

Saskatchewan Premier Says Anti-Medicare Rally Failed

REGINA, Sask. (UPI) — The Socialist government of Premier Woodrow S. Lloyd Wednesday night dismissed an anti-medicare rally, staged by "Keep Our Doctors" (KOD) committees as a failure and said the government would not be influenced by the demonstration.

The premier also charged that organizers of the rally had "strong political motivations."

Police estimated about 4,000 persons converged on the capital here Wednesday to attend the anti-government protest outside the legislative buildings. Lloyd told a news conference later that

his sources indicated attendance was "between 2,500 and 3,000" persons.

The premier told newsmen the rally was "not a particularly representative showing of the people of Saskatchewan."

Thirty minutes before the rally was to begin, Bert McKay, KOD provincial president, was admitted to Regina General Hospital believed suffering from a heart attack.

The owner-publisher of the Mosaic (Sask.) Spectator was reported "resting comfortably" Wednesday night.

Lloyd met Wednesday with a 12-man delegation of KOD officials and, according to Rodney Thomson, spokesman for the group, agreed to "study" (KOD) the petition and reply as soon as possible.

KOD has asked an immediate suspension of the Medicare Insurance Act as a basis for resumption of normal practice and negotiations between the government and the doctors.

Lloyd told his news conference the petition would get "due consideration" but said the government's position was unchanged. He charged that KOD leaders had "strong political leanings, not favorable to the government."

Hatfield, Morse Reject Report They've Made A Campaign Deal

SALEM (UPI)—GOP Gov. Mark Hatfield and Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., today rejected a national-ly published report that they have made a deal not to campaign for each other's opponent in the November election.

The idea, the article states, is to promote victories for each other.

Hatfield called this "inaccurate and unfounded." In Washington, D.C., Morse did likewise.

The report is contained in the July issue of "USA*1," a news magazine published in New York. The article, by Jonathan Rinehart, is titled "Favorite Son From Oregon," and is about Hatfield.

Rinehart wrote that "There is a silent but solid gentlemen's agreement between ticket leaders Morse and Hatfield not to campaign seriously against each other on behalf of their otherwise weak tickets."

Hatfield's Democratic opponent for re-election is Atty. Gen. Robert V. Thornton. Morse's GOP opponent for re-election is Sig Unander, former state treasurer from Portland.

The article includes a picture of Morse and Hatfield taken after a private conference between them in the capitol here last year.

At a news conference afterward, the two veteran political foes stressed cooperation for the state's common good, adding their meeting was "fruitful" and harmonious. They said they discussed various issues affecting Oregon, and cited some of them.

Meetings between Morse and Hatfield are rare, and newsmen couldn't remember seeing the two more cordial to one another.

In Rinehart's article, based on recent interviews with Hatfield and others, the caption under the Morse-Hatfield picture says an "odd truce prevails this year between Morse and Hatfield. In a maneuver that would seem outlandish outside Oregon, they

agreed in effect to let each other win."

Hatfield said "I would join with Sen. Morse in denying the report as 'inaccurate and unfounded.' He also complained about what he described as other "unfounded facts" in the article, but he did not specify what they were.

Morse said there is "no truth" in the story about any truce.

"Neither Gov. Hatfield nor I would betray our respective responsibilities to our party ticket," he said. "I have made clear that I am supporting the Democratic ticket and Gov. Hatfield has made clear that he is supporting the Republican ticket."

French Demand Confidence Vote

PARIS (UPI)—The French government demanded a vote of confidence today on President Charles de Gaulle's independent nuclear striking force.

Premier Georges Pompidou demanded that Parliament support his supplementary budget which contains large sums of money for nuclear development.

No vote on the issue is expected before next Monday. But even some government officials believed enough strength might be mustered to overthrow Pompidou's government.

Should this happen, De Gaulle's position would not be affected. He would remain as president. His position is not affected by votes in the National Assembly.

Woes Pile Up Against Land Developers

More trouble is stacking up for the Senior Citizens Land Development Co. which planned to operate the Grand and Rose hotels in Roseburg as senior residences.

Jack Withers has filed a complaint in Douglas County Circuit Court asking award of \$17,314.94 as amount alleged due on a promissory note executed by the parties Dec. 7, 1961, plus attorney fees, costs and disbursements.

The plaintiff's complaint states the note was to be paid from leases sold in the Grand Manor (as the senior residence was to be renamed) or, at completion of the Grand Manor remodeling project, from an over-all financing loan.

Plaintiff contends the defendant has abandoned all efforts to sell leases in the Grand Manor, to complete the remodeling work and to obtain an over-all financing loan.

Withers alleges the note, principal and interest are now due and payable.

This was the third legal action involving the firm in recent weeks. Charges of false representation in a stock trade were recently filed in federal court at Portland against the same group by the Reliance National Investors Corp. of Salt Lake City.

And in Circuit Court, transcript of an appeal from District Court was filed July 2 by Paul and Henrietta Van de Velde, plaintiffs in a suit against the Senior Citizens Land Development Co. Defendant won verdict in a case in which the plaintiffs asked award of \$800 for a grand piano which they claimed was converted to the defendant's own use and sold.

Navy Reduces Size Of Boardman Zone

PENDLETON (UPI)—The U.S. Navy agreed Wednesday to reduce the size of an air approach corridor to its new east Boardman bombing range.

The corridor, one of three, would have placed a restriction on certain traffic on a major flight airway between Pendleton and Portland.

