Attorney General Draws New Blast From Governor

SALEM (UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield said today that Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton has "recklessly sought by innuendo to cast doubt on the integrity of the highest court in Oregon."

At the same time, Hatfield called Thornton's record in office "deplorable."

Hatfield said that a news release issued by Thornton Tuesday inferred that the state Supreme Court has been influenced by politics in deciding cases where, as Thornton said, "political power or control in the state was at stake."

Hatfield and Thornton are the Republican and Democratic candidates for governor in November. The controversial sentence in Thornton's news release said:

"If you were to take out the cases where political power or control in the state was at stake, such as the secretary of state dispute, the Elmo Smith voters' pamphlet matter, the liquor commission investigation case, etc., our 'batting average' would be even more impressive."

Thornton was defending the percentage of cases involving Thornton's office that have been affirmed by the high court in the more than nine years that Thornton has been attorney general.

Thornton rested on that statement today, but added that in the secretary of state dispute in 1958, "Mr. Hatfield announced the decision over a Portland radio station before the court did."

This was the ruling which affirmed Hatfield's appointment of Howell Appling Jr. as secretary over the appointment of Dave O'Hara as secretary by outgoing Democratic Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Hatfield declared that Thornton has been making attacks on the high court in private, and Hatfield has ignored them, but "as governor of this state, I cannot ignore such irresponsible charges now made public."

"The Oregon Supreme Court," Hatfield said, "composed of judges of integrity and with backgrounds in both political parties, has long demonstrated its posture above partisan politics. This is in the highest tradition of impartial justice, and that confidence by the people of Oregon should be maintained."

Dobrynin To Get Rusk Bid For Conference On Berlin

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Officials said today that Secretary of State Dean Rusk is inviting Soviet Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin to a conference late this week for another try at narrowing the East-West gap on the Berlin issue.

The invitation assumed increased importance in the light of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's declaration Tuesday that the Berlin situation was growing "ever more ominous."

Rusk was understood to have two principal aims in calling for another talk in the marathon series which has taken place be-

between Soviet and American officials in Washington, New York, Moscow and Geneva during the past 10 months. He wants to find out whether:

—The Russians at last are willing to drop their demand for Allied evacuation of Berlin and get down to sincere discussion of some face-saving and tension-easing new arrangement for Allied access to red-encircled West Berlin.

—The Russians intend to accept a June 25 Allied proposal for Big Four — U.S., British, French and Soviet — talks in Berlin to find some way to end the shootings and other incidents along the Communist-erected wall dividing the city.

U.S. officials acknowledged that the so-far-futile Soviet-American Berlin talks might well grind to an end within the next few weeks unless there is some break in the stalemate. The deadline remains as tight as ever after the State Department Tuesday publicly rejected a Khrushchev proposal to replace Allied garrisons in West Berlin with troops from Norway and Denmark or Belgium and The Netherlands, plus units from Czechoslovakia and Poland.

Art Group Plans Display On Street

The Roseburg Art Association has been given permission to rope off the southwest portion of SE Jackson St. between SE Lane and SE Cass avenues on July 28 for the purpose of presenting a street display of art.

The City Council approved the request on recommendation of Police Chief John Truett.

Truett said the display will take up the parking area and west lane of traffic adjacent to Eagles Park. The east traffic lane will remain open.

Hours of the display are scheduled 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. The association request was made by Arthur Rich.

Yoncalla Board Opens School Supplies Bids

The Yoncalla School Board at a recent meeting opened bids on school supplies, janitorial supplies and musical instruments.

Northern School Supplies Co. bid of \$2,414 was accepted for bleachers. There was no bid submitted on repairs to the grade school gym and it was decided to contact several local people available for work of this sort and contract the job locally.

Several applications have been received for positions in the high school, according to Mrs. George Edes, correspondent, and the board voted to offer contracts to the applicants.

West Laker Pleads Guilty To Assault - Battery Count

Peter Oluf Peterson, 22, of West Lake, was sentenced to one year in the Douglas County jail after pleading guilty in Circuit Court Tuesday to a charge of assault and battery.

Judge Charles S. Woodrich ordered that the defendant be admitted to probation after serving 30 days of the sentence.

Peterson was arraigned on a district attorney's information charging him with assault and battery upon the person of Ralph Jerome Bair on Dec. 22, 1961. He waived Grand Jury hearing and entered a plea of guilty on arraignment Tuesday.

Appeal Dismissed
Judge Woodrich dismissed an appeal from Riddle Municipal Court involving the conviction of Roger Reece Hutchinson on a charge of driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicants.

Judge Woodrich dismissed the appeal on a motion by the defendant's attorney and remanded the case back to Riddle Municipal Court for execution of sentence. Hutchinson was charged in a citation issued March 18. He pleaded innocent in the Riddle court and requested a jury trial which was held May 3. The jury returned a guilty verdict.

The defendant was fined \$150 and received a suspended two-day jail sentence. Conviction carried the mandatory 90-day suspension of driving privilege. This sentence remains in force for the defendant.

Sarah B. Child

Funeral services were held in San Francisco today for Sarah B. Child, 88, former resident of Roseburg.

Mrs. Child was the founder of the '95 Mental Culture Club, predecessor of the Roseburg Woman's Club. A substantial financial donation made possible the building now occupied by the local club. She also contributed to the Roseburg Public Library fund.

Born in San Francisco, where she spent her early life, she was married to George R. Child, an early day merchant and investor in Roseburg. Mr. Child was associated with the late J. F. Barker in several business and property enterprises.

Mrs. Child's father owned a substantial piece of farm property in what is now a business section of San Francisco, abutting Mission Street. This property, administered following her father's death by attorney Alexander T. Morrison, who was married to Mrs. Child's sister, produced considerable wealth and the formation of a trust fund from which several millions of dollars have gone to civic, educational, religious and other major contributions.

Following her husband's death, Mrs. Child made her home at 2000 California street in San Francisco, but she spent her summers in Roseburg until her age and health stopped her annual visitations a few years ago.

She became suddenly ill late last week, was removed to a hospital where her death occurred Monday. No close relatives survive.

Services were held at 11 a.m. today at N. Gray and Co. Mortuary, Divisadero and Post streets, San Francisco.

Forest Service Gets Control Of Acreage

President Kennedy Tuesday signed a House bill giving the U.S. Forest Service, rather than the Bureau of Land Management, control of acreage acquired by the government within the exterior boundaries of national forests.

Umpqua National Forest supervisor Vondis Miller in Roseburg today said this probably applies to land which has been secured from a private source for some public project, such as a dam.

He said it was apparently designed to clear up possible confusion in which the land might be considered public domain land, which in most cases would be considered under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management. The BLM generally administers public domain.

Sutherlin House Burns To Ground

A new home under construction on Plat M Rd. 1/4-mile west of Sutherlin on Highway 225 burned to the ground early this morning.

The house was being built by Robinson Building Supply Co. of Sutherlin. The loss was estimated at \$8,000.

The Douglas County Sheriff's Department was conducting an investigation to determine cause of the fire which as yet is unknown.

Deputies said the home was a ready for roof and siding installation. The fire apparently started sometime between 1 a.m. and 2 a.m., deputies said.
