Dubious Blessing

Gambler Gets Credit For New Cash Cache

JERSEY CITY, N. J. (UPI) — Police found \$168,675.52 casually banked in a garage Friday only a block from where \$2.4 million in cash was discovered Tuesday. Jailed gambler Thomas (Newsboy) Moriarty was again tapped as the owner.

Hudson County Prosecutor Lawrence A. Whipple declared, "I'm positive it belongs to Moriarty." This new assignment of wealth to the glumly silent 52-year-old numbers operator who is serving a 2-to-3 year prison could be just as dubious a blessing as when federal agents said he owned the \$2.4 million cache.

Firstly, Hudson County staked its own claim to the \$168,675.52 in currency ranging from change up to bundled \$100 bills, rather than turn it over to federal authorities like the \$2.4 million.

Whipple then said he was going before a county grand jury Tuesday to seek an indictment against Moriarty. He said the charges would be up to the grand jury, but indicated the 45 dates bags of numbers slips and bet records, adding machines, and a loaded gun found with the money would give the jury a variety of charges to ponder.

Finally, the Internal Revenue Service filed tax liens totaling \$2.4 million against Moriarty on the basis of the \$2.4 million. Which means if he laid claim to the money or could be proved the owner, he could end up owing the government another \$1 million.

Gambler squad detectives, under orders to check garages as a result of the multi-million-dollar find by workmen, discovered the \$168,675.52 crammed into two shopping bags in a boarded-up garage just a block from the original find.

Whipple said three X-ray films with Moriarty's name on them were found with the money, linking the gambler with the cache.

Kidnap Alleged

Utah Police Hold Eugene Man After Service Station Holdup

COALVILLE, Utah (UPI) — A man who allegedly made a teenage girl drive him toward Chicago at gunpoint and then held up a service station to get money for the trip was in jail today.

Charged with robbery and grand larceny was Earl Lynn Smith, 22, Eugene, Ore. A preliminary hearing was set for July 27 where bail was set at \$25,000. He was in the Salt Lake County Jail in Salt Lake City.

The captive chauffeur for the trip which got Smith to Echo Reservoir before a highway patrol trooper with a shotgun stopped the car was Kay Welch, 18. She was not harmed, and said the man was "quite polite" although he pointed a 22-caliber pistol at her when he commandeered her car in front of the Salt Lake post office Friday morning.

The holdup occurred at a service station at Wanship in Eastern Utah where Smith allegedly took \$68 from the till and then herded the station operator, Raymond Pack, 63, a California tourist couple and their daughter and an Idaho man into a room and made them take off their clothes. When they first hesitated he fired a shot in the ceiling.

Then he forced Miss Welch back into her car and they headed for Coalville. There trooper Don Facer stopped them at shotgun point, recovered the money, and freed Miss Welch.

She said her captor said he wanted to get to Chicago "to get a cop who sent my brother up."

Smith said today that his story of going to Chicago to "get" the policeman was not true. "I just wanted to go to Chicago," he said.

The suspect said he "just got tired" of working in a Eugene gas station and took an auto and left. He said he abandoned the car in Reno and caught a bus to Salt Lake.

Smith said he arrived about 3 a.m. in the morning and just walked around until he picked up the girl, who he said "just happened to be the first one to come out alone and walk toward a car."

He added: "I would not hurt the girl. I was seeking a private or small airport. I can fly a plane. I would have left the girl either at the airport or state line. I would not have forced her to go out of Utah."

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Kennedy's Father Out Of Hospital

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — President Kennedy's father was discharged today from the New York hospital where he was convalescing from a paralytic stroke and joined the family at their summer home here.

The Chief Executive greeted his 73-year-old father, former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, at the local airport and drove him to the family's vacation residence.

Kennedy sat behind the wheel of his white convertible, his father beside him.

According to a bulletin issued by the elder Kennedy's doctors, his "general physical condition is satisfactory."

The former envoy's stroke last Dec. 19 deprived him of ability to walk or talk. Today's report said "he is now able to walk with the aid of a cane and his speech is improved."

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger read to newsmen the report on the President's father, issued by Dr. Howard A. Rusk, director of the New York University Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation.

Kennedy's father had been there for two months.

"Mr. Kennedy will spend the summer at his home in Hyannis Port, Mass., where prescribed therapy will be continued," the report said.

The President's father was accompanied from New York by a niece, Miss Ann Gargan, and a physician whom Salinger did not immediately identify.

