

Angels, Dodgers Lead In Respective Leagues

Fools rush in where angels fear to tread, so will the real genius who picked both Los Angeles clubs please stand up?
C'mon, now, don't be bashful. That pennant parlay of yours may have looked foolish four months ago but you're certainly entitled to a bow now that the Fourth of July milestone is past and both the Angels and Dodgers are in first place.

A word of caution, though. You better bring proof. Bill Rigney, the skeptical and at the same time ecstatic manager of the amazing Angels, feels no one in the world picked his club to win the American League pennant.

He may be right. But that didn't stop him from bubbling over and mischievously inquiring "how do we stand now?" after the Angels swept a doubleheader from the Washington Senators, 4-2 and 4-1 Wednesday.

Angels On Top
Great Kidding, that Rigney. He knew the Angels were on top by a half game. So did a happy, noisy throng of fans and city officials, who turned out at International Airport in Los Angeles Wednesday night to welcome the club back from a road trip on which it won 14 of 22 games.

Not bad for a team that was put together out of a grab bag only 22 months ago and finished eighth last year. Effective relief pitching did it for the Angels in Wednesday's double victory. Young Dean Chance came on in the seventh inning to save Ken McBride's seventh consecutive victory in the opener and 40-year-old Art Fowler slammed the door on the Senators in the nightcap.

Lee Thomas, socked his 11th homer in the first game and Leon Wagner his 24th to help Ted Bowsfield to victory in the second game.

The Dodgers maintained their half-game lead in the National League with 16-1 and 7-3 triumphs over the Philadelphia Phillies.

Koufax Threw Five-Hitter
Sandy (no-hit) Koufax turned in a five-hitter and struck out 10 for his 12th win in the opener. Frank Howard made Koufax' job easy by driving in five runs with a single and a double. Tommy Davis knocked in three runs in the nightcap with a homer and two singles as rookie Joe Moeller won his sixth game.

In the AL, the Yankees dropped into second place by splitting a doubleheader with the A's. Kansas City won the opener, 11-1, then lost the nightcap, 7-3. Cleveland took two from Detroit, 1-0, in 10 innings, and 6-2, in 13 innings; Minnesota split with Boston, 8-4, and the Red Sox the nightcap, 9-5, and the Baltimore Orioles beat the Chicago White Sox, 7-3, in the first game, but lost the second, 5-2.

The second-place San Francisco Giants stayed close at the Dodgers' heels in the NL with 11-4 and 10-3 victories over the New York Mets; the Cincinnati Reds defeated the Chicago Cubs 8-6; Milwaukee won its suspended game with St. Louis, 7-5, but the Cardinals then blanked the Braves, 2-0, and the Pittsburgh Pirates swept both ends from the Houston Colts, 7-0 and 4-3.

Opener No Contest
The opener between the A's and Yankees was no contest, with Kansas City rapping out 16 hits, including a homer, triple and two singles by Jerry Lumpe to back up Diego Segui's six-hit pitching.

It was a different story in the nightcap, though, as Mickey Vernon clouted two homers and Roger Maris and Clete Boyer one each to give the Yanks a split. Maris now has 15 homers and Maris 19.

Gene Green's 10th inning pinch single gave the Indians their first game victory after Jim Perry and Hank Aguirre of the Tigers had duelled through nine scoreless frames, and Don Dillard's grand slam in the 13th off Jerry Casale decided the nightcap, which was credited to Gary Bell.

Lou Clinton's hitting featured the Boston-Minnesota split. The Red Sox outfielder collected seven consecutive hits, including two homers during the twin-bill. Bob Allison's three-run homer and a solo shot by Vic Power highlighted the Twins' victory in the opener.

Lumberjills Toppled 5-1 By Dairy Maids
The Roseburg Lumberjills fell victim to the Rogue River Dairy Maids Wednesday at Camp White, as they dropped a 5-1 decision.

McCovey blasted his two homers and drove in seven runs in the opener, with Mays contributing a two-run triple. Mays socked his two homers in the nightcap to ease the way for Billy O'Dell's 10th triumph. Bob Bolin ran his record to 3-9 in the opener.

Hank Foiles' three-run homer sparked the Reds to their victory over the Cubs. Foiles' blow came in the fifth inning and gave the Reds an 8-1 lead but Jim Brosnan still had to come on in the eighth to save Jim Maloney's third victory.

Homer Beat Cards
Eddie Mathews' two-run homer in the ninth inning was the Braves' margin of victory over the Cardinals in the resumption of Tuesday's suspended game, but in the regularly scheduled contest that followed, Ernie Broglio held the Braves to three hits and Ken Boyer drove in both runs off loser Warren Spahn with his 14th homer and a single.

The Pirates' two victories gave them a record of nine wins in their last 10 games. Vern Law scattered eight hits in the opener as Pittsburgh hopped on Houston starter Bob Bruce for three runs in the first inning. Dick Groat and Don Leppert each had three hits in the nightcap, which R.O.Y. Face had to save for Earl Francis when the Colts rallied for two runs in the ninth.

Lone American Seeks Revenge In Net Classic

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI)—Karen Hantze Susman of San Antonio, Tex., will be gunning for revenge when she meets England's Ann Haydon today in the women's singles semi-finals of the Wimbledon tennis championships.

The other semi-final pits Vera Sukova, an unseeded Czechoslovakian, against two-time champion Maria Bueno of Brazil.

Mrs. Susman, the last American survivor in either singles division, lost to Miss Haydon in this year's Wightman Cup matches.

Mrs. Susman also wants to get even with Miss Haydon for knocking out teammate Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., out of the tournament. Miss Moffitt, who upset top-seeded Margaret Smith of Australia in the second round, dropped a 6-3, 6-1 decision to Miss Haydon in Tuesday's quarterfinals.

Mrs. Sukova also reached the semi-finals at the expense of an American — surprising second-seeded Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif., 6-4, 6-3. Mrs. Susman advanced with a 6-4, 6-4, victory over Renee Schuurman of South Africa and Miss Bueno, the champion here in 1959 and 1960, defeated Lesley Turner of Australia, 2-6, 6-4, 6-2.

Australia's Rod Laver reached the men's singles final Wednesday for the fourth consecutive year — a feat unmatched in the past half a century — by downing compatriot Neale Fraser, 10-8, 6-1, 7-5.

American tennis prestige suffered another jolt when Chuck McKinley of St. Ann, Mo., and Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., the U.S. doubles champions, were beaten in the quarterfinals by a pair of unseeded Yugoslavians, Bora Jovanovic and Nicola Pietrangeli, 4-6, 6-2, 8-6, 6-2.

In the women's doubles, Miss Hard and Miss Bueno reached the semi-finals by ousting Miss Turner and Jan Lehane of Australia, 4-6, 6-2, 6-3. They were joined by Miss Smith and Justina Bricksa of St. Louis, Mo., who defeated Mrs. Pierre Darmon of France and Jill Blackman of Australia, 6-4, 6-2.
