BONN (UPI) — The death of a U.S. pilot flying for the Luftwaffe pointed up the meshing of the new West German air force with that of the United States. The American pilot and three German military fliers were killed Tuesday when the four American designed but German-built Super Staghunter jets they were flying in close formation collided and fell to the earth near Cologne.

Prince Phouma Wins One Point

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Neutralist Prince Souvanna Phouma won one point from the rightists today in his demand for revisions of the royal decree setting up his coalition government, but he failed to budget them on another. The cabinet of the outgoing royal government agreed to delete a provision that the new regime will exercise control over the kingdom's three zones only after merger of the administrative of the neutralist, pro-Communist and rightist forces now occupying them.

Railwaymen Joining France's Strikers

PARIS (UPI) — Railwaymen joined gas and electric workers today in a spreading antigovernment strike that crippled France's transportation and deprived much of the nation of power, light and heat. Communist, Socialist and Roman Catholic union organizations all supported the mass effort to force the government to relax its efforts to hold the line against inflation.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A deputy director in the Office of Emergency Planning testified today that former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's defense mobilizer juggled stockpile target objectives merely to boost the price of zinc. William N. Lawrence told Senate investigators that a four-year, \$117.3 million zinc purchase program was "nothing more than a price support program." The additional spending, he testified, issued in 1954 under directives issued by the former president.

Authorities Hold French National

NEW YORK (AP) — A French national trying to leave the United States with \$247,400 cash in a valise has been sentenced to six months in jail for refusing to say where he got the money. The Frenchman, Antoine B. Riniere, 42, said he is an international art dealer. Kennedy said he hopes the determination of Tom Scanlon motivates the students to serve their government in the future. The young men and women filled Constitution Hall to hear Kennedy.

Alcatraz Escapees Used A Workshop

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Evidence mounted Tuesday that the three bank robbers who broke out of Alcatraz last week were probably the best prepared of the 33 men who have tried to escape "The Rock." A high federal prison official in Washington, Fred T. Wilkinson, confirmed that the three convicts had set up a secret workshop in a ventilator shaft in back of and above their cell block. Wilkinson said the men may have had access to this workshop for possibly a year. Found in the workshop were an electric fan that had been converted into a drill, a crowbar and other equipment. The escapees, Frank Lee Morris, 35; John Anglin, 32; and Clarence Anglin, 31, used spoons to chisel out ventilator shaft covers in their cells. They made dummy covers for the holes and apparently moved in and out at will.

Reds Can Catch Up With U. S. — Khrush

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Soviet Premier Khrushchev told Romanian collective farmers Tuesday at Ceacu it takes brains and capital to catch up with the United States, but it will be done. "We have the brains and we will get the capital and then we will overtake them," the Soviet leader declared. Khrushchev admitted that communism had difficulties in persuading peasants to accept collectivization. "Do not be too proud that you in Romania have finished collectivization of farms," he said. "There is always the psychological problem of the soul of the peasants. No one is born a Communist. After collectivization, the peasant goes to look for his own horse and feels that it is still his own property."
