S. Umpqua, Jackson Creek Roads Will Get Anti-Dust Treatment

Additional applications of dust-retarding chemical will be applied to portions of both the main South Umpqua rd. and the Jackson Creek rd. beginning Monday, reports Mrs. Milton Hammersly, correspondent.

The Bay Chemical Co. of Tacoma is contractor for the job which is expected to take about four days to complete.

Plans call for starting application at 4 a.m., and continuing to 11 a.m., with probably one lane of road closed temporarily during those times, according to D. E. Godbey of the Forest Service, contracting officer at the Tiller Ranger Station. Traffic will be somewhat slowed and drivers are asked to use caution while the project is being carried out. Godbey said that signs will give advance warnings of the areas involved and that flagmen will be on duty.

Short stretches of both roads have been subjected to treatment with dry calcium chloride in recent weeks, and elimination of perhaps 80 per cent of usual dust has been noted to date.

On the Jackson Creek road, a distance of three miles from its intersection with the South Umpqua Road has already received the dry treatment, and the contractor will proceed from there to the Deep Cut bridge, a distance of about 6.2 miles, with calcium chloride in solution.

Under the current contract, application of a dust oil coat will commence on the South Umpqua Road where the blacktop now ends near the National Plywood mill-site and continue for 2.2 miles. Then calcium chloride in solution will be applied for another 3-mile stretch from Dumont Creek bridge to near Boulder Creek bridge which received the dry calcium chloride application.

The result will be total distances of 9.2 miles of Jackson Creek Rd. and 8.2 miles of the South Umpqua Road treated with dust retardants. Future road treatments will depend on what is learned from these applications, Godbey said.

Poison Oak Recognition Outlined With Bulletin

Poison oak that plagues summer picnickers in Western Oregon is also becoming an increasing problem to suburban families pushing out into Oregon's wooded areas.

Children and others unaware of the danger are often attracted to the glossy green leaves that take on brilliant hues in the fall and may appeal to newcomers for house decoration.

People vary greatly in their susceptibility to skin irritation from poison oak — from near immunity to cases requiring medical care, reports Rex Warren, Oregon State University extension farm crops specialist.

Ways to recognize and control poison oak are outlined by Warren in a bulletin published by OSU Extension Service. Oregon residents may obtain free copies of the bulletin, "Poison Oak," from local county extension offices or the OSU bulletin center, Corvallis.

The bulletin includes colored illustrations of both green and fall foliage, plant blossoms, and berries to help readers learn to recognize poison oak at various seasons. Brief instructions are given for care of skin following exposure to poison oak.

Rains Lash Japan

TOKYO (UPI) — The heaviest rains of the year lashed Central and Southern Japan Thursday, causing floods and death-dealing landslides for the third consecutive day.
