

Bevos Clubbed In Exhibition By Athletics

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Kansas City Athletics showed the Portland Beavers and 7,194 fans why they are only nine games out of the American League lead Monday night, bombing the Beavers 8-4 in an exhibition game.

The A's jumped on Portland starter Jim Archer for seven runs in the first two innings. They scored five runs on six hits in the second inning as Bobby Del Greco and Norm Siebern smashed doubles.

Portland reliever Glenn McMinin halted the major leaguers with a sparkling relief performance in 2 1/3 innings. He faced just seven men and struck out five of them.

Third baseman Ed Charles provided Kansas City's final run with a homer off Gerry Staley in the eighth inning. Manny Jimenez, the American League's No. 2 hitter, got two singles in three trips to the plate.

Bill Kunkel, who started the season at Portland and then moved up to the parent club a few weeks ago, was the winning pitcher.

Oregon's Tarr To Defend NCAA High Hurdles Title

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Jerry Tarr, Oregon's outstanding track performer for the 1962 season, will defend his national high hurdle title June 15-16 before the home town crowd in the 41st annual NCAA track and field championships at Hayward Field.

Tarr won the NCAA championship a year ago in 13.9. He's been consistently under that mark this spring and boasts a best of 13.3, which is a new collegiate record. His main competition figures to come from Benny McKee of Michigan, who has covered the 120-yard course in 13.7 and was fourth in the national meet last year, and Ray Cunningham of Texas.

Cunningham made the finals a year ago but failed to place. This spring, however, the Longhorn star has turned in a snappy 13.7 with aiding wind to rate as one of the nation's best hurdlers.

Bob Pierce (13.9), USC's fine hurdler, was second to Tarr in 1961 and if he is fully recovered from mid-season injuries could be a factor in the NCAA test.

The field also includes a quartet of 14.0 performers. In this

group are Oregon's Mel Renfro, Brian Polkinghorne of USC, Occidental's Gary Dolbow and Bill Frasnano of Nebraska.

The 220-yard hurdles are not held at the NCAA meet with the 40-yard intermediate hurdles being substituted for the low sticks. As a result most of the high hurdle standouts will not be doubling.

Top rated performer in this event heading into the meet is USC's Rex Cavley, who has been timed in 50.5. That's a full second better than Bruce McCullough of San Jose State and Russell Rogers of Maryland State, his closest competitors, have managed.

Darkhorse contenders are Jay Luck of Yale, fifth place finisher last year at Philadelphia and with a best of 51.7 this spring, Tarr, who has run 52.0 in his only try at the event, and Ron Ahlwey of Georgia Tech, who grabbed off a fourth place finish in 1961.

The pole vault is typical of the excellent field set to contend for

eight entrants have cleared 15-5 or better, and those who have not been over the 15-foot mark during the season appear to have little chance of placing.

Army sophomore Dick Plymale is the leading collegiate performer this season on the basis of his 15-9 1/2 best. That puts him three inches ahead of his nearest rivals.

Washington's John Cramer and Fred Hansen of Rice, who tied for fourth place last spring, and John Beltraz of Maryland have all cleared 15-6 1/2. At 15-6 are John Rose of Arizona State and Rolando Cruz of Vallinova.

The list of pole vaulters also includes Bayless Bennett of Texas (15-4 1/2), and Joe Harris of LSU and Dexter Elkins of SMU, both with 15-5 bests to their credit.

It should be one of the classic fields in the history of the meet and the competition could well shove one of the competitors past Bob Gutowski's meet record of 15-9 3/4.

WSU May Become Big Five Member

VICTORIA, B.C. (UPI) — One persistent rumor, not on the agenda, and routine business matters were expected to keep Big Five athletic directors busy today at their annual spring meeting.

The rumor concerns expansion, principally the addition of Washington State University, although the Cougars have no representative here.

At the opening session Monday, the directors recommended four changes in conference track meets and also set up an agenda for the athletic council which meets Wednesday. The council is composed of the athletic directors and faculty representatives.

The directors accepted earlier suggestions by track coaches to add the 440-yard relay at the start of all non-championship league meets and a non-scoring 440-yard weight man's relay preceding the mile relay.

In addition, they recommended to the council the running of the 220-yard low hurdles around turns in future meets to conform to Olympic practice.

