

Mining Claims Hearings Set

PORTLAND (UPI) — A formal government hearing will be held in Eugene July 24 to hear testimony regarding validity of a group of controversial mining claims in the Umpqua National Forest, the Department of the Interior office here said today.

Claims Involved

The mining claims involved are the so-called Champion group in Lane County. The estate is of the late Fred J. Bartels of Cottage Grove, and others are attempting to obtain title to the claims under the federal mining laws, the department said.

The claims have been involved in legal action since 1953. At that time the Bartels applied for a patent to 17 mining claims covering some 227 acres.

The claims, on the west slope of the Cascades, are covered with timber which the Forest Service valued at \$24,400 in 1957, the department said.

The July hearing will attempt to determine the validity of 13 of the 17 claims.

Umpqua Represented

Vondis Miller, Umpqua National Forest supervisor, said the Umpqua forest will be represented at the hearing by John Porisch, Bohemia District ranger, or an assistant.

He described the case as "somewhat routine" but distinguished by the fact it has remained unsettled for such a long period of time.

The claims are situated in the once-rich Champion Mountain mining district located on the divide between Steamboat and Row River which runs east from Cottage Grove.

Center of a mining boom before the turn of the century, the mountain blossomed with mining claims, many of which were mined without application being made for patent, Miller noted.

This city was the fifth and final "Salem" to be visited before the final destination — the Seattle World's Fair.

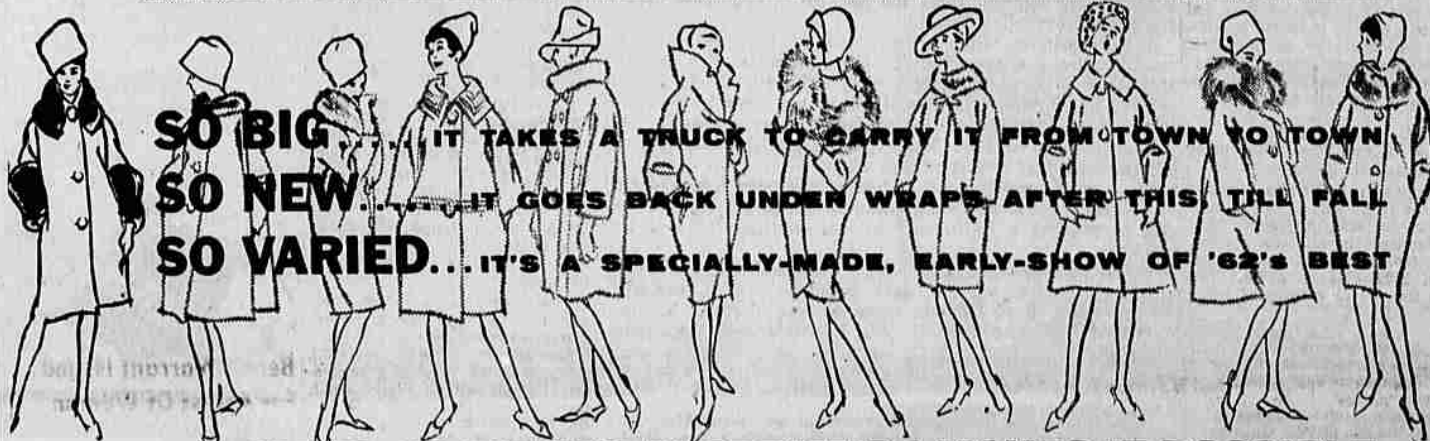
