

U. S. Soldier Freed By Viet Cong Following Six Months Captivity

SAIGON, Viet Nam (UPI)—An American soldier was released from six months captivity by Viet Cong guerrillas Sunday and promptly denied any knowledge of letters the Communists said he wrote. He said he resisted their attempts to brainwash him.

Spec. 4 George Fryett, 26 Long Beach, Calif., told American officials he was bound and guarded constantly the first four months of his captivity and lost 25 pounds due to illness but was not actually mistreated.

Doctors found Fryett physically and mentally exhausted but suffering from no major physical disabilities. American officials gave the results of his first interrogation but would not permit newsmen to interview him until he gets some rest.

Fryett disappeared Christmas morning while riding his bicycle toward Bien Hoa, 15 miles north of here. He told U.S. officials he was riding toward a swimming pool and was captured by two guerrillas on bicycles when he took a wrong turn down a road.

A small band of guerrillas Sunday halted a bus in Binh Long province, 35 miles northwest of Saigon and put Fryett aboard with a suit of civilian clothes and the Viet Namese equivalent of a dollar. When the bus reached the next village Fryett contacted a South Vietnamese ranger company and was flown by helicopter to Saigon.

According to a U.S. military spokesman, Fryett said he did not know of and did not write letters which the Communists attributed to him in broadcasts two weeks ago.

The letters indicated he had accepted communism as the price for his freedom but they were couched in such typically Communist jargon that U.S. officials doubted at the time that they were authentic.

The spokesman said Fryett reported the Communists repeatedly tried to "educate" him, often at gunpoint, but he would have none of it.

Fryett said he tried to escape shortly after his capture but was caught quickly. He said the guerrillas moved him at least six times. He believed all the locations were northwest of Saigon.

Embezzlement Charge Hits Salem Attorney

SALEM (UPI)—Salem Attorney Cecil William Dobson, 41, is free on \$5,000 bail after being arrested Saturday on a charge of embezzlement by guardianship.

Dobson was indicted by a Marion County grand jury and taken into custody at his Mt. Hood summer home. He won a reduction of bond from \$10,000 Saturday afternoon.

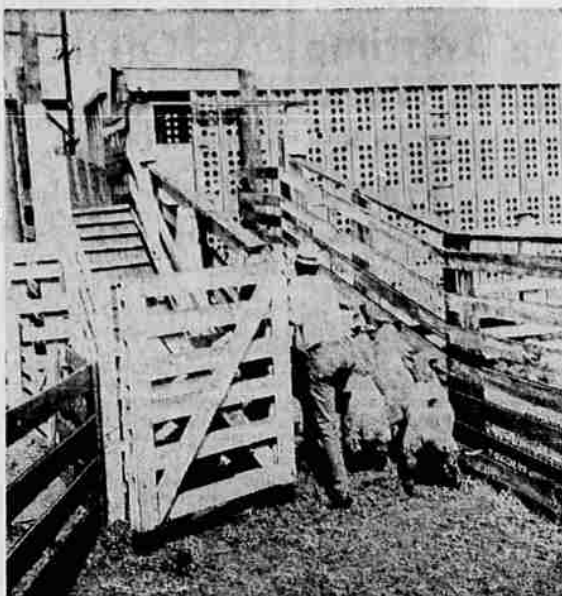
Marion County authorities say the charge involves illegal expenditure of \$81,000 belonging to an 83-year-old Klamath Indian, Asa T. Miller of Klamath Falls.

Dist. Atty. Hattie Kremen said Miller received \$86,000 under the Klamath Termination Act and another \$45,000 from the estate of a daughter. As guardian, Dobson was supposed to spend \$500 a month for Miller's care, Mrs. Kremen said.

The indictment charges all the money was spent in the past year and that \$19,000 of it was embezzled by Dobson.

A joint investigation by Mrs. Kremen and the Oregon State Bar led to the indictment.

Fat Lamb Pool Is Proving Success In Holding Price

An approximate 3,000 fat lambs have been moved at a series of lamb pools conducted for Douglas County sheep producers during May and June.

A pool staged last Saturday was the fourth of the year.

The pools are cooperative selling ventures promoted by the Douglas County Extension Service for the purpose of developing an improved price for lamb.

Wayne Mosher, county extension agent, said the program—now in its second year—has proven "very successful."

"As result of the pool, our lamb price has stayed within one-quarter to three-quarters of a cent of the Portland top," Mosher reported.

Sorters for the Douglas County venture are Prosser Clark and Jack LaFranchise, representatives of livestock commission firms on the Portland stockyard market. Each week of the pool, farmers

have indicated their interest in participating by notifying the county agent early in the week. On Friday, the day before the pool, the sorters visit farms of each participant to sort the lambs and determine how many can be selected for the pool.

On Saturday, the sheep go to market—the community scales east of Roseburg—and each producer participating is paid on basis of weight across the scales, Mosher explained.

Mosher said about 40 lamb producers have participated in sales conducted to date.

Five Persons Killed In Oregon Accidents

Five persons were killed in Oregon traffic accidents during the weekend.

Two 18-year-old Central Oregon girls lost their lives in a two-car collision on U. S. Highway 126 near Prineville Sunday.

The victims were Myrna G. Scott of Prineville and Caroline J. Villhauer of Redmond.

Also killed in traffic accidents in Oregon during the weekend were Steven Esselstrom, 14, Roseburg; Michael C. Devred, 33, Portland; and Mrs. Goldie Y. Fletcher, 63, Yuba City, Calif.

They died in separate crashes Saturday.

The Esselstrom boy was killed in a one-car accident on a U. S. Forest Service road 60 miles east of Roseburg.

Devred died in a two-car collision on State Highway 26 near Elsie and Mrs. Fletcher lost her life in a two-car crash on U.S. Highway 99 near Ashland.

Portland Lumber Firm Sues Forest Service

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Jones Lumber Co. of Portland has filed a \$10,000 damage suit in Federal Court here against the U.S. Forest Service.

The company said it was overcharged more than \$14,000 by Forest Service scalars for logs. The firm said it was charged for 296,000 more board feet of lumber than it removed from Forest Service land.

Four Killed As Lightning, Flash Floods Hit Over U. S.

Violent thunderstorms Sunday and during the night touched off

flash floods, killer lightning and tornado scares in areas from the Rockies to the Atlantic. A heat wave gripped the Northwest.

A woman was killed when struck by lightning at New York and an 18-year-old boy died in his flooded basement in Brooklyn. The young wife of an airman was killed and another woman hurt when struck by lightning on a beach near Biloxi, Miss. A man was electrocuted at Hartford, N.Y., when he picked up a live wire knocked down by a storm.

Tornadoes touched down at Pacific and Old Monroe, Mo., and

Dupo, Ill., but apparently failed to cause damage.

A Chicago suburb and sections of central Wisconsin mopped up Saturday night tornado damage estimated at up to \$1 million. Central Nebraska totalled \$500,000 crop damage from a weekend hail storm.

The heaviest rain in 64 years fell Sunday in sections of Philadelphia and at Camden, N.J., bringing flash flooding. Philadelphia had 2.83 inches of rain in an hour and 37 minutes.

Streets and basements were flooded in parts of New York

City, which got 1.26 inches of rain.

The heat wave sent the temperature soaring to 98 degrees at Boise, Idaho. Walla Walla, Wash., had a 97-degree reading. It was 96 degrees at Pendleton, Ore., and Salt Lake City, Utah.

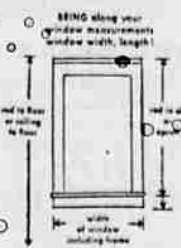
