Roseburg Forest Scientist Awarded Doctorate By OSU

Henry J. Gratkowski, a research scientist at the Roseburg Research Center, has been awarded a Ph.D. in plant ecology from Oregon State University.

Gratkowski's doctoral thesis involved heat as a factor in germination of seeds of "ceanothus velutinus variety laevigatus." Ceano-

thus is a type of brush that will often take control of burned-over forest lands.

The thesis revealed that broadcast burning of logging slash stimulated germination of a larger number of ceanothus seeds than did burning of mechanically piled slash. Ceanothus seedlings were

Ranch Wins Suit Against SP Road

ELKO, Nev. (UPI) — Gamble Ranches, Inc., Tacoma, Wash., was awarded \$7,020 Tuesday in a suit charging the Southern Pacific Railway with violation of the uniform livestock contract.

The corporation contended Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads violated the contract while shipping 681 calves from loading points on the Union Pacific line at Heppner and Hinkle, Ore., to Tacoma. The suit against Union Pacific was dismissed.

Judge Taylor Wines found Southern Pacific delivering agents allowed the cattle to go long periods without food, water or exercise and that the cattle were unloaded in a dusty corral with no water facilities.

Gratkowski has been assigned to the research center since 1954 with temporary detail in Corvallis since 1958 while he earned his degree. The center is a unit of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station with headquarters at Portland.

Born 1919 in Scranton, Pa., he received a bachelor of science degree from Oregon State University in 1940 and a master of forestry degree from Yale University School of Forestry in 1951.

His varied career includes five years with the U.S. Government Printing Office interrupted by service in the U.S. Army from 1942 to 1946. He had been serving under the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station from July of 1951 to the present.

Gratkowski's present assignment is in brush control and brushfield reclamation research.

Marine Reservist To Take Training

Roy Cox of 516 W. Chatham Drive, Roseburg, is leaving Friday under special orders for summer training with the U.S. Marine Reserves.

The training for field artillery group commanders' staff members is being staged at Twenty Nine Palms, Calif. Cox said he would be taking part in at least two weeks of training, and possibly four.

He has been an active Marine reservist for 17 years. He is an acting first sergeant, who was instrumental last year in a mock attack on Roseburg to emphasize the vulnerability of utilities to enemy attack.

Cox, now an insurance man and candidate for county assessor, served five years overseas in World War II.

Protests Against Prayer Ruling Continue Across Country Today

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Protests against the Supreme Court's prayer-in-schools ruling continued to reverberate across the nation today.

Former presidents, members of Congress, civic organizations and religious leaders assailed the ruling as a denial of America's heritage as a "nation under God."

Here and there a voice was raised in support of the court.

Some Protestant leaders accepted the court's interpretation of the

Constitution as forbidding any state to prescribe a particular form of prayer. They urged Americans to seek other ways than rote recital of prayers in classrooms to foster the spiritual growth of children.

Jewish leaders and other minority groups welcomed the decision as a buttress to religious freedom.

But the pro voices were vastly outnumbered by cries of outrage and dismay. Roman Catholic leaders and conservative Protestants were especially distressed by the decision.

Court Is Denounced

In Congress the court was denounced in the sharpest terms that have been used since its desegregation decision of 1954. Bills were introduced in both the House and the Senate to amend the Constitution to overrule the decision.

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said there would be no immediate comment from President Kennedy. The President was certain to be asked about the ruling, however, at his news conference later today.

Former President Herbert Hoover, in New York, urged prompt enactment of a constitutional amendment permitting religious exercises in schools. He called the court's prayer ruling "a disintegration of one of the most sacred of American heritages."

At Gettysburg, Pa., former

President Dwight D. Eisenhower noted that the Declaration of Independence, adopted before the Constitution, "asserts a religious concept—that we possess certain rights as an endorsement from our Common Creator."

Former President Harry S. Truman declined to join in the denunciations of the ruling. He said only, "The Supreme Court is the interpreter of the Constitution."

Church Makes Statement

A similar position was taken by J. Irwin Miller, president of the National Council of Churches, and the Rev. Dr. Roy G. Ross, its general secretary. In a joint statement, they said:

"The Supreme Court bears the responsibility for interpreting the laws of our country. However, this does not relieve the churches, the schools and individual citizens from the imperative need for finding, within the letter and spirit of the laws of the land, ways to recognize the importance of religion and to emphasize the strong religious convictions which have been the foundation of our nation."

The relatively calm reaction of some Protestant leaders reflected their long-standing conviction that required prayers in public schools have little positive value in religious education, and may even have a negative effect in teaching children to look upon prayer as a sort of ceremonial formality.
