 ALBANY, Ga. (UPI)—Southern integration leader Martin Luther King Jr. was released from jail Thursday after serving only two days of a 45-day sentence.
 The fine that had been levied against King on conviction of an integration incident last year—and which he had refused to pay—was put up mysteriously by an unidentified benefactor.
 In Washington, the Justice Department was reported deeply involved in King's release. A spokesman said Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy had been keeping President Kennedy informed in the matter and that Asst. Atty. Gen. Burke Marshall had made several telephone calls to Georgia in King's behalf at the direction of the attorney general.
 Albany Mayor Asa Kelley announced that King and Ralph Abernathy, also an Atlanta minister and integration leader, had been released because the fines had been paid. He claimed "no communicable knowledge" of who paid the fines.

Tigard Firm Sues City On Sewer Hookup
 TIGARD (UPI)—Tigard Shopping Plaza, Inc., has filed a suit against the Tigard Sanitary District and Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton on grounds that sewer connection fees are too high.
 Thornton is named in the action because the suit challenges the constitutionality of ordinances passed by the city and sanitary district.
 The basic ordinance, passed April 2, 1958, was amended four times while the shopping center was under construction.
 The suit contends that the plaza, which has made deposits totaling \$18,300 under protest would have paid only \$5,600 under the original ordinance.

The move came on the heels of a night of racial tension in this South Georgia industrial city. Rocks and bottles were thrown at police cars patrolling Negro neighborhoods here Wednesday night and Police Chief Laurie Pritchett warned a mass meeting of Negroes that such incidents could touch off violence.
 The meeting had been part of a protest against the jailing of King, Abernathy and two Albany integration leaders.