Opposition at the Federal Aviation Agency hearing came from United Airlines, Morrow County agricultural interests and the Oregon Pilots Association.

The opposition was withdrawn after the navy agreed to the reduction in size of the southwest corridor.

Commander Roger Nelson of the Whidby Island Naval Air Station said the reduction in size of the corridor was subject to approval by Washington, D.C.

Sam Mallicoate, director of the state department of planning and development, said he was hopeful that final approval between the Navy and the FAA could go through within 45 to 60 days.

Mallicoate felt this would allow the navy to move to the east part of the range and therefore allow the Boeing Company of Seattle to take possession of the west half of the range for static testing of missiles.

Grass Fire Doused

The Roseburg Rural Fire Department extinguished a small grass fire at 3:05 p.m. Wednesday at 98B NE Rifle Range Rd. Firemen said it was started by children playing with matches. There was no damage.

Iron Strike Talks To Resume Friday

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon's iron workers dispute drew even with the longest construction strike in the state's history today, on a note of hope that something would be resolved when talks resume Friday.

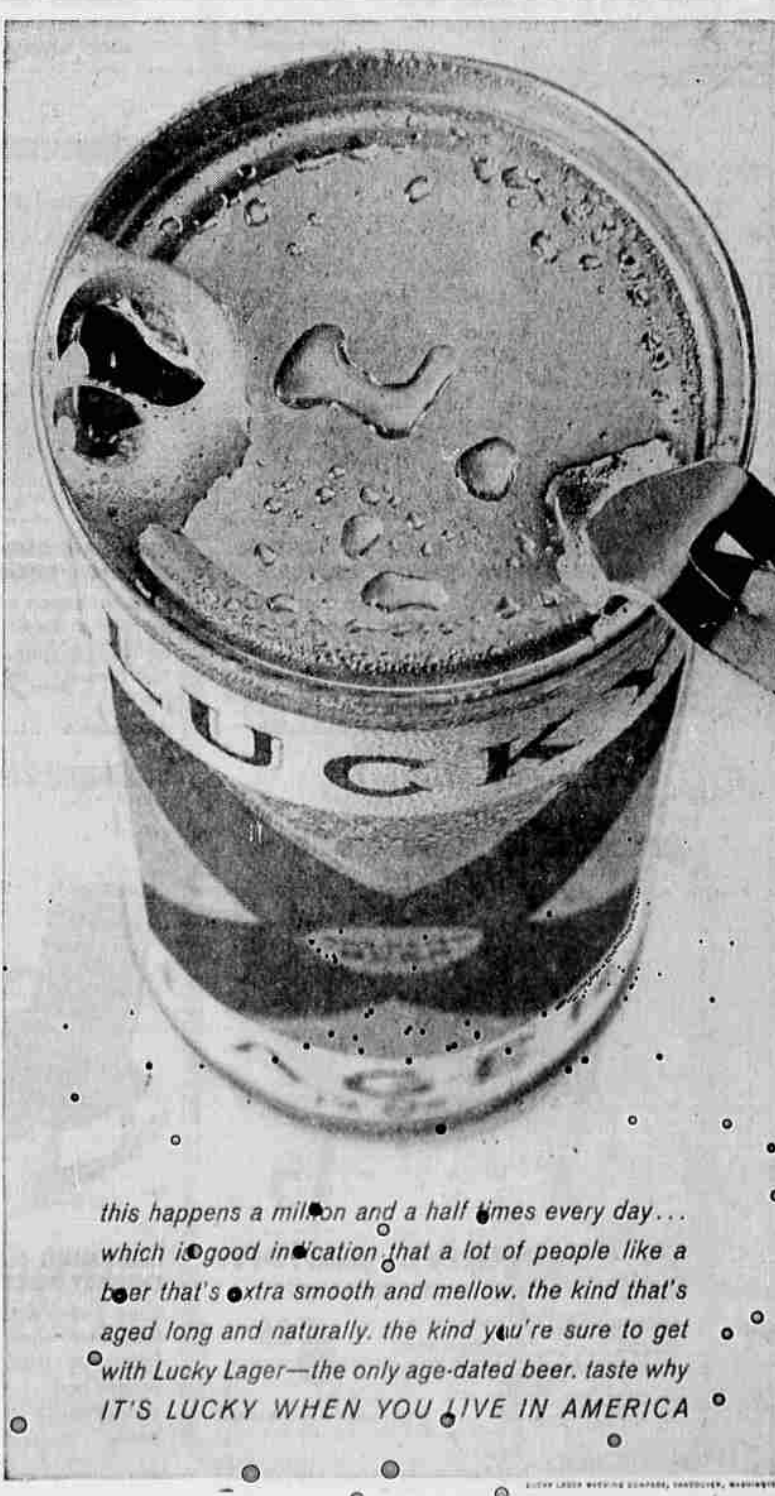
Federal mediator George Walker announced the two sides would sit down here Friday at 10 a.m., the first negotiating session in two weeks.

The strike by iron workers in Oregon and Southwest Washington entered its 46th day today, paralleling last year's strike by Local 701 of Hoisting and Portable Engineers. That strike was tentatively settled on its 46th day after a marathon negotiating session in Salem.

Last year's strike, which stalled construction projects worth half a billion dollars, was officially ended eight days later when the new agreement was signed by both sides.

The iron workers strike has crippled projects throughout Oregon and Washington, where iron workers also are on strike in the Seattle and Spokane regions.

At Seattle, talks between contractors, union representatives and a federal mediation panel broke off Wednesday without success in settling the strike in western Washington.