They also proposed retaining the collegiate rule of ties in events such as the broad jump, high jump and pole vault rather than place competitors on number of misses and crediting as NCAA records only those established by teams eligible for NCAA championship meets. This would eliminate marks set by schools utilizing freshmen.

Also slated for discussion by the Big Five are scheduling and officiating problems, the Rose Bowl pact and management and sports federations. The conference is composed of UCLA, Southern California, Stanford, California and Washington, host school for the season.

Phillies Beat Simmons; Yanks Lose To Orioles

It took the Philadelphia Phillies a long time to do it, but they finally caught up to lefty Curt Simmons.

Simmons, released by the Phils on May 12, 1960 and subsequently picked up by the St. Louis Cardinals, had beaten his old teammates eight straight times until they turned the tables on him Monday night in an 8-5 victory over the Cardinals.

Simmons, a member of the old Philadelphia Whiz Kids, had made nine starts against his old buddies and only once was he not involved in the decision—and that was more than a year ago. Included in his eight wins over the Phils were four shutouts.

Monday night, however, the Phils raked Simmons for nine hits and tagged him with four runs to knock the Cardinals out of fourth place in the National League race. Don Demeter and pinch-hitter Johnny Callison caused the most trouble, each hitting his eighth homer and batting in three runs.

The Pittsburgh Pirates moved a fourth place past the Cards into first place on the strength of two home runs by Dick Stuart which helped beat the Chicago Cubs, 6-1, and the New York Mets whipped the Houston Colts, 3-1, behind the seven-hit pitching of lefty Al Jackson in other N. L. games. San Francisco at Cincinnati was postponed because of rain. The other clubs were idle.

Orioles Beat Yanks
In the American League, the Baltimore Orioles beat the New York Yankees, 5-3, enabling the Minnesota twins to take over first place by one percentage point, and the Cleveland Indians beat the Boston Red Sox, 10-0, in the only scheduled games.

Stuart hit one of his homers completely out of Wrigley Field in Chicago and his second rolled under a tarpaulin in the Pittsburgh bullpen to give Joe Gibbon his first victory of the season. It was the Pirates' third straight win.

Jackson's pitching enabled the Mets, who now have won four of their last six games following a 17-game losing streak, to gain their first win over the Colts. Two singles wrapped around a triple in the fifth inning accounted for

two New York runs and proved all the runs Jackson needed.

Near Riot Breaks Out
Jim Gentile's 16th home run and Hobie Landrith's first accounted for three Baltimore runs and proved the margin of difference in a game which saw rival managers Billy Hitchcock and Ralph Houk ejected following a near riot. The trouble was touched off when Yankee starter Bud Daley hit Baltimore's John (Boog) Powell in the head with a pitch in the fourth inning and sent him to the hospital.

The Orioles retaliated when pitcher Robin Roberts threw at Roger Maris in the New York fourth and both teams raced onto the field to stop Maris when he advanced on Roberts. Houk, Hitchcock, Maris and Baltimore coach George Stallor squared off and it took three city policemen to break them up.

Jim Perry's seven-hit shutout pitching and the clutch hitting of Willie Kikland featured Cleveland's victory, which moved the Indians into a second-place tie with the Yankees, each a half-game behind Minnesota.

Littler Gains
Among Top Golf Money Winners

DUNEDIN, Fla. (AP) — Gene Littler, who will defend his title this week in the U.S. Open, has moved into a strong second position among professional golfing's top money winners.

The \$25,000 Littler won last weekend in the \$100,000 tournament at Clifton, N.J., gave him total winnings for the year of \$53,704, according to Professional Golfers' Association headquarters.

Arnold Palmer still is in first place with a total of \$69,311, even though he won only \$499 in the New Jersey tournament. Bill Casper Jr. won \$950 to give him a total of \$42,158 and third place among the top 10.

Jack Nicklaus, who won the \$10,000 second prize, vaulted from eighth place to fourth with total winnings of \$28,198. Rounding out the top 10 are: Gary Player \$22,688, Phil Rodgers \$22,330, Bobby Nichols \$20,973, Dow Finsterwald \$20,295, Doug Sanders \$19,421, and Bruce Crampton \$17,273.
