

Central Point Slayer Draws Death Sentence

MEDFORD (UPI)—Leeroy Sanford McGahuey was sentenced to die in the Oregon prison gas chamber Aug. 20 by Jackson County Circuit Judge James M. Bain Monday.

McGahuey showed no emotion as he was sentenced, but earlier he had requested to speak with the judge in private. His request was denied, since statements in criminal cases must be made public, the judge said.

No date has been set by the Jackson County sheriff's office to return McGahuey to the state penitentiary, but it is expected to be within the week.

McGahuey was found guilty of

the first degree murder of a child in Central Point last year. In May the state Supreme Court upheld the conviction. The jury did not recommend life imprisonment instead of the death penalty.

In no event, however, shall the payment rates for each quarter be less than the base rates as stated above. When the adjusted rates by species are lower than the base rates, the difference between the total dollar value of the timber cut at adjusted rates and at base rates will be recorded for each species. The stumpage rate for a species will not be increased above the base rate until the subsequent adjusted rates above the base rate will develop an accumulated total dollar value for the species in excess of the recorded accumulated difference. Shakespearean Festival Opens With 'Will Tribe Feast' July 21

All Oregon Shakespearean Festival rehearsals in Ashland were closed to the public on Monday.

The annual closing measure is occasioned by the many involved adjustments which must be made before the season opens. The theatre's 22nd repertory run gets under way July 21, with the Feast of the Tribe of Will in Lithia Park at 6 p.m. and the first showing of "Comedy of Errors" at 8:30 p.m.

Monday marked the beginning of the complex four-day phase known as "technical rehearsals." On that date, the four shows shifted for the first time into their regular rotation order, with one show being worked each day. The emphasis during the four-day period is on technical detail. Sound cues are set; lights are adjusted; musical timing is perfected; and all of the mechanical problems of scene changes and curtain manipulation are solved.

Several crew members and department heads are involved with the technical rehearsal phase. It is a slow process, with frequent stops, starts, and repeats. Communication between those responsible is much easier without spectators, hence the yearly house closure at this time.

On Friday the first round of dress rehearsals begins on the Ashland Stage. The four programs—"Comedy of Errors," "Henry IV, Part II," "As You Like It," and "Coriolanus"—will each have an afternoon run-through and a full evening dress rehearsal during the following four days. This round is also closed to all spectators.

July 17, final dress rehearsals will begin. This four-day schedule is open to those holding festival memberships. Special guests from press, radio and television will also be invited to attend.

Good seats for all performances may still be purchased.

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Solons Seeking Compromise On Aid To Red Countries

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional leaders planned a series of meetings today in an effort to find a compromise in the House that will allow the United States to provide some aid to certain Communist countries.

Key congressmen of both parties decided to meet behind closed doors after President Kennedy asked them not to tie his hands in the cold war.

The administration feared that the House, in an election year, would end all U.S. aid to such countries as Poland and Yugoslavia.

The congressional leaders are seeking an amendment that will voice strong congressional opposition to aiding Communist countries but at the same time allow the President to give assistance when the United States can take advantage of cracks in the Iron Curtain.

Rep. Bob Casey, D-Tex., already has announced his determination to win House approval of his amendment to ban American aid to any Communist country under any circumstance.

Casey's proposal drew immediate fire from Rep. Cornelius E. Gallagher, D-N.J., he said it would prevent the President from helping any nations to split away from the Communist bloc.

Other congressional news: Medicare: The Senate planned to continue debate on a medical care for the aged while it agreed to a showdown vote for next Tuesday on a bipartisan compromise plan. Several Republican sponsored alternative plans are still pending. These are expected to be disposed of before the vote next week. The administration backed compromise plan calls for a program to be financed through Social Security.

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
