

Japanese Pupil To Enroll This Year For Study At Canyonville High School

Shinge Nishiyama Of Tokyo Finds Life Different Here

From a school of more than 2,000 to a town of less than 1,200; from the traditional atmosphere of a conservative Oriental family to the easy comradery of Western hospitality; from the congestion of Japan to the wide open spaces comes Shinge Nishiyama, late of Kawaguchi, a suburb of Tokyo, now of Canyonville.

From now until summer 1963, life will be a series of just such contrasts for this 15-year-old Japanese boy who arrived by jet airplane recently to be the house guest of the Norman York family and add a touch of Japan to the Canyonville community.

Boy Typical

In spite of his traditional, upper middle-class Japanese background, Shinge is typical of any outgoing 15-year-old American boy. He smiles easily, loves sports and has a bump of curiosity big enough to carry him beyond his grandfather's mild disapproval thousands of miles to a strange and intriguing land.

His visit to Canyonville is strictly in the nature of hands across the Pacific, a project dear to the hearts of the Yorks who spent several years teaching in Japan before coming to Canyonville where York is superintendent of schools. He will enroll as a sophomore in Canyonville High School this fall, taking all prescribed courses for which he will get credit at his school in Tokyo, and he will take part in all community activities open to boys his age.

Then, in return, he will take back to Japan with him something of the feeling of an American small town. His visit was sponsored privately between the Yorks and their friend, Masazo Horuchi, headmaster of Sugamo Gakuen school for boys, a rather exclusive private school which still adheres to the traditional Japanese way of life while teaching what is needed in this space age.

Chisito's family includes, besides his mother, a 17-year-old sister and two brothers, 15 and 14-years-old. He said a major reason for seeking the scholarship opportunity was the realization of the need for genuine understanding between the peoples of the two nations, and the desire to further that understanding.
