ISLE OF ISCHIA, Italy (UPI)—Elizabeth Taylor Friday walked off the set of "Cleopatra" but costar Richard Burton persuaded her to come back to work.

The 30-year-old star, who didn't show up for work Thursday, was on a barge for a scene in the \$30 million epic.

She spotted a nonstudio photographer and angrily left the barge and climbed into the white motorboat that had brought her to the plush hotel where she is staying.

Burton hurriedly climbed down and, smiling and laughing, talked to her for about 10 minutes. Miss Taylor finally smiled and re-embarked the steps to the barge.

The scene was supposed to have been made Thursday but for a still unexplained reason Miss Taylor did not show up. It turned into a holiday with pay for several hundred extras and workers.

MILITARY LOOKS ALOFT

Space Interceptor Study Being Pushed By U. S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Defense Department is pushing technical studies expected to lead to development of manned spacecraft that could intercept and knock out hostile space vehicles.

Acknowledging the possibility of a future Soviet satellite-borne threat, the Pentagon is investigating not only unmanned but piloted vehicles that could rendezvous in space with unidentified craft and determine whether they are friendly or hostile.

These studies are seen as part of an inevitably expanding military role in space, barring some now-unlikely Soviet-American pact to ban warlike space machines and to explore it jointly and peacefully.

In Study Stage

Though the Air Force is developing a manned orbital vehicle called Dyna-Soar and doing basic research on one called Aerospace Plane, the space interceptor for manned orbital satellite is now in the study stage.

A Defense Department spokesman denied a published report Monday that "the department has decided that the Air Force should develop the technology for a manned satellite capable of inspecting and destroying a hostile vehicle in space."
