

Roberts Paces Oriole Win; Yankees Topple Twins 7-3

A courtesy telephone call to "has been" Robin Roberts is paying off for the Baltimore Orioles in the major league comeback of the year.

The 35-year-old Roberts, handed his unconditional release by the New York Yankees on May 11, left his number with Orioles' General Manager Lee MacPhail, who confessed: "The name was Robin Roberts. I didn't know how much he could have left in his arm. But I returned the call out of courtesy to his record and his reputation."

It appears today it was one of the best decisions MacPhail ever made.

Roberts, who had a 1-10 record with the Philadelphia Phillies last season and showed a composite 55.79 record over his last five seasons in the National League, turned in a five-hitter Wednesday night to pitch the Orioles to a 3-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Fourth Straight Win

It was Roberts' fourth straight win for the Orioles after losing his first two decisions, raised his mark to 4-2 for the season and, in the process, reduced his earned run average to 2.50. In 54 innings, the one-time gopher ball champ of the National League, who's become a slow curvball pitcher, has yielded only two homers to American League hitters.

Jim Gentile gave Roberts the runs he needed when he connected for his 18th and 19th homers of the season to drive in all the Orioles' runs. The White Sox

scored their run off Roberts on a single by Nelson Fox, a walk and Joe Cunningham's single.

The New York Yankees beat the Minnesota Twins, 7-3, the Detroit Tigers shut out the Cleveland Indians, 4-0, the Kansas City Athletics defeated the Washington Senators, 4-1, and the Los Angeles Angels whipped the Boston Red Sox, 3-0, in other American League games.

In the National League, the first-place San Francisco Giants downed the Cincinnati Reds, 6-3, the Los Angeles Dodgers topped the Milwaukee Braves, 6-2, the Pittsburgh Pirates shaded the New York Mets, 6-5, in 10 innings and the St. Louis Cardinals swept the Chicago Cubs, 4-0 and 8-0.

Terry Notched Ninth

Tom Tresh drove in four runs with a homer and a single and Ralph Terry pitched an eight-hitter for his ninth victory for the Yankees who handed Jim Kaat his fifth defeat. Roger Maris and Don Mincher also homered — Maris connecting for the first time since June 16.

Paul Foytack knuckled a six-hitter for his sixth win against one loss to give Detroit its victory over Dick Donovan and the Indians. The loss was Donovan's third against 11 victories. Rocky Colavito and Jerry Osborne had two hits each for the Tigers.

Ed Rakow pitched an eight-hitter behind a Kansas City attack that included two hits each by Billy Consolo and Ed Charles and Don Lee fired a five-hitter to win his third game for the Angels as Boston's Ike Delock suffered his first loss of the season.

Ed Bailey's two-run homer was the big blow in the Giants' fifth straight triumph and Felipe Alou added an insurance run with an eight-inning round-tripper. Bob Bolin shut out the Reds for the last 3-2-3 innings to win his first game while Ted Wills lost his first game.

Drysdale Matched Purkey

Don Drysdale matched Bob Purkey as the majors' top-winning pitcher at 13 victories each with a five-hit, seven-strike-out performance. Willie Davis hit a towering two-run homer and Tommy Davis singled home a run in the 7th and 7th runs of the season for the key blows of the Los Angeles offense.

Bob Skinner singled home Bill Virdon in the 10th inning as Diomedes Olivo won his third game without a loss and the Pirates dealt Roger Craig his 10th defeat for the Mets. Frank Thomas homered for the Mets.

Larry Jackson pitched a four-hitter and Ray Sadecki a five-hitter in the Cardinals' sweep of the Cubs. Charley James and Ken Boyer drove in two runs each in the first game and Carl Sawatski hit two homers in the nightcap.

Season Tickets On Sale July 2

OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY, Corvallis (Special) — Advance sale of tickets for Oregon State's 1962 football games will begin on Monday, July 2, Athletic Director R. S. "Spec" Keene announced today.

Ticket applications with detailed information will be mailed to alumni and Beaver Club members, as well as those fans on the general public list, by July 1. Others wishing this information may write or phone the OSU athletic department and applications will be mailed then.

Two season ticket plans will be in effect, including a Portland ticket for three games and a Corvallis ticket for three games. The Beavers play six home games and four on the road this fall.

The Corvallis season ticket will include games with University of Pacific, Oct. 20; Colorado State (homecoming), Nov. 17; and Oregon, Nov. 24. Price is \$13 for the three Corvallis games.

The Portland season ticket at \$12 each includes games with Iowa State, Sept. 22; Washington, Oct. 13; and West Virginia, Oct. 27. Individual reserved seat prices for those not purchasing a season ticket are \$4 for each home game, with the exception of the Oregon game which traditionally goes for \$5.

Although Homecoming usually was celebrated at the OSU-Oregon game, the associated students at OSU voted to change the date this year due to the game falling on Thanksgiving vacation — when many students will be off campus and not able to work in advance on house signs and other homecoming plans.

The Iowa State opener at Portland is the only night game, starting at 8 p.m., daylight time. All other games are at 1:30 p.m. Away games include Iowa at Iowa City, Sept. 29; Stanford at Palo Alto, Oct. 6; Washington State at Pullman, Nov. 3; and Idaho at Moscow, Nov. 10.

Chuck Hodson, a Portland cyclist took the day's top honors at the weekend motorcycle races held at the Douglas County Fairgrounds.

Hodson won the second heat of the heavyweights machines (500 cubic centimeters and over), and placed second in both the first and third heats. Sonny Burres, also of Portland, won the first and third heats. Burres is rated as the top motorcycle racer in the state.

Northwest: Columbia River bar has been good for salmon; Salmon and Alsea rivers slow for cutthroat; Molalla River and Clackamas from North Fork upstream to Austin Hot Springs have been stocked; Hills Creek Reservoir good upper end.

Southwest: Diamond Lake remains poor, Lemolo fair to good and Tokete good for brown trout; North and South Umpuquas have been planted; salmon fishing chances improving at Winchester Bay; Coos Bay also has been good.

Central: Kingsley Reservoir very good on trout; Olallie Lake excellent for trout; Deschutes River discolored but fishing has been good; East and Paulina Lakes remain good; Klamath and Agency Lakes slow; Williamson River fair for small rainbow; Odell fair for small kokanee.

Northeast: John Day River and its south fork good for rainbow; Umatilla River good for platner rainbow near the forks; Catherine Creek murky; Wallawa Lake producing excellent rainbow catches; good catches of sturgeon being made in Snake River between Hells Canyon and Pittsburg landing.

Southeast: Little Malheur and North Fork of Malheur have been stocked; Delintment lake getting weedy, but fair.
