Jack Heeter of Roseburg was host to the meeting. Eleven Roseburg people attended.

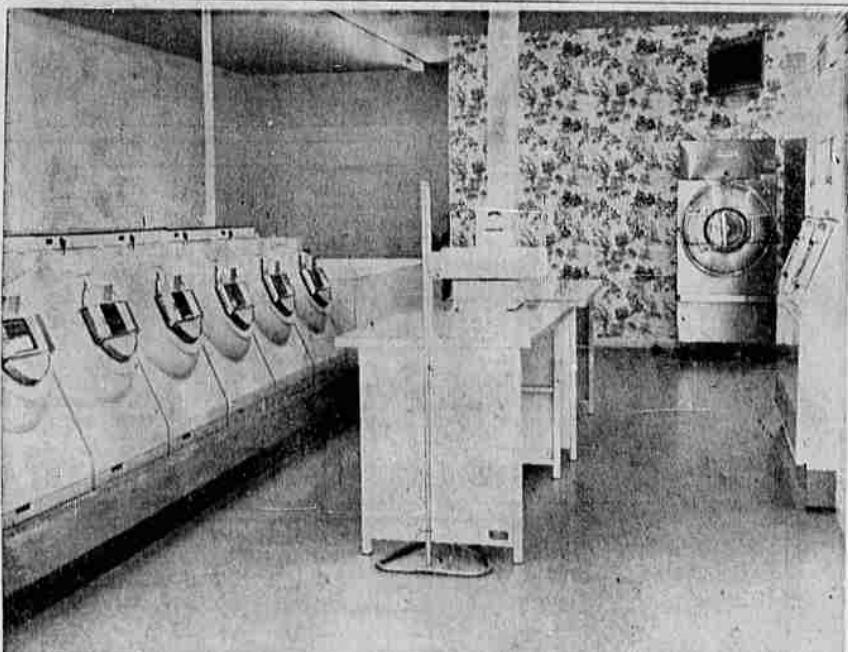
Oakland Reunion Slated

The annual reunion of former Oakland High School students will be held at Stearns Park west of Oakland Aug. 5, reports correspondent Edith Dunn.

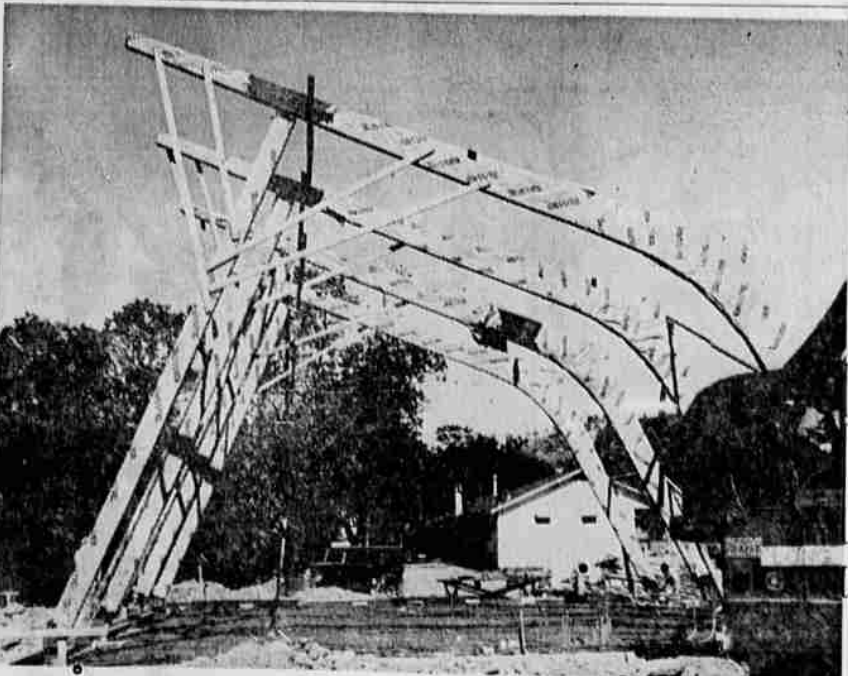
A potluck dinner will be held at noon. All former students of the school are invited to attend.
