

Russian Track Coach Sees Tight Meet With U. S. Team

MOSCOW (UPI)—The coach of the Russian track and field team today predicted a very close contest when his squad meets a United States team at Stanford, Calif., next month.

"It would be no mistake to say that our fourth match with the American team will be the most difficult," Gavril Korobkov said.

"The Americans have good coaches and good programs and we can't afford to underestimate them in any of the events."

The Russian team probably will include two men and two women who set world records this spring. The one who will be of most interest to U.S. fans is Igor Ter-Ovanesyan, who just two weeks ago soared 27 feet, 3 1/2 inches to

Weiss listed Harper No. 1 among the league's hitters, despite a higher average by Rene Friol of Spokane. Friol, however, has played in only 22 games this year as opposed to 64 for Harper.

Harper thus far has hit .337 and has racked up 13 homers.
