Moose Lodge Members Plan Fireworks Display July 4

Fourth of July night fireworks display at the Douglas County Fairgrounds is now being worked out by the Roseburg Moose Lodge, under the direction of Verne Lortz, committee chairman.

Dr. George N. Lenci, whose assistance has been enlisted in handling the acquisition and shooting of the fireworks, reports that 150 mortar shells and eight attractive ground displays have been acquired and are ready for the big night designed to entertain home folks.

More than \$800, raised by the Moose, has been spent in a careful selection of the aerial pieces, which range in size from 12 to 30-inch shells, he said.

The evening program will get under way about 7 p.m. the night of the Fourth. Wayne Wagner is lining up a program of musical talent to entertain early arrivals. This will be followed at about 8:30 with a presentation of the colors, and a patriotic talk on Independence. The fireworks will start about 9 p.m. There will be an intermission around 9:30 and another hour of fireworks to follow.

Dr. Lenci said the schedule of firing for the fireworks is being carefully worked out to give the spectators a worthwhile show. Aerial pieces often will be fired in slugs of two, three or four shells at one time for more effective display pattern.

The eight ground displays will include pin wheels, fancy gerbs (jetting fountains), a large group of roman candle batteries, the traditional American flag, and a 75-foot-high "Niagara Falls." A special Moose emblem design has also been ordered specially made.

Dr. Lenci said he will have about 20 assistants helping with the firing, including four handling set pieces. An intercom system will help coordinate the program. His chief assistant will be Warren Woodruff.