The elder Kennedy was admitted to the New York hospital April 29 to undergo therapy. He suffered the stroke at the family residence in Palm Beach, Fla.

The former ambassador, who only a month or so ago was restricted to a wheelchair, walked down the ramp of the plane with the aid of his cane, but otherwise unassisted.

Melrose Fires Keep DFPA Crews Busy

Fires in the Melrose area kept the Roseburg Douglas Forest Protective crew busy early today.

At 2:30 a.m. the crew was called to the Roy Cork home on Orchard Lane off Cleveland Hill Rd. where his barn was reported burning.

The structure, containing some hay and a calf belonging to Michael Wooton, burned to the ground. Both hay and calf were destroyed.

According to the DFPA, Cork was apparently asleep when the fire was raging and didn't notice it until most of the barn was gone. There is no estimate or cause of the fire.

Cork could not be reached today since he is in the process of moving to Prineville.

At 5 a.m. the DFPA crew was called again to Orchard Lane to the home of Clyde Yarbrough, next door to the Corks.

The garage and a woodpile were burning.

Members of the DFPA saved the house, close to the garage, a pickup truck and a trailer house. A car in the garage was destroyed.

There was no estimate of damage. Cause of the fire is not known.

It is not known whether insurance was carried on any of the damaged property.

Roth Re-Elected

Oregon GOP Stages First Convention In 54 Years

BEND (UPI)—Oregon Republicans held a state convention here today, the first one in more than 54 years, and drafted a statement of principles required by a 1961 law the Democrats don't like either.

The GOP also elected state officers.

Returned to office by unanimous vote by the GOP State Central Committee were Phil Roth, Portland, chairman; Mrs. Forrest Hedges, Grants Pass, secretary.

A fight developed over vice chairman between incumbent Mrs. Helen Daugherty, Portland, and Mrs. Della Campbell, Salem, with Mrs. Campbell, wife of a physician, defeating Mrs. Daugherty on the third ballot, 29-11. They were tied 20-20 on the first two ballots.

Republicans in Oregon have not been enthusiastic about the state convention idea. The postprimary law is what emerged from last legislature after an attempt by the Democrats to set up pre-primary conventions was vetoed.

Police said the boys admitted leaving Woodburn on June 21. They said they had been living in strawberry fields and old abandoned cabins since their escape and had taken odd jobs to earn money.

Inside And Out

Khedda Opposition Threatens Turmoil In Freed Algeria

ALGIERS (UPI) — Opposition to Premier Ben Youssef Ben Khedda mounted both inside and outside Algeria today and threatened to plunge the newly independent nation into more turmoil.

While Ben Khedda came under attack from dissident ministers and guerrillas of the Algerian National Liberation Army (ALN), the premier's Provisional Government (GPRA) accused neighboring Morocco of grabbing part of the oil-rich Sahara, key to the economic future of Algeria.

In the Western port city of Oran, French security forces joined Nationalist army soldiers in patrols to prevent a recurrence of shooting and clashes which killed 95 persons and injured 163 others Thursday during independence celebrations.

The GPRA blamed the Oran slaughter on "Fascist provocateurs, the last remnants of the OAS." The OAS is the outlawed Secret Army Organization, an organization of European extremists who tried to block Algerian independence with widespread terrorism.

In an apparent attempt to heal the rift between Algerian leaders, Dr. Chawki Mostefai, National Liberation Front (FLN) representative on the temporary ruling executive, flew to Rabat, Morocco, for talks with Mohammed Khider, the GPRA state minister who resigned because of differences with Ben Khedda.

Mohammed Ben Bella, the widely popular GPRA vice premier who also split with Ben Khedda, was expected in Rabat shortly from Cairo. Ben Bella and Khider broke with Ben Khedda when the premier fired three ALN staff officers shortly before independence was declared on July 3.

In Rabat Friday, Khider accused Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba of interfering with ALN troops stationed in Tunisia in an effort to help Ben Khedda. He claimed Bourguiba had cut off supplies to the estimated 30,000 ALN troops still in Tunisia.

ALN guerrillas who crossed into Algeria from Tunisia Friday denounced the GPRA. Referring to Ben Khedda's dismissal of their commanders, they described themselves as the "headless spearheads of the revolution."

The reaction was the same among ALN troops at Oujda, Morocco, near the Algerian border.

