

Wall, Still Share Lead In Buick Open Tourney

GRAND BLANC, Mich. (UPI) — Art Wall, the 1959 leading money winner who has been fighting illness and injury since that banner year, and Ken Still, a Texas-born pro, today shared the lead going into the second round of the \$52,000 Buick Open golf championship.

They shot three under par 69's over the long Warwick Hills Country Club Thursday. And while it stood them in good stead for the long run, the golfer who picked up the marbles in the first round was Butch Baird, another Texas pro.

Baird shot a hole-in-one, despite the fact his caddy gave him a longer club than he called for, and won a \$5,200 Buick. His ace came on the 203-yard third hole, where he holed out a two iron tee shot although he had asked his caddy for a three-iron.

"I guess he knew better," said the 25-year-old Baird, who has earned some \$8,000 on the tour this year. Baird didn't carry

on too well from there and wound up a 76.

Wall, with nines of 34-35 and Still, with 34 going out and 35 coming home, were one stroke ahead of six other pros — Bill Collins, Canadian Stan Leonard, Johnny Pott, Bob Goetz, Paul Harney and Dave Hill. They all beat Warwick's 35-35-72 par for the 7,280-yard course by two strokes.

Eleven players were only two strokes back with 71's — Dave Ragan, Jerry Barber, Bob Goalt, Ken Venturi, Charles Sifford, Peter Cooper, Tony Lemay, Jack McGowan, Larry Mowry, Bill Bondeson, and Bob McCallister.

There were nine at even par 72 including the leading amateur, Bob Littler, an 18-year-old Ohio University student; Jim Ferree, Gene Bone, Bob Shave, Al Geiberger, Bob Harrison, George Bayer, Juan Rodriguez, and Rex Baxter.

Defending champion Jackie Burke was far back with a 77. Mike Souhak, the 1960 winner, had a 76 and Billy Casper, who won it in 1958, had a 74.

AMA Approved Cycle Race Set

U.S. Crews Enter Race Against Odds

HENLEY, England (UPI) — Three American crews faced overwhelming odds today in the Grand Challenge and Thames Cup rowing competitions in the Henley Royal Regatta.

The University of Pennsylvania met the Grand Challenge favorite, the European champion Moto-Guzzi crew of Italy, in a semi-final round. Moto-Guzzi eliminated Yale from the competition Thursday.

The Detroit Boat Club took on the National Provincial Bankers, who have set some of the fastest pre-race times, while Washington-Lee High School of Arlington, Va., met the Argosies Rowing Club of England in another quarter-final Thames Cup test.

Two other New England entries, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Phillips Academy of Andover, Mass., joined Yale in defeat Thursday.

Penn was impressive in scoring a 2½ length victory over the Thames Rowing Club, stroking one-mile, 570-yard Thames River course in six minutes, 44 seconds.

Detroit outlasted the Lady Margaret club by a length after trailing for the first half-mile, the Washington-Lee schoolboys also encountered difficulty as they almost allowed the Tideway Club to draw even before spurring ahead for a three-quarter length triumph.

The Moto-Guzzi eight-oared crew was too much for Yale. The Italians raced to a two-length verdict and eclipsed Penn's time for the distance with a clocking of 6:35.0.

National Provincial clipped two seconds off Harvard's record when it beat MIT by 1½ lengths in 6:37.0. Argosies' eight-man gang recorded a 6:54.0 finish as it topped Phillips by 1½ lengths.

Eaton, a Roseburg driver, will be out to add to his 131 point total Saturday when the hardtops circle the track again. To stay in the lead among the top 10 drivers, Eaton racked up 26 points in last week's action.

Don Hein, defending champ at the Roseburg Speedway, rests in second place behind Eaton, Hein, also of Roseburg, has 107 points. Third place driver is Bud Dix of Cottage Grove with 97 points.

The closest race is between the fifth and sixth place runners in the point standings. John Barron, Roseburg, holds down fifth place with 77 points, while Don Nuzum, Tenmile, is sixth with 76 points.

Barron and Nuzum traveled to Coos Bay for special holiday races July 4 and brought home most of the honors. Barron set fast time, won the A trophy dash, the fourth heat race and the A Main. Nuzum won the second and third heat races, and placed third in the A Main.

All the drivers currently among the top 10 in the point standings will be in action when the hardtops roll Saturday. Time trials Saturday are set for 7:30 p.m., with the races to start at 8.

Karen Susman Reaches Finals In Net Classic

WIMBLEDON, England (UPI) — Rod Laver, Australia's red-haired dynamo, is a strong favorite to whip compatriot Marty Mulligan today in the Wimbledon men's final and move a step closer to a unique tennis "grand slam."

Laver already has captured the Australian and French championships this year. If the 23-year-old Aussie wins as expected today, he will need only the U.S. crown to round out his "slam."

In the long history of tennis, only one other player — Don Budge — won all four titles in the same year. The lanky American redhead turned the trick in 1938.

The United States will be represented in the women's singles final Saturday for the first time in three years when Karen Hantze Susman of San Antonio, Tex., meets Vera Sukova of Czechoslovakia.

Mrs. Susman, only 19, defeated England's Ann Haydon, 8-6, 6-1, and the 30-year-old Mrs. Sukova ousted two-time champion Maria Esther Bueno of Brazil, 6-5, 6-3, in Thursday's semifinals. It was the second straight upset scored by Mrs. Sukova. She eliminated U.S. champion Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif., in the quarter-finals.

In the women's doubles, Mrs. Susman and Billie Jean Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., reached the semifinal round with a 6-1, 6-4 victory over Valerie Forbes and Heather Segal of South Africa. They were joined in the same round by Justina Bricka of St. Louis, Mo., and Margaret Smith of Australia, who downed Edda Budding of Germany and Angela Mortimer of England, 6-2, 6-3.
