

CIRCUIT COURT

Complaints

Phil Heidrick vs. H. G. Powell. Plaintiff asks award of \$5,832.05 plus costs and disbursements for damages stemming from defendant's alleged negligence in starting a fire which damaged certain timber and requiring use of fire fighting equipment to suppress it. Plaintiff alleges the fire occurred in May of 1960 while plaintiff was employed by defendant to yard and load certain logs in Coos County.

Oregon Nevada California Fast Freight, Inc., a California corporation, vs. O. California vs. Fred Oeator. Plaintiff asks award of \$2,152.46 plus costs and disbursements in a suit involving a highway accident May 28, 1959, about eight miles west of Camas Valley on Highway 42. According to the complaint, plaintiff was operating a 1957 tractor pulling a semi-trailer and full trailer and traveling west and the defendant was driving east in a 1953 truck. Plaintiff alleges defendant cut a curve in the highway which proceeded to defendant's left, forcing plaintiff's motor vehicle and trailers off the highway and into a rock bank, resulting in damage to the motor vehicle and trailers. Plaintiff alleges this damage was result of defendant's negligence.

Green Sanitary District vs. Douglas M. and Leona A. Briggs. Plaintiff asks that jury determine assessment due defendants by plaintiff's appropriation of easements on defendant property for purpose of constructing and maintaining sewer facilities.

Paul and Mary J. Hergert vs. Sylvester Harris Smith Jr. and Charlotte J. Smith. Foreclosure suit on Canyon property sold by the plaintiffs to defendants. Judgment asked for \$19,495 plus interest, taxes and other costs, in connection with foreclosure. The property includes the Pastime Tavern, house and two apartments and equipment and furnishings.

Marion W. Moore vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. Reopening of case asked with award of additional medical treatment as may be necessary, including surgery, and unless plaintiff's condition substantially improves then award of permanent partial disability equal to 100 per cent loss function of an arm for unsheduled injuries and 75 per cent loss function of a left leg. Injuries alleged suffered Oct. 13, 1960, while plaintiff was employed by Evans Products Co. He claims he was struck across the back with a tippie bar.

Douglas County vs. R. A. and Gertrude Briggs and others. Defendants ask dismissal of plaintiff's complaint for condemnation of property for right of way and if not dismissed that they be granted judgment in the sum of \$12,500 plus attorney fees for the property. They claim the property desired by the county for Garden Valley Rd. widening includes a dwelling, barn, fences, landscaping and other improvements, and that the improvements are now located a substantial distance from the road, making them "isolated for quiet-

ude, serenity and comfortable living." The desired property would require destroying a barn, fencing, landscaping features and other improvements.

Decree
William Howard and Viola Johnson vs. Archie W. and Hazel Oliver and the United States of America. Final decree for foreclosure on certain property.

Dismissal
Dovie Pfaff vs. Westland Life Insurance Co. Based on stipulation, case dismissed as settled with prejudice and without costs.

Motion for New Trial
Arthur F. and Margaret Weber vs. William H. Magness. Motion by plaintiffs for order vacating judgment entered June 14, 1962, and directing a new trial on the following grounds: "That court should have submitted the case to the jury and erred in reserving unto itself the decision; 2. That the decision of the court for the defendant contrary to the law and or evidence in that there is uncontradicted testimony that the defendant trespassed on plaintiff's property in tearing down a fence; 3. That the court erred in allowing evidence regarding an alleged easement."

Order on Trial
Haden E. Kelso vs. State Industrial Accident Commission. Based on trial jury verdict that plaintiff is permanently and totally disabled, judgment order issued that case be remanded to the defendant for award of compensation conforming to the findings of the jury. Attorney fees allowed. Trial opened at 10 a.m. June 20 and the verdict was returned into court at 4:55 p.m. on June 21. Case was tried by Circuit Judge Don H. Sanders.
