Interstate Deer Count Said Normal

The interstate deer herd which winters in the Devils Garden country in the Modoc National Forest in California and summers in the Fremont National Forest of Oregon showed a minimum number of just over 12,000 animals this spring. This is the number obtained from the annual track count completed on May 18 by the Oregon Game Commission and the California Department of Fish and Game.

The interstate deer herd is the only deer herd in Oregon on which an accurate count can be made. As the animals move northward across the state line over their annual migration, the track tally is made on a specially prepared strip 36 inches wide and 23 miles long. The road bed is smoothed out for track counting every 48 hours.

Although the tally is accurate, it represents the minimum number of deer migrating north. Some animals are missing during inclement weather, and where large herds cross the road only those tracks that can be definitely determined are tallied.

This year's count of 12,112 deer compares with the 16-year average of 13,319 and a count of 13,091 in 1961. The lowest count during the 16 years was in 1948 when just over 9,000 deer were tallied, while the highest count was in 1954 when just over 17,000 deer were recorded.

Nicklaus, Palmer Co-Favorites In Western Open Golf Classic

CHICAGO (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer reigned today as co-favorites as the \$50,000 Western Open golf championship got under way at Medinah Country Club.

The luck of the draw put Palmer, the defending champion, and Nicklaus, who defeated Palmer in the National Open playoff, into the same threesome along with John Barnum of Belmont, Mich.

Nicklaus was making his competitive debut as national champion. The 22-year-old powerhouse from Columbus, Ohio, dropped off the circuit after his playoff victory for a one week rest.

A total of 137 players, including seven amateurs, were entered in the 72-hole grind on Medinah's densely wooded No. 3 course where par is 71 and the experts predict few will crack it consistently over the four days.

By winning, Nicklaus could become the first player to hold both the Western Open and the West-

Bees Triumph 6-3 To Hold Slim PCL Lead

Salt Lake City topped Seattle 6-3 in Wednesday night's play while San Diego bopped Vancouver 5-3 and 6-4. As a result, Salt Lake holds down the top spot by a mere three percentage points over the Padres.

Tacoma, which also wants to get into the act, blanked Portland 4-0 to stay within four games of the top and Hawaii took Spokane 6-2 in other action.

Jim Murdock, Salt Lake City starter, got staked to a fast 6-1 lead and the Bees buzzed for three runs in the third and three more in the fourth.

However, Curt Jensen singled in two runs in the seventh for Seattle and Dave Tyrivier took over to preserve the win for Mudrock. It gives him a 3-1 mark for the season. It was the ninth straight loss for Seattle.

San Diego scored four runs in the second to take Vancouver in the opener. Bob Klaus singled in one and Tom Harper sent three more over with his 14th homer of the season.

Howie Nunn, with aid from George McWilliams, won the nightcap. Klaus had a two-run double in the fifth and the Padres pushed over the eventual winning run in the sixth on doubles by Rogelio Alvarez and catcher Hal Bevan.

Tacoma again used the home run ball to drop Portland. Ricardo Joseph belted a pair. He homered in the fourth for two runs and added a solo shot in the sixth.

Jose Cardenal provided the other Tacoma run with a solo homer as Gerry Thomas polished off his shutout with a seven-hitter.

Carlos Bernier paced Hawaii to its victory with a two-run homer and a double for three runs batted in and Bob Knop added a three-run homer.

Righthander Roger Clapp was the winner although touched for 11 hits including solo homers by Nate Oliver and pinch hitter Bob Prescott.

Blue Lake Gets Black Bass Plant

Anglers in the north Willamette valley who like to fish for large-mouth black bass can soon test their skill at Blue Lake, located near Troutdale to the east of Portland.

This is the word from Reino Moski, chief of fish librations for the game commission, who reported approximately 35,000 large-mouth black bass fingerlings released into Blue Lake last week. An additional 5,000 fingerlings were stocked into a new 4-acre pond on Sauvie Island located just across the dike on Oak Island.

The 40,000 young bass were air-transported to the game commission at Portland from the federal fish hatchery at Miles City, Mont., and made the trip without incident in plastic containers, a new method in fish transportation.

Following chemical treatment of Blue Lake two years ago, the game commission stocked around 400 adult black bass. The black crappie reproduced last year in good numbers and the offspring are now reaching 5 to 6 inches in length.

AFL Postpones Expansion Plans At Summer Meeting

BOSTON (UPI) — The infant American Football League, fearing that a headlong rush into expansion might further weaken it, has deferred at least until fall applications for three new franchises.

Officials of the 2-year-old circuit wound up their three-day summer meeting Wednesday by putting off franchise bids from New Orleans, Kansas City and Atlanta. The delaying action meant most likely that the earliest AFL expansion would be 1964.

The owners also indicated that the new franchise bidding would be opened to "other candidates" most of them unnamed, though admitting that the three formal applicants had met the league's preliminary franchise requirements.

Owners announced officially that the delay was to permit further investigation of all candidates but admitted privately that they did not feel the league's current player supply could withstand the demands of stocking one or more new teams.

While declining expansion because it would "cut too deeply into our player personnel," the league installed a unique draft program designed to strengthen its two weaklings.

Hassett Named Grid Coach For Vikings

Gerald Hassett, social studies teacher, was recently named by the Myrtle Creek school board to fill the position of head football coach for the Vikings.

Hassett will take over in place of Leroy Juelke, who resigned at the end of the 1961 season as head football coach. The new gridiron coach will continue as assistant coach at Myrtle Creek.

Hassett was recommended for the football coaching job by Forrest Loghry, Myrtle Creek athletic director. Other football coaching assignments went to Charles Sperling, junior varsity; and Roger Yorton, freshmen.

GUERIN SIGNS CONTRACT

NEW YORK (UPI) — Richie Guerin, who scored an all-time New York high of 2,303 points in 78 games last season, has signed his 1962-63 contract with the New York Knickerbockers of the National Basketball Association.

Guerin, named to the NBA All-League team at the close of last season, was sixth highest scorer in the pro circuit.

Scoring its only run in the fourth frame, the stars of yesterday got all the margin they needed for the victory. Les Bogner reached first base on an infield error and moved to second on a single by Ron Beamer. When Beamer's blow got past the right fielder Bogner scooted to third and Beamer to second. Mike Brundage drew an intentional walk, loading the bases.
