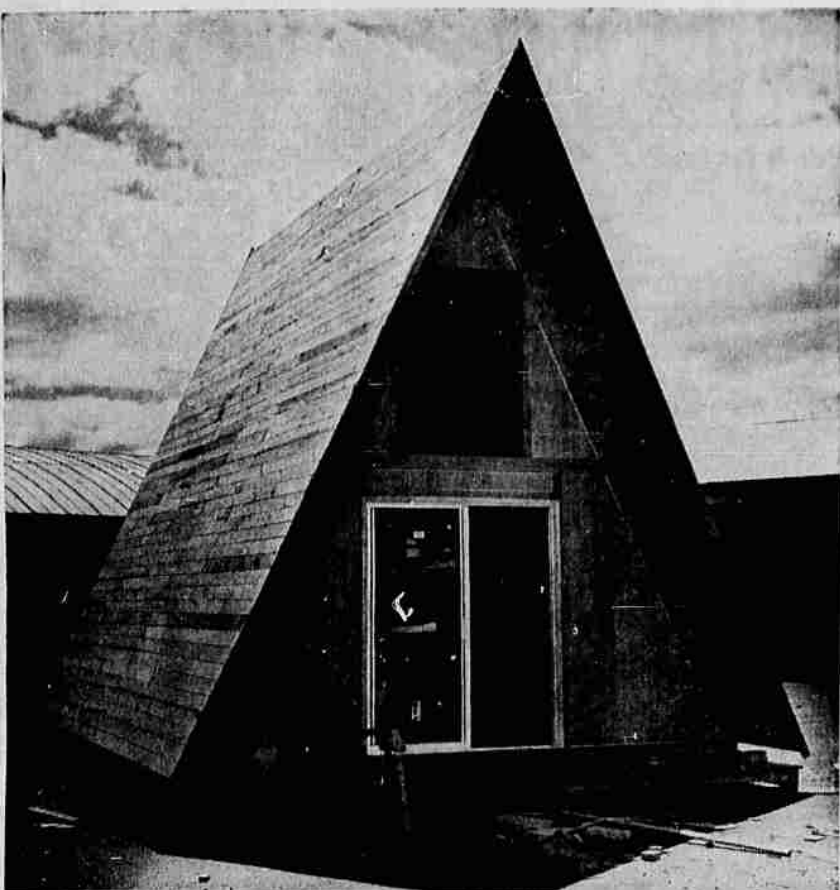

Tom Tom Restaurant Newest Local Eating Establishment

Roseburg's newest eating establishment, the Tom Tom Restaurant, erected on property of the Garden Valley Shopping Center, will probably open next week, offering 24-hour service.

It is the third major business of the shopping center, which also includes the large Drive-In Market and a Shell Oil Co. service station.

The Tom Tom features both drive-in and inside counter and booth service.

For the drive-in, covered areas can accommodate 20 cars. Each station is equipped with telephone direct to a central switchboard inside the restaurant for speedy service.

Lease Operators
Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Waldron, formerly of Lebanon, are lease operators of the restaurant. It was built by the Garden Valley Shopping Center, Inc., for lease to Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Absher of Albany, who own the Tom Tom Restaurants, Inc. They turn are sub-leasing to the Waldrons.

The name Tom Tom Drive-In originated in Albany. It comes from the drum used by North American Indians to beat out the rhythm of their war, victory and hunting dances.

The teepee decor of the main entrance represents the lodges in which the Indians lived, and the wagon wheel light fixtures draw

inspiration from the wagon trains which opened up the west, said Absher. The picture used on the front of the menu portrays a young Indian brave dancing a hunting dance before he goes out to kill buffalo.

The building was built by Todd Building Co., and the architect was Van Svarverud, representing Hay-Slip & Tuft, Portland.

Seating For 92 Persons
The interior has seating capacity for 92 persons at booths and counter. While no provisions are made for banquets, accommodations can be arranged for groups up to about 20 in a curtained section.

The restaurant is 50 by 60 feet in size, with a 100-foot long by 40-foot wide drive-in area. Each station is covered with aluminum and plastic curved tops, for protection from both sun and rain.

The telephone system can increase service to customers by an estimated three times that of conventional drive-in service, said Absher.

