CIRCUIT COURT

Complaints

Hazel Jay vs. Allen Lee and Michael R. Chastain. Plaintiff demands judgment against the defendants for \$10,000 general damages and \$279.50 special damages for injuries allegedly suffered in an auto accident on U.S. Highway 101 May 2, 1961, five miles north of Gardiner. Plaintiff alleges that Chastain stopped in the southbound lane of travel, that the operator of the vehicle in which plaintiff was riding had to apply his brakes to avoid hitting Chastain, and that defendant Lee collided with the rear of the vehicle occupied by plaintiff.

Investment Service Co. vs. Theodore and Ruby A. Peterson. Plaintiff demands judgment for \$1,475.86 plus interest and other expense items, as a sum alleged due on a promissory note dated Dec. 8, 1961. The original note has been assigned to the plaintiff.

Ulysses Marlow vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. Plaintiff asks that his claim for injuries be re-opened and that he be awarded additional medical care and treatment as warranted and then be awarded compensation for permanent partial disability equal to 85 per cent loss of function of his right leg and 35 per cent loss of function of an arm for unscheduled disability to his back. Injuries claimed suffered Aug. 2, 1960, while he was employed by Roseburg Lumber Co., when his clothing caught on a revolving object.

Douglas County vs. R. A. and Gertrude Briggs, Bruce A. and Lena Briggs, James A. and Myrtle Lee Briggs, Gary and Jeanne E. Briggs, and Continental Investment Corp. Condemnation proceedings to have a jury determine value of property taken over by the county for road purposes. The road is designated as Edenbower-Millwood Road No. 6. The property includes 62 acres.

Fayett L. and Faith F. Thompson vs. Judge T. and Dorothy L. Gary. Foreclosure sought for land sale contract. Alleged unpaid balance due is listed as \$5,174 on property described as tract on Lot 8, Block 3, Plat "J" of the Southern Land and Water Co., also known as 407 Terrace, Suburban.

Acina Casualty & Surety Co., Delbert Knowles & Maehelle R. Johnson, Everett P. Johnson and Julia H. Johnson, vs. National Union Fire Insurance Co. of Pittsburgh, Pa., Buell Inc., Al Strain and William Walters. Suit to determine liability for damage for Walters, who suffered injuries Sept. 3, 1959. Walters filed against the Johnsons owner of a sawmill which was operated by Knowles, Buell Inc. owned the truck involved and had given Strain permission to operate and unload the truck. Walters was employed by Strain to operate the truck, states the complaint.

Douglas County vs. Wayland E. and Lesett Hansen, Thelma E. and Stacey George, Stacey and others. Suit to condemn 5.65 acres of land of which 4.55 is new and 50 acre is acknowledged to be in the public, excepting tract conveyed to Bethany Methodist Episcopal Church of Edenbower. County needs the property for Edenbower-Millwood Rd. No. 6. The property is located on either side of the road.

The First National Bank of Oregon, Portland, vs. W. L. and Elizabeth J. Coe, sometimes known as E. J. Coe; Kenneth William and Nellie Rose Coe; John Doe and Jane Doe Keller; Walter and Rose M. Adling, and Douglas County State Bank. Suit to avoid conveyances in fraud of creditor. Plaintiff claims W. L. and Elizabeth J. Coe are indebted to the plaintiff in the sum of \$2,035.05, plus interest, that suit was instituted, attachment made on property listed and judgment entered by the Multnomah Circuit Court. The plaintiff alleges that the Coes conveyed to their son, Kenneth William, and to Nellie Rose Coe the property and executed a deed to them. It is alleged the conveyance was without valuable consideration and for the purpose of placing the property beyond the reach of the plaintiff as a creditor of

defendant grantors to hinder, delay and defraud plaintiff in its attempt to obtain payment. The Kellers are listed as occupying the property. Defendants Adlings have an interest in part of the property evidence by a land sale contract, which contract is held by Douglas County State Bank. Plaintiff asks that the conveyance of the property be declared fraudulent and void as to plaintiff, that the judgment of plaintiff be declared a first, valid and subsisting lien, and that a receiver be appointed by the court to assume the custody and control of the listed property, contracts, funds and rentals, and restraining defendants from encumbering, transferring, conveying or otherwise disposing of the property until lien is satisfied. Court order issued appointing Thomas B. Garrison as receiver.

Decree
Public Finance Corp. of Gresham vs. William H. and Edna Hamilton. On default of defendants, decree issued that chattel mortgage lien of the plaintiff is superior to other interests, liens or claims on household furnishings and appliances, and mortgage ordered foreclosed.

Dismissal
Massey-Ferguson, Inc. vs. E. G. Zeigler. On motion of the plaintiff, case dismissed with prejudice and without costs as settled.

Essie Garrison vs. Leighton M. Cornish. Upon stipulation of the parties case dismissed with prejudice and without costs.

Satisfaction
Wayne W. Powell, dba Wayne's Golden Eagle, vs. Dale Fish. South Douglas District Justice Court transcript dismissed with prejudice and garnishment at Green Valley Lumber Co. dismissed.

Orders
Loneta I. Harnack vs. Arnold W. Harnack. Upon hearing based on motion and affidavit of defendant, divorce decree of May 14 is vacated and held for naught. Defendant ordered to appear and show cause on June 18 why plaintiff should not have custody of minor child during pendency of suit. Defendant, who had filed a cross-complaint, contended that he had not been adequately served notice prior to granting of decree in plaintiff's favor, as there had been a temporary reconciliation.

Jason R. vs. Mary Ellen Jackson. Order restraining defendant from interfering with plaintiff and children vacated until further order of the court. Plaintiff granted continued child custody pending settlement, with visitation rights. Plaintiff required to pay suit expenses.

SP Yard Damage Heavy In Four-Alarm Blaze

PORTLAND (UPI) — Firemen said today a welding torch apparently caused a blaze at the Southern Pacific Railroad's Brooklyn yard repair shed during which juveniles threw rocks at firemen.

Damage was estimated at \$50,000. It was the second fire at the same building since March. Firemen said the blaze probably smoldered several hours in a freight car parked near the shed's open end. Workmen had been welding in the car during the afternoon, firemen said.

Juveniles refused to move off switching tracks as engines worked to move freight cars from the area and firemen said they turned streams of water on youths after they began throwing rocks. Policeman Walter Weir was struck in the chest by a rock.

Six empty freight cars were destroyed and others damaged.
