

Decision Of First Lady's Stepfather Rattles The Teacups In Opposing Camps

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A suburban zoning controversy involving Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's girlhood home on the Potomac has touched off one of the angriest well-bred rows in Washington's New Frontier history.

The dispute involves a move to convert the McLean, Va., estate of Merrywood into a luxury apartment development. It has split some of the nation's powerful political and socially prominent figures into opposing camps.

The decision of Mrs. Kennedy's stepfather, Hugh D. Auchincloss, to sell the 46-acre river estate to an apartment builder has rattled

the teacups and sharpened the conversations in the nation's capital.

It has brought a storm of protest from some McLean property

owners that has had reverberations in the Fairfax County Board and on Capitol Hill.

Despite the fire of neighbors and friends, Auchincloss, a millionaire

broker, is standing firm in his intention to sell Merrywood to build a new Sheldon Magazine, who will share his interest with a syndicate. Magazine will have 50 per cent interest in the purchase. The three other members of the syndicate will share the other 50 per cent. They are Fairfax County Sheriff John Taylor, attorney Lytton H. Gibson, and William Page, a car dealer.

The syndicate signed an option to buy Merrywood within nine months for about \$650,000. Plans call for three 17-story apartment buildings and 50 luxury town-

houses on the fenced-in grounds that have long been a landmark of Washington society.

The syndicate members expect to build the project on the banks of the Potomac at a cost of about \$16 million.

One nearby McLean resident is Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, who has stayed out of the fight thus far.

Would Block Project

But a bill which would block the Merrywood apartment construction has been introduced by Rep. Henry I. Reuss, D-Wis., a staunch conservationist. It has been referred to Robert Kennedy's Justice Department and other agencies for an opinion.

In addition to the Reuss bill, Rep. Joel Broyhill, R-Va., has submitted legislation which would impose federal control over all constructions along the Potomac River from Great Falls to Mount Vernon—a distance of 20 miles.

Two prominent outdoorsmen—Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas—added their voices in support of McLean's protesting residents.

Udall, a McLean resident, expressed concern that approval of lower apartments on the Potomac would destroy the beauty of the area. Douglas called the proposed apartments "destructive of the river's shoreline beauty."

At the county level, 16 McLean residents have filed a suit to reverse the rezoning, and the court action may impede arrangements for financing. But the builders are confident the case will be resolved in their favor before January.

Hollywood Needn't Fear Big-Star Films Being Made In Washington

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House:

There is a series of motion pictures in Washington that were made at a low budget by Hollywood standards but have big-star value that the film capital would have trouble matching.

However, the movie industry need have no fear of competition from these productions. They will never be released to the public, and only a handful of people ever will see them.

The attractions: Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's home movies of herself, her President-husband, their 4-year-old daughter, Caroline, and their 19-month-old son, John Jr.

Mrs. Kennedy has been building a considerable collection of these 8-millimeter reels, capturing such active moments as her water-skiing at Newport, R.I., and horseback riding at Middleburg, Va. Caroline's activities in the saddle at the latter site also have been filmed for Mrs. Kennedy's collection, although the First Lady was understood to have been angered by newspaper publication of some shots of her daughter in a pony show.

These are not the only films starring Mrs. Kennedy that are having limited distribution. There

also are the U. S. Information Agency's (USIA) color movies of her trip to India and Pakistan.

Because of a law which bans any propagandizing by the USIA in this country, the American public will never see the magnificent documentaries on the trip which were produced for that agency at a cost to the taxpayers of more than \$100,000. Overseas, many millions of people will view the films, which have drawn raves from newsmen and officials allowed to witness them here.

But except for select groups of family and friends, no one will set eyes on the First Lady's home movies, photographed for her by friends, relatives, and White House aides.

Resenting intrusion into her private life and seeking to have her children grow up as unspoiled as possible, Mrs. Kennedy has tried to keep Caroline and little John far out of professional camera range.

But like any other mother, she wants a photographic record of their growing up. Her home movies and personal albums are chock full of Kennedy family episodes that may never be shared with outsiders.