The restaurant is entirely air conditioned. The latest kitchen equipment includes installation of an electronic oven, which can cook

Employment In Douglas Remains High In June

Employment in Douglas County continued stable during the month of June a report today indicated. F. C. Riley, manager of the Roseburg office of the state Department of Employment, noted stability in his monthly report on work availability.

"Although there were impending threats of shutdowns because of labor disputes, none developed during June," he said.

Economy Affected
"However, this did have an adverse effect on the general economy, particularly the retail and wholesale trades," Riley continued. He explained customers appear-

ed reluctant to spend in the light of unsettled conditions.

New job applications during June in the local office totaled 442 compared with 486 in June 1961. In May of this year 374 new job applications were received.

Non-agricultural job placements in June totaled 183 compared with 171 in May and 163 in June 1961.

Riley noted that initial claims during June dropped to 321 from 492 in May and 394 in June 1961.

The average weekly number of persons claiming a week of joblessness in June was 470 compared with 591 in May and 635 in June 1961.

Unemployment Low

Riley's report shows the Roseburg area unemployment to be a low percentage compared to the average covered employment of the area. In the case of June the percentage is lower than the state average.

For the week ending June 21 the percentage of unemployment in the area was 3.4 compared with the state's 3.6.

Four weeks ago the area's percentage was 4.2 while the state's was 3.7. A year ago the area percentage was 4.3 while the state's was 4.2.

Employment Service Assists Young People

During June 262 young people, 19-years-old and under, registered for work with the Roseburg office of the state Department of Employment.

F. C. Riley, Roseburg office manager, said of the 183 job placements made during the month by his office, 27 were under 20 years of age. Of this number 19 persons were 1962 high school graduates.

Riley said undoubtedly many young people secured employment other than through his office.

"While this still leaves many young people unemployed, it is a favorable response to our efforts in assisting them to find suitable employment," he said.

He asked persons knowing of jobs for young people to contact his office.

In the general work picture he said employment should continue at a seasonal high for the next 30 to 60 days.

Wooley Will Coordinate IP Lumber Cutting Sales

Milton G. Wooley has been named lumber cutting-sales coordinator, announced H. G. Reents, manager of manufacturing for the Long-Bell Division of International Paper.

Wooley began his new duties July 1. He was formerly lumber sales and cutting supervisor at the company's Vaughn branch. He will continue most of his former duties in addition to his new job, and will continue to be headquartered at Vaughn.

Purpose of the new appointment, said Reents, is to better coordinate lumber cutting practices with marketing for the company's Vaughn and Gardiner, Ore., and Chelchie, Wash., operations.

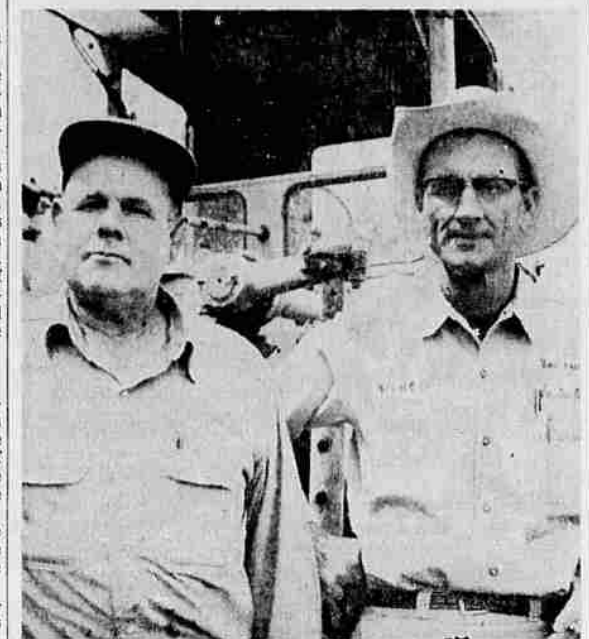

15 County Building Permits Issued For Total \$378,300

Fifteen Douglas County building permits with a total value of \$378,300 were issued during June, to bring the six-month total close to one million dollars, according to the monthly report of county building coordinator James E. Slattery.

