

4,000 Spectators Make This Year's Yoncalla Rodeo Most Successful In History Of Local Event

About 4,000 people turned out for the two-day Yoncalla Rodeo Tuesday and Wednesday to make it one of the most successful in the 17-year history of the event.

And to make the event even more successful, it was a Douglas County man who ran away with the all-around cowboy honors. He is Todd Tennent, a member

of the Glide Ropers. Tennent claimed \$160 for high score in the amateur event.

Tennent's strong event was team roping. He doubled with two partners to claim first and third in the event Tuesday, and called on the aid of one of the partners, Bill Cox, Wednesday to claim second. He and Cox were high aver-

age for the two days in the team roping.

The only thing to mar the rodeo was an accident in which Dick Klotzback of Corvallis was thrown from a bull and taken to Cottage Grove Hospital. He was being transferred today to a hospital in Corvallis. Hospital authorities said he had suffered no fractures and was generally in good condition.

Contractor Rushes Astoria Span Plans

NEW YORK (UPI) — De Long Corp., recently awarded a \$7.8 million contract to build bridges for the Astoria — Megler bridge near the mouth of the Columbia River, said today it was rushing preparation of a production schedule for the Oregon Highway Commission.

"However, we can't yet make public any tentative starting date for the work or estimate of the manpower we will have to hire," Executive Vice President George Tait said.

De Long, which has been in business since 1946, is a widely known construction firm, which has engaged in many large marine projects both on its own and as joint ventures with other big

It built the first offshore radar Texas Tower off Cape Cod, Mass., in 1953. It was recently engaged with other contractors in the \$20 million Hyperion outfall sewer at Santa Monica, Calif.

De Long also has built large marine piers for the New African Republic of Togoland.

It is partner with a French contracting firm in a continuing venture building large offshore oil installations in the Persian Gulf for Pan-American Oil Co., a subsidiary of Standard Oil Co. (Indiana).

Principal owner and president of the firm is L. B. De Long, a native of Texas who now has homes in Seattle and New York.

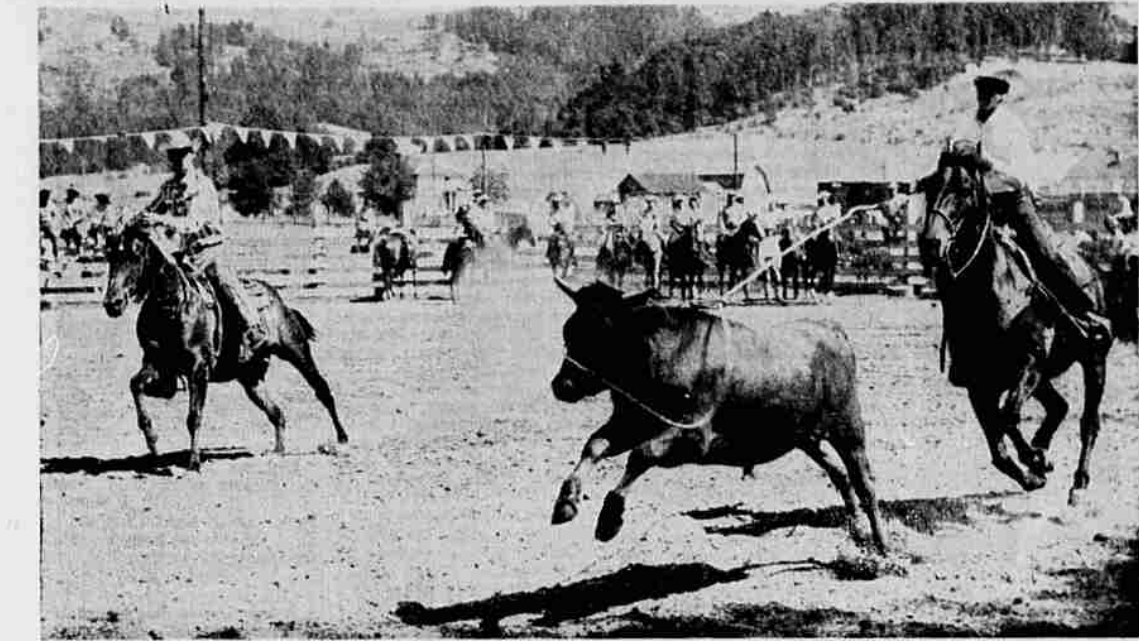

Tentative Meet Set In Iron Workers' Strike

PORTLAND (UPI) — A federal mediator said today a tentative meeting has been scheduled Monday between striking Iron Workers and contractors in an attempt to settle the dispute which has crippled construction in many areas of Oregon and southwest Washington.

Mediator George Walker said this morning the meeting had not firmed up but that it was hoped to have one either here or in Seattle. Iron workers also are on strike in the Seattle area and in Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho.

Picketing concentrated today in the Willamette Valley. John J. O'Halloran, business agent and secretary of Iron Workers Local 29, said all jobs in the Willamette General Contractors area were being picketed "with practically 100 per cent success."

The strike started late in May when negotiations for a three-year contract broke down.

O'Halloran said "We are ready to meet, either here or in Seattle."

The strike has affected some \$6 million worth of work in the Corvallis area and at state institutions in the Salem area, in addition to work shut down earlier including the Hilton Hotel and Standard Plaza in Portland.

The union recently rejected an employer proposal to submit the dispute to the National Joint Board of Appeals.

Winston Minister Helps Plan Confab

Rev. Ralph Helseth, Winston, has helped plan the 14th annual Town and Country Church conference at Oregon State University Aug. 6 through 10 by serving on the planning committee, according to Rev. Kenneth C. Larson, Corvallis, conference chairman.

The committee has planned a completely "new look" for this year's conference, with the emphasis on continuing education for the clergy, church and community leaders and others interested in the town and country church, the Rev. Mr. Larson reports.

The program will center around basic courses in communications, changes in Oregon agriculture and forestry and the implications of community change.

In addition, general sessions are planned each day on such subjects as the changing concept of the family farm, rural areas development, resources of the land grant institution, family income management, community action through farm and home organizations and music. Several elective classes will also be offered each day.

Housing and meals will be provided on the OSU campus with special arrangements being made for family groups. A Corvallis church will provide nursery and child care at cost during conference sessions.
