Amateur Rockets Regulation Muddled

WASHINGTON (AP)—As a safety move, the Federal Aviation Agency wants advance notice when amateur rocketeers plan to hurl their spacecraft skyward. It has proposed a regulation which would require not only 24 to 48 hours advance notice of such firings but also would ban night launchings and rocket firings within five miles of an airport. The proposed regulation, however, won't apply to toy and model rockets weighing less than a pound and having less than five ounces of propellants.
