### Beavers Drop Seattle In Sunday PCL Play

The San Diego Padres showed the Tacoma Giants how it's done Sunday when they went through four Giant pitchers to command a 2-6 win in the first game of their doubleheader.

But the Tacoma club, short on pride and long on spirit, came back in the nightcap for a surprising 7-4 verdict over the league leading Padres.

Hawaii jumped ahead to fourth place in the league by bombing last place Spokane 16-1 in the nightcap after edging out a 7-5 triumph in the opener.

In Seattle the Rainiers tumbled down into the second division by dropping their third straight to Portland, 9-1. In 13 outings the Rainiers have slipped from a tie for first place to a gloomy No. six berth.

## Kamloops Eggs Placed In Umpqua Reservoirs

Approximately 2,215,000 eyed trout eggs have been planted in the reservoirs on the Umpqua River, reports Jerry Bauer, game department biologist.

The eggs are those of Kamloops trout spawned at the Diamond Lake hatchery. Plants of 1,045,000 eggs were made in the North Umpqua and tributaries above Toketee, 50,000 above Soda Springs and 250,000 at Copeland Creek.

The Game Commission took 21-100,000 eggs at Diamond Lake, Bauer reports.

**Fish Planted**  
Kamloops trout were planted in the lake after it had been treated for the removal of trash fish. But the introduction of this species of fish was not as successful as had been expected. The lake now is being planted to native rainbow trout and the Kamloops are to be removed.

This year's egg take was widely distributed. A good many eggs were shipped out of Oregon, but several million also have been released in various impoundments. Klamath Lake, Drews, Odell and Crescent were among Oregon impoundments given supplemental plantings.

In the Umpqua plants, eggs were fertilized at the Diamond Lake hatchery and were kept until eyed. They then were removed to the gravel beds—natural spawning areas. Artificial redds were built

holes dug into the gravel, eggs placed, and lightly covered. Sunk sections of culvert pipe were used to assist in planting eggs. It is anticipated the fish will be spawned by natural process.

**Commission Unhappy**  
The Game Commission has been quite unhappy with the Diamond Lake situation, explains Bauer, who is the biologist in charge of the North Umpqua activities.

The Kamloops species has not developed in the lake nearly as well as had been anticipated. Because of late spawning it has not been a satisfactory fishing spot in the early part of the season.

The 1960 plant, which should be furnishing approximately 80 per cent of this year's creel catch, for some unknown reason seems to be a total loss, Bauer says. The 1961 plant is said to be in fair shape. It will provide much of next year's fishery.

This year's plant totalled 450,000 rainbow trout—the native variety. Fish three and one-half to four inches in length planted the first week in May now are almost six inches long, Bauer says. Plants of 150,000 fish were made in June and July, and these fish, too, seem to be doing very well, Bauer reports.

However, the loss of the 1960 plant is being keenly felt and the catch is below that anticipated for this year.

## Second Session Of 'Learn To Swim' Plan Set To Begin July 10 At Roseburg Pool

The second session of the Red Cross "Learn to Swim" program will begin July 10 at the Roseburg Municipal Pool.

Registration for the classes will be held July 5-6 between 2 and 5 p.m. at the pool. Also beginning July 10 are junior and senior life saving classes, and an adult "Learn to Swim" session.

The classes will begin at 10:30 in the morning for swimmers and intermediates, with beginning boys set to swim between 11 and 11:45. Beginner girls will be in the pool from 11:45 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Youngsters 7 years of age are now being accepted into the program.

The junior life saving classes will run from 4 to 5 p.m., while the senior life saving and adult swim lessons will be held from 5 to 7 in the evening.

Skipping July 4, the first session of the "Learn to Swim" program will end July 7. The make-up lessons will be July 7, starting at 8 a.m.

Larry Lerno, pool director, reports that the pool is in constant use from 8:30 a.m. until 9 p.m. each day. Lerno also stated the pool is in the best condition it has been in for several years. The water is kept extremely sanitary in both the wading pool and the main pool.

A new addition to the swimming pool area is the concession stand built and operated by the Swim Team Parents Association. The concession stand is kept open throughout the day — during lessons, during recreational swimming and during meets.

Lerno, coach of the Roseburg Swim team, announced that the first home swim meet of the season will be July 7 when Grants Pass and Medford invade the local pool. The triangular meet is scheduled to start at 10 a.m., following the completion of the make-up "Learn to Swim" lessons.
