

Diefenbaker Claims Khrushchev Meddles In Canadian Election

OTTAWA (AP)—Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker has accused Soviet Premier Khrushchev of meddling in the Canadian election with a charge that Diefenbaker's Conservative government is making preparations for nuclear armament.

With the election of a new Parliament coming up Monday, Diefenbaker said Thursday in a campaign speech Khrushchev "doesn't want this government back because we took a stand on Soviet colonialism that he doesn't like."

Soviet Ambassador A. A. Aronov delivered a Kremlin protest Thursday which said if nuclear warheads are located on Canadian territory, the Soviet Union would have to take counter-measures to safeguard its security.

Diefenbaker's government immediately rejected the Soviet note as "inadmissible interference in Canadian affairs."

Diefenbaker's chief opponents unanimously backed him against the Soviets.

Lester B. Pearson, Liberal leader, termed the Soviet statement "arrogant and clumsy" and said it would not affect Canadian attitudes "toward nuclear weapons or toward Soviet imperialism."

T. C. Douglas of the New Democratic party said Khrushchev should know Canadians deplored the "callous and contemptuous" Soviet resumption of nuclear testing last fall.

The Social Credit leader, Robert Thompson, said the Soviet statement was "ill timed and nothing more than Russian interference with a Canadian election."

Canada is building two Bomarc missile bases at North Bay, Ont., but has not decided whether to accept nuclear warheads or get them from the United States after an attack. Diefenbaker indicated Thursday night that a Conservative government would never allow U.S. nuclear warheads on Canadian soil except in wartime.

"We have given the assurance," he said in a broadcast, "that Canada will not join the family of nuclear nations but at the same time will discharge our responsibility for the security of Canada by assuring that if war should come—which God forbid—Canadian armed forces will be in a position to defend with the best defenses available."

He said corps members are "exactly the kind of people we want to get into the foreign service."

The President talked to the Washington staff of the corps and a group of trainees at the auditorium of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

Peace Corps volunteers already overseas have set an example for government service which should be a great source of satisfaction to all Americans, he asserted.

Widow Claims Husband Died From Harassment

PORTLAND (AP)—The widow of a Portland businessman asks \$120,000 damages in federal court on a claim that insurance adjusters caused the death of her husband.

She is Mrs. Donald R. Morris whose husband died Aug. 5, 1960. He was secretary-treasurer of Western Plywood Corp. which suffered a \$175,000 fire loss in February, 1960.

She contends that two adjusters subjected her husband to three days of intense questioning and threatened him with criminal prosecution. He then had a fatal heart attack. The suit was filed against an adjustment company and several fire insurance companies.

Local Logging Firms Win Three Umpqua Tree Tracts

The Umpqua National Forest conducted three timber sales Thursday.

The first involved salvage timber on a 500-acre tract on Trap Mountain 69 miles east of Roseburg in the Diamond Lake Ranger District. Round Prairie Lumber Co., Dillard, was high bidder, offering \$11,012.50 for a total of 1,250,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$10,942.50. Total of 350,000 board feet of pine, appraised at \$20.55 per thousand was bid in at \$20.75, and the remainder of one million board feet of western hemlock and other species, brought the appraised price of \$3.75 per thousand.

Other bidders were Thompson & Warnke of Klamath Falls, J. R. Standley & Sons Logging, Glendale, and R. A. Briggs & Sons, Roseburg.

The second tract, known as the Pine Management area sale, was located in the Diamond Lake District, 68 miles east of Roseburg on 275 acres. The total volume of 1,300,000, appraised at \$15,380, brought \$15,735. High bidder was R. A. Briggs & Sons, Roseburg, who bid \$10.35 per thousand for 1,100,000 board feet of pine, appraised at \$10.10 per thousand; \$28 per thousand for 150,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$27.80.

and \$3 per thousand for 50,000 board feet of white fir and other species appraised at \$2 per thousand. There was one other bidder, Thompson & Warnke.

The final sale was the Black Butte salvage area, consisting of 250 acres located in the Little River Ranger District, 42 miles south-east of Roseburg.

J. R. Stanley & Sons Logging bid \$11,740 for 650,000 board feet of timber appraised at \$11,737.50. The bid was for the appraised price of \$19.15 per thousand for 600,000 board feet of Douglas fir and pine, and \$5 per thousand for 50,000 board feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$4.95 per thousand. The only other bidder was R. A. Briggs & Sons.

The next sale will be Monday of next week.

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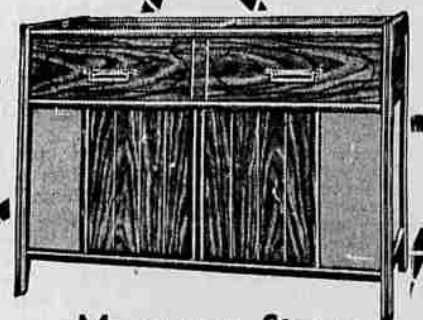
