

Winetroun Legion Nine Topped By North Bend

Wildness on the part of two Winetroun Motors pitchers caused no end of trouble for the Myrtle Creek Legion nine Wednesday as the local team ended on the short end of a 7-4 score at North Bend against the Towers Motors team.

Tom Morrison and Mike Markham limited the North Bend contingent to just four hits, but between them issued 15 walks and hit two batters. The walks accounted for most of Myrtle Creek's trouble since the South Douglas team played errorless ball behind the two young chuckers.

Carl Dunn and Lance Popoff combined talents to pitch North Bend to its win. The two Towers Motors twirlers limited Myrtle Creek to just three hits, but four North Bend errors helped the local squad take an early lead in the game.

Scoring single runs in each of the first four innings Myrtle Creek took a 4-2 lead into the fifth frame. North Bend rallied for four runs in the bottom of the fifth to grab the lead, and went on to add a single insurance run in the sixth.

The winning rally for North Bend in the fifth came on three walks, a hit batsman and two singles.

Chuck Seven and Larry Richards provided the base blows in the uprising.

Myrtle Creek's three singles went to Markham, Don Fisher and Morrison.

Playing with only nine players, Myrtle Creek suffered a setback early in the game when Rick Abrahamson was taken to the North Bend Hospital with a broken nose. Abrahamson was struck in the face with the ball while covering second base on an attempt to nail North Bend's Seven, who was stealing the base.

The throw from the catcher hit the lip of the infield and took a bad hop, striking Abrahamson in the face. The young Myrtle Creek infielder suffered a broken nose from the accident.

To complete the game with a full roster Winetroun Motors had to borrow one of North Bend's spare players.

The loss in the non-league counter gives Myrtle Creek a 4-4 record for the season. In Doug-Lane League play Winetroun Motors boasts a respectable 3-3 mark.

Friday Myrtle Creek will host Corvallis in a 5 p.m. non-league game, then will return to league play Sunday against the league-leading Lockwood Motors team of Roseburg. The Myrtle Creek-Roseburg twin-bill is scheduled for 6 p.m. at Legion Field in Roseburg.

Burleson To Run In AAU Meet; Bowerman Says Pressure Used

EUGENE (UPI)—Oregon Track Coach Bill Bowerman and the AAU were at odds again today following a decision by the Ducks' Dyrrol Burleson to enter the national AAU meet.

Bowerman charged that the AAU "pressured" his star miler into entering the meet. Burleson reversed an earlier decision and said he will compete but in the mile instead of the three mile.

J. B. Baralson, chairman of the national AAU track and field committee, denied the charge and said "no pressure was placed on him to compete."

Burleson, who helped Oregon win its first NCAA title last week by winning the mile race for the third straight year, announced he will run in the three-mile run. He holds the American mile record of 3:57.6.

Bowerman said "he's doing it in an effort to keep the door open for himself for future running and of much sacrifice to himself."

Earlier, the Oregon distance coach said he would not compete because of summer school classes he is taking to complete work for his bachelor's degree.

Bowerman charged the national organization "with dictatorship with everything but a gun." He said he received a telephone call from an AAU official Tuesday night threatening Burleson with being left out of being considered for foreign competition unless he ran.

Baralson said this was an AAU fixed rule and said Bowerman was only reminded of the rule. He added "we are glad Burleson will run in the national championships this weekend."

Roseburg Climbs To First; Stomps Cottage Grove 7-2

Downing Cottage Grove, 7-2, in a single pine-inning game Wednesday, Lockwood Motors Junior League squad of Roseburg upped its Doug-Lane League mark to 6-1 and its season record to 14-1.

Dick Williams proved to be tough on Cottage Grove after the opening frame when Cottage Grove tallied its only two markers. Williams went the distance, spacing six hits, while whiffing 11 and giving up four base on balls. By virtue of three runs in the first frame, Roseburg jumped into an early lead. French opened the game with a walk, stole second, went to third on a groundout and romped home on a passed ball. Dennis Arana kept the threat going with a double and Beamer tripled to score Arana. When Tom Hobbs

grounder was booted by the shortstop, Beamer tallied Lockwood's third run.

Cottage Grove came right back in the bottom of the first, scoring two runs. Ken Miller singled and moved around to third on Jim Rhoads' double. Jerry Carr walked to load the bases and Jim Dockery walked to force in a run. Cottage Grove's second run scored on a fielder's choice.

Roseburg was unable to collect another run off Jerry Carr, the Cottage Grove hurler, until the sixth frame. Beamer led off the inning with a single and both he and Ron Polley continued around the base paths when Polley's single scooted by the left fielder.

In both the seventh and ninth innings Roseburg chalked up one run, making the final score read 7-2. French started the seventh with a single, stole second and went from second to home on a fielder's choice. In the final frame Williams reached first on an error, went to third on French's third single of the game and scored on a sacrifice fly off the bat of Doug Coplin.

Roseburg now is in first place in league standings with a 6-1 rec-

ord, as Springfield beat North Eugene. Roseburg's lone loss was inflicted by North Eugene in a tight 10-inning contest.

Roseburg starts a three-game series with Albany Friday night at Albany when they play a single game. Saturday they remain at Albany to play a doubleheader. Sunday Roseburg gets back into league play, hosting Winetroun Motors of Myrtle Creek in a 1 p.m. twin bill.