The Evans Products Co. expansion program accounted for a large part of the June total. This includes \$206,000 for a building expansion and \$4,000 for enlargement of the offices. The new structures are part of the company's planned expansion which will represent an investment of upwards of 1½ million dollars and more than double the plant capacity, as well as add charging facilities and an enlarged loading area.

Permit for \$96,000 issued for construction of a new Roseburg Country Club building, which will provide larger and improved quarters, dining and entertainment facilities and a swimming pool.

The Green substation fire hall of the Roseburg Rural Fire Department, permit was for \$30,000.

Paul Jackson obtained a permit for \$8,500 for an addition to the warehouse of Paul Jackson Wholesale, and Orchard Trailer Park, Winston Star Rd., obtained an \$800 permit for a warehouse, as the only two commercial building permits.

Five new dwelling permits were issued to: D. E. Gibby, Rt. 1, Box 10, Roseburg, for a home just off Rifle Range Rd.; Barney L.

Powers, 333 W. Hickory St., home on Page Rd.; Homer Padford, Rt. 1, Riddle, on Canyonville Riddle Rd.; and John Baggett, Roseburg, on Little River Rd., one mile north of Happy Valley Rd., and Paul W. Shaddock, Elkton, off NW Garden Valley Rd. near Cleveland Rapids.

January permits numbered 9 for \$45,335; February, 13 for \$19,771; March, 13 for \$84,978; April, 15 for \$101,388; and May, 22 for \$337,950; and June, 15 for \$378,300.

New Laundromat Opened Saturday In Glide Building

A new type of business was launched in Glide last Saturday, when Mr. and Mrs. James E. Wilson opened the doors of their new Glide Laundromat, located on the North Umpqua highway in a new \$13,000 building owned by Lynn Beckley. It was built on his Lone Rock Market building site, 50 feet east of the Glide Barber Shop. Business hours are 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week.

The Wilsons installed \$27,000 worth of equipment which includes 12 washing machines of 8-pound capacity; 1 washer of 25-pound capacity with 50-pound extractor; 6 50-pound dryers and 2 dry cleaning machines of 8-pound capacity. All are coin operated machines. Additional equipment includes the coin changing machine, a liquid starch puff machine for fluffing certain clothes, metal tables for folding clothes, dispensers of soap, starch, bleach and borax; scales for weighing clothes and a utility sink. The separate boiler room contains a 550-gallon hot water tank and two boilers. There are 1,500 square feet of cement floor covered by inoleum and rest room for the benefit of the customers.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson have lived in Glide 2½ years. They formerly were residents of Roseburg for seven years, where Wilson was employed as a millwright after spending nine years in the U.S. Navy as boiler man chief. He is presently employed at the Eugene Veneer in Glide.

Contractor Set To Build Homes In W. Roseburg

Leo E. Kowalewski, Roseburg general and electrical contractor, today announced he is planning a \$3 million subdivision of middle and upper-middle income class homes in West Roseburg.

The announcement came on the heels of a report that he had purchased property owned by Floyd Grecian of Eureka, Calif., for some 90 homesites.

The property is located south and west of Mar's Market. Price of the sale was not disclosed.

Kowalewski says his plans for the property will include subdividing into approximately 90 homesites for homes ranging in price from \$15,500 to \$40,000.

He said paved streets with gutters, sewer and water are to be included. It is also planned to service each residence with underground power and telephone service, if feasible, Kowalewski said. This would eliminate need for power poles.

Topography warrants numerous designs for the houses, he continued. Designs will include ranch, colonial and split-level houses, each design to be different.

Preliminary plans are now being drawn for presentation to the Roseburg Planning Commission.

Kowalewski said he plans to secure local financing for development and construction of future homes whenever possible.

Snappy Service Takes Management Of Timber Grill

The Timber Grill, located in the Grand Hotel Building on SE Cass Ave., is now under new management.

Snappy Service, which operates restaurants in Roseburg, Eugene and Coos Bay, has taken over the operation. The Timber Grill name will not be changed.

Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Knight, who manage Snappy Service Cafe No. 5, will also manage the new restaurant.

They stated that some of the personnel will be retained, but that the kitchen will be under the direction of Virgil Leaton, who will be chef for both restaurants.

The same policy of "snappy" service, with similar menu and other features of the Snappy Service cafes will be maintained, they said.

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
