University of Minnesota Morris chorus and the "Over 60" Hobby band.

Among Gov. Anderson's entourage was royalty of the Minnesota Aquatennial — Commodore Gisselback and Queen of the Lakes Pamela Jo Albinson, King Boreas Wesley Chandler of the St. Paul Winter Carnival; Queen of the Snows Penny Yicks and Prime Minister Gareth Hiebert.

The Minnesota group was welcomed by Washington's Gov. Albert D. Rosellini and Fair president Joseph E. Gandy. The party toured the fairgrounds following a luncheon arranged by the chairman of Washington's Republican party.

Sister's Boss Shot By Irate Man For 'Fooling Around'

NEW YORK (UPI)—Police said a hulking, 250-pound accountant Monday night shot and critically wounded his sister's boss, oil company executive Taylor S. Gay, for "fooling around" with her.

Gay, 54, vice president of Phillips Petroleum Corp., was shot once in the side with a .25 caliber pistol as he sat in a telephone booth in the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Terminal in lower New York.

Gay had accompanied his secretary, Mary Mullooly, 42, to the terminal after a dinner date. She was waiting for a train to her home in Jersey City, N.J., when the gunman intervened, police said.

Adm.'s Shooting

Gay and Miss Mullooly had dined at the Downtown Athletic Club and were driven to the terminal, which serves commuters riding the Hudson Tube trains between Manhattan and New Jersey points, in a chauffeur-driven rented limousine.

Officers said James Patrick Mullooly, 41, the secretary's brother, admitted the shooting. He is employed by Great Lakes Carbon Corp. here as a traveling auditor.

"The man needed killing," they quoted the 6-foot 5-inch auditor as saying. "Somebody had to kill him. I took it on myself. I just couldn't see a married man taking out a single girl."

Separated From Wife

Gay, who is reported to earn \$90,000 a year and is a 1929 graduate of Harvard, had been separated from his wife for about five years. He resides at The Creek, an exclusive club in Locust Valley, N.Y.

He was listed in critical condition today following surgery at Beekman-Downtown Hospital in Manhattan.

Police said Mullooly's gun jammed after the first shot, leaving six live shells unfired. His sister, who witnessed the shooting, was treated for shock. Mullooly surrendered without a struggle, police said.

Life Imprisonment Term Given Man

EUGENE (AP) — Ernest M. Nichols, 34, Fall Creek, was sentenced to life imprisonment Monday after conviction Friday on a second-degree murder charge.

He was accused of shooting his wife to death with a hunting rifle in their home last Oct. 10.

Defense Atty. Edward Fadeley said he intends to file for a new trial.

2. Check wheel alignment at least twice a year. An out-of-line wheel can increase tire wear as much as 50 percent. Also, keep your wheels balanced. An unbalanced wheel pounds the tire against the pavement, wearing the tread unevenly.

3. Rotate tires every 6,000 miles. Be sure to include your spare. This helps tires wear evenly, last longer. Your Shell dealer can take care of this for you.

4. Avoid high speeds and save your tires. High speeds increase tire wear drastically — by as much as 80% over normal wear.

5. Use your engine to save your brake linings. Try to avoid hard, sudden braking. When you see you'll have to slow down, take your foot off the accelerator early and let the engine's compression do some of the job.

6. Warm up slowly. Racing an engine to warm it up ages it fast. A short warm-up at moderate speed is good for your car even in summer. But never race your cold engine to warm up. It may damage critical working parts before lubrication can be fully established.

7. Have your engine's spark timing set to proper specifications. Spark timing determines whether your plugs fire at the right instant. With incorrect timing, you can lose power and mileage. Also, your car may knock. And chronic knocking can damage your engine.

Star System Criticized After Movie Is Canceled By 20th Century-Fox

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Hollywood's star system came in for sharp criticism today following 20th Century-Fox's decision to give up on, "Something's Got to Give."

Executive Vice President Peter Levathes announced cancellation of the film Monday night. The development was preceded by the sacking of Marilyn Monroe on Friday and co-star Dean Martin's subsequent refusal to work without her.

Levathes was terse in his announcement, saying only that the move was reluctantly made.

System Out of Hand

But the boss of another studio commented: "The star system has got way out of hand. We've let the inmates run the asylum and they've practically destroyed it."

Members of the crew assigned to the Monroe-Martin vehicle said they hoped to run an ad in the trade papers headed: "Thanks, Dean and Marilyn, for putting us out of work."

Miss Monroe was fired for absenteeism. The studio said she showed up only five working days in seven weeks of shooting. The star blamed illness for her absences. On film, however, was her much-publicized nude bathing scene.

All told, 20th Century-Fox lost \$2 million worth of film by scrapping the picture.

But one studio source summed it up this way: "If we had con-

tinued at the rate we were going with Marilyn, we would have had an American 'Cleopatra.' It's better to shut down and lose \$2 million than keep on and maybe lose \$10 million or \$12 million.

"There was nothing we could do but scuttle it." After Marilyn was fired, she was replaced by Lee Remick. Then co-star Dean Martin departed, saying he'd work with no one but Monroe.

Martin Move Hurts

The studio could replace Marilyn easily because she wasn't on much film, but Martin was in nearly every scene director George Cukor shot while waiting

for Marilyn to return to the set. Miss Remick would say only, "I'm not mad at anybody."

Martin said of the shutdown, "Gee, that's a shame. I'm really sorry. If they'd kept Marilyn in the cast I think we could have made a very fine picture. But she was too sick to go ahead with it. So that's it."

It was a day of decisions for Levathes.

He also decided to suspend Walter Wanger as producer of "Cleopatra," at \$30 million the most costly film in history.

It, too, has been plagued by absenteeism by its star, Elizabeth Taylor.

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
