The San Diego Padres are going upstairs in the Pacific Coast League, even if it's a long, tough climb.

The Padres moved to a shaky first place Sunday by splitting a pair with the Portland Beavers, who ended a Padre seven-game win streak in the process.

The Padres took the first game 11-8, but a determined Beaver club pocketed the second contest 9-4.

Salt Lake, long the leader, slipped one-half game behind when the Bees took the opener of a doubleheader at Vancouver 5-4, but let the Mounties bounce back for a 4-3 triumph.

The Seattle Rainiers continued a downward escalator ride to fourth place as the league-trailing Spokane Indians buffeted the Rainiers 2-0 and 8-4 to sweep their five-game series.

The Hawaii Islanders grabbed a 1-0 second game win over Tacoma in their doubleheader after the Giants had taken the first game 2-1 for three straight triumphs.

The Padres got away with six unearned runs in the first two innings off Beaver starter Bob Giggle in the opener. That was good enough to overcome four Portland homers, two of them by manager Les Peden that were worth six runs.

But the Beavers got theirs in the nightcap. Padre starter Joe Nuxhall saw too many Beavers too fast and was sent to the showers in the third after Portland scored six runs off six hits.

A constant pursuit by the Mounties that included homers by Joe Taylor and Ray Looney failed to catch Salt Lake in the opener, but a two-run homer by Chuck Weatherspoon put the Mounties ahead in the nightcap. Al Schroll iced the contest in the late innings by containing the Bees to eight hits.

John Werhas led the Indians in their sweep over the Rainiers with two solo homers in the nightcap. Righthander Bill Bethel shut out the Seattle club in the opener on four hits.

Jose Cardenal lined one over the wall on the second pitch off Hawaii starter Ben Johnson in the opener, and the Giants sewed it up in the third when Gaylord Perry came home.

Islander Erv Palica loosed a one-hitter in the nightcap to turn the trick on Tacoma.

Hill Ready To Defend Auto Title

LE MANS, France (UPI)—Phil Hill of Santa Monica, Calif., and Olivier Gendebien of Belgium, who have teamed for three victories in the 24-hour Le Mans auto race, have different ideas about the future.

Hill, the 1961 world driving champion, is determined to make a successful defense of his title while Gendebien is bowing to his wife's wishes and retiring from competitive racing.

Hill and Gendebien, alternating at the wheel of a factory-owned Ferrari, had little trouble in registering their third Le Mans victory in the gruelling race which ended Sunday at 11 a.m. (EDT). They previously had won in 1958 and 1961.

Following the withdrawal of the Rodriguez brothers of Mexico Saturday night (they were leading at the time when their Ferrari developed a jammed gear box), Hill and Gendebien had virtually no competition as they averaged 115.176 miles per hour over the eight and one-half mile closed circuit course. They covered 2,764.2 miles during the 24-hour grind. Last year they covered 2,780 miles at an average of 116 mph.

Hill, who set a lap record of 3:57.3 on the 30th lap, said that although this race didn't count for the world driving championship, it gave him "additional confidence" for still another victory.

Of the 55 cars which started only 18 finished. The French team of Pierre Noblet and Jean Guichet was second, five laps behind the winners. They drove a Ferrari, as did Louis Dreyer of France and Jean Buerlys of Belgium, who were third.

New Regulation Set For Boaters At High Lake

All cabin cruisers on Diamond Lake equipped with "heads" must have them sealed, according to Vondis E. Miller, forest supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

This action is taken under Secretary of Agriculture Regulation U-6 authorizing the forest supervisor of a National Forest to restrict the use of National Forest lands where deemed necessary to safeguard public health, welfare, safety or convenience. The regulation will become effective July 16.

The boat borne toilets have become subject to this regulation. Since Diamond Lake is within the boundaries of the Umpqua National Forest, and is a non-navigable lake entirely surrounded by National Forest land, it has been adjudged to be subject to the jurisdiction of the Forest Service.

Miller stated that he had been concerned for some time about the amount of sewage going into Diamond Lake from the heads on the larger boats. Since Diamond Lake drains directly into the North Umpqua River, from which Roseburg and other downstream communities get their domestic water supply, every possible effort must be made to prevent pollution, the supervisor continued.

Owners of boats having heads should apply to the Forest Ranger at the Diamond Lake Information center for head sealing service.

Top Performers Spur American Track Hopes

WALNUT, Calif. (UPI)—American track and field forces, confident in the wake of outstanding performances in the National AAU meet over the week-end, prepared today to take on the world.

A 40-man United States team was named to meet Poland in Chicago this week-end and approximately the same squad will tangle with Russia at Stanford, Calif., July 21-22.

Another half dozen athletes were named to tour Europe July 1-14, with stops in Oslo, Helsinki, Zurich and London.

Good Shape

"We're in real good shape," said coach John Oelkers of Tulane, who will coach the United States team against Poland and Russia. "We've got just about every man we had hoped to have."

There were some surprises in the AAU meet, resulting in some of the top men failing to qualify for the teams set to meet Poland and Russia.

Among those, Frank Budd, recognized world record holder in the 100-yard dash, will be absent—sidelined by a leg injury. The top three javelin throwers in the country this year failed to make the grade, and John Uelses, the vaulting Marine who first cleared 16 feet, didn't come up to specifications.

But there were other saving graces.

Discus Heave

Al Oerter of the New York Athletic Club tossed the discus past the 200-foot mark twice. His best shot was 202 feet, 2 inches—one-half inch off the pending record set by a Russian.

Possibly the outstanding race of the AAU meet was the mile, where little Jim Beatty had to survive a flock of pitfalls to win in 3:57.9. Three other men in the field, Jim Grelle, Cary Weisger and Bill Dotson also bettered the four-minute standard.

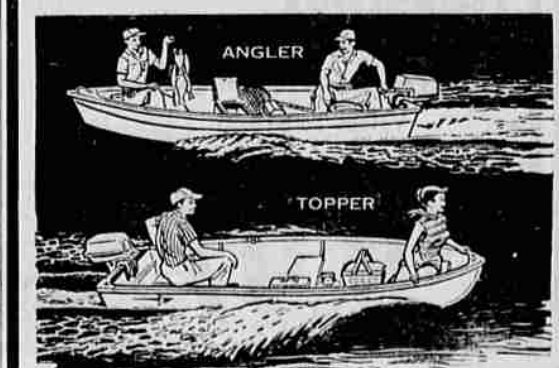
