

## Eaton Tops Standings; More Action Saturday

Jay Eaton took over undisputed control of first place in the point standings for hardtop racers competing at Roseburg Speedway.

After two outings Eaton, a Roseburg driver, has a total of 73 points. Eaton moved out in front as a result of the races last week, while John Barron, who was tied with Eaton after one race, dropped to seventh.

## Oregon, OSU Plans Ahead To Meet AAWU Standards

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—University of Oregon and Oregon State are pushing ahead with plans to tighten their entrance requirements and as a result will be invited to join the expanding AAWU within the next two or three years.

That's the word from a reliable Big Six source and when the two schools do join, it will complete the membership for the organization. Idaho, the ninth member of the old Pacific Coast Conference, will not be asked to join.

"We're ready to take in Oregon and Oregon State right now," says Al Masters, athletic director at Stanford. "But there still seems to be a bit of bitterness from other California schools."

"A five-team league was not good, and we should have more than six teams. I'm looking forward to the day when Oregon and Oregon State can join us again."

A plan is under way now in Oregon for the establishment of junior colleges. These will take some of the load off the universities. Under present Oregon law, the schools must accept all students who wish to enter who have a high school diploma.

In all Big Six schools there is a certain degree of efficiency in studies that must be met before

"California, for instance," claimed one coach, "is giving some of its athletic scholarships to boys who are going to junior college. This isn't against the rules, but it seems to me it is outside the spirit of the rules."

Addition of Washington State to the conference last week made it a six-team league. Actually, the NCAA doesn't recognize five-team conferences. But in the case of the AAWU it overlooked the situation, because expansion was anticipated.

But the NCAA didn't expect it would take three years to grow one extra leg—and six years to get up a normal eight-team conference.

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## Kart Races. To Feature New System

Sunday's kart races, sponsored by the Slo-Kart Club, will feature a new system of classification designed to give all classes of karts and equipment an equal break.

The Petite's Elapsed Time system which will be used will pit karts with comparable performance times in the time trials against each other. This way karts will be matched on performance rather than on the size of the motor.

The Petite's Elapsed Time system should provide more interesting races without penalizing "hot shoe" drivers who will be racing against other drivers of the same caliber.

Drivers from throughout Southern Oregon are expected to be on hand to take part in Sunday's action at the Roseburg Kartways. Time trials will be held at 1 p.m., with the races starting one hour later. The track will be open at 11 a.m. for practice runs.

### AAU Meet Attracts Top Stars

WALNUT, Calif. (UPI)—The National AAU, a truce declared with NCAA coaches for at least a couple of days, opens its 74th annual track and field meet today with every major U.S. star competing.

The prizes for the athletes included the medals won here, a chance to compete in the Polish meet (at Chicago June 30-July 1), and the Russian meet (at Stanford July 21-22), as well as several trips abroad.

Competition was to get underway with several trials at 10 this morning on the Mt. San Antonio College crushed lava rock track, described by many as one of the fastest in the world. The site is about 35 miles southeast of Los Angeles.

"We have the all-time best field for this meet," says Hilmer Lodge, Mt. San Antonio coach and the meet director. "I expect

there may be at least eight, possibly a dozen, world records broken."

Among the marks he mentioned in jeopardy is the 100-yard dash, here, Bob Hayes, Florida A & M, Frank Budd, Villanova, and Harry Jerome, Canadian from Oregon, will be tangling.

Budd is holder of the official world mark at 9.2 seconds but Hayes has been timed in that this year and Jerome will run within inches of the others, if he doesn't beat them.

The other big glamour event is the mile, where officials will get along without the presence of Deyrol Burselon, the American record holder, who will compete at three miles.

But the mile will attract such sub four-minute or better men as Jim Bealy, Jim Grelle and Terry Weisger — the latter a Marine.

### Westport Fishing Derby Scheduled

WESTPORT (UPI)—The 11th annual Westport Derby will be held here June 30-July 4.

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## Oregon's Shaw Posts Two NCAA Golf Wins

DURHAM, N.C. (UPI)—Tom Shaw of Oregon scored two victories to move into the quarter-finals of the NCAA golf tournament here Thursday.

The 23-year-old Shaw defeated Frank Luke of Oklahoma State in the 20th hole in the second round and topped Tom Grace of Notre Dame one-up in the third round.

The quarterfinal and semifinal rounds were scheduled today. The finals are set for Saturday.

Shaw is one of eight still in the running. Three of the eight, survivors of a 220-man field, are from team champion Houston — medalist Kermit Zarley, All-American Homero Blanco and Mark Hopkins.

The eight quarter-finalists will play 18 holes over the rugged Duke layout in the morning before slicing the field in half for the semi-finals in the afternoon.

In the upper bracket pairings, Zarley, a 20-year-old junior from Yakima, Wash., meets Jim Ewing of Southern California. Zarley downed Ken Folkes of Wake Forest, the last Atlantic Coast Conference man in the tourney, 2 and 1 in third round play Thursday. Ewing knocked out Bill Munn of Texas 5 and 4.

North Texas State's Don Wilson will face off against teammate Bill Garrett. Wilson downed Howell Fraser of Louisiana State 2 and 1 while Garrett trimmed George Greagh of Vanderbilt 3 and 1 in third round play.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI)—Defending champion Judy Hoetmer of the University of Washington and Julie Hull of Purdue, runner-up in 1959, both won quarter-final victories Thursday in the 18th National Women's Collegiate Golf Tournament.

Miss Hoetmer beat Sharon Fladdos of Iowa, 2 and 1, over the University of New Mexico course. Miss Hull upset medalist June Robinson of Oregon State, 2 and 1. Carol Sorenson of Arizona State eliminated Mary Jo Campbell of New Mexico, 2-up, and Sandra Palmer of North Texas State was forced to the 19th hole before beating Helen Weiland of Rosemon, Pa., 1-up.

Pairings in the semifinals today pit Miss Hoetmer against Miss Palmer and Miss Hull against Miss Sorenson. Finals are scheduled for Saturday.