The big blast also launched the sudden flurry of two-day testing which indicated a stopped up program of nuclear firings at this sprawling desert range 61 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

Unofficially, an AEC spokesman admitted there was a possibility of a nuclear explosion involving tanks and troops at the test site next week. He did not elaborate.

Most of the radioactivity from today's two shots, an AEC spokesman said, would fall within a few miles of the firing site and inside the Las Vegas bombing and gunnery range. However, atomic scientists said they would monitor radioactivity "up to a distance of 300 miles from the shot point to gain information on the limits of detectability."

SEATTLE (UPI)—Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., Friday introduced legislation designed to help the lumber industry regain and expand its domestic markets while looking for new markets.

The bill would provide for a broadened research program to be financed by placing 30 per cent of duties collected on imported forest products in a special fund. The fund would be used by the secretary of commerce.

The bill is similar to the Kennedy-Saltonstall Act which Congress adopted to help the fishing industry.

Chimney Fall Fatal To California Youth

PORTLAND (UPI)—A college student from California was killed early today when he fell 208 feet from the chimney of a 14-story Portland apartment building.

The Multnomah County coroner identified the victim as George Joseph Salzer, 20, of Los Angeles, Calif.

A companion, John Whitehouse of Portland, told authorities they climbed the fire escape to the top of the Ione Plaza building "to take a look at the view."

Neither one lived in the building.

Whitehouse told police Salzer climbed 30 feet up a ladder to the top of the chimney, which has a six-foot square opening. He tumbled into the opening and plummeted all the way to the sub-basement.

Salzer, a University of Oregon student, was employed by a lumber products company here during the summer.

The PP&L executive reported the construction of the 100-mile-long section of the 230,000-volt capacity network for the Copco Division power system, went into service Friday following energizing tests of the Medford-to-Roseburg facility.

Built at a cost of \$2 million, the line reaches from the Lone Pine substation near Medford to the big Dixonville substation near Roseburg and completes the large capacity transmission system needed to transfer large amounts of electric power from the company's hydroelectric plants on the Rogue, Klamath and Umpqua rivers to load centers of southern Oregon and northern California.

"A quarter of a million homes could be supplied at one time with the amount of energy this new work can now deliver to all sections of the Copco Division of Pacific Power," Frank Bash, vice president and Copco division manager reported.

Other sections of the 230,000-volt network were completed earlier, Bash said.

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Unconfirmed Reports Say 94 Are Dead

BOMBAY, India (UPI)—Search officials said today they had unconfirmed reports that a missing Alitalia intercontinental DC8 jet airliner with 94 persons aboard crashed into a hillside at Knapoli, 40 miles from Poona. The reports said there were no survivors.

Poona is about 75 miles south-east of Bombay.

The officials said Alitalia's Bombay manager was on his way to the scene to personally check the crash reports.

Meanwhile, the wreckage of an Indian air force Canberra which disappeared while searching for the missing Alitalia plane was found near Aurangabad, 175 miles southeast of Bombay.

Headed For Landing

The Italian plane disappeared while flying through monsoon-whipped skies headed for an instrument landing at Santa Cruz Airport in Bombay.

The plane, which had been delivered to Alitalia airlines less than four months ago, vanished barely minutes before it was scheduled to land at the rain and wind swept airport. It was commanded by one of the airline's veteran pilots.

It was not immediately known whether any Americans were aboard.

The plane carried 85 passengers and a crew of nine.

There was some early confusion about the number of persons aboard. Airline officials here said the plane carried 94 persons, but Alitalia's Rome headquarters first said there were 95, then 93, and finally 94.

Runway Overshot

It was feared the huge Douglas-built jet overshot the runway and plunged into the monsoon-driven waters of the nearby Arabian Sea. Air, sea and ground search operations were hampered by the weather.

Despite the rain and low sea clouds, four Indian air force jets and an Indian Airlines Skymaster swept over the sea and adjacent land areas for hours. A helicopter and an Indian navy ship joined the search during the afternoon.

Police over a 200-mile-wide area were alerted to be on the lookout for the missing aircraft.

But the hours passed without any report on the Alitalia airliner.

The plane was last reported over Aurangabad, about 200 miles east of Bombay. It then had about 90 minutes of fuel left.

Nationalities Not Known

The nationalities of the passengers were not immediately known. Thirty-seven boarded the DC8 in Australia, 21 came aboard at Singapore, and 27 embarked at Bangkok, the airline said.
