Gen. Godoy Named President Of Peru

LIMA, PERU (UPI)—Army Gen. Ricardo Perez Godoy Tuesday was named president of Peru and his junta government granted constitutional executive and legislative powers.

A statute approved by the junta legalizing its interim status also stipulated that none of 12 military men in the present government can run for elective office in the next elections.

Weekly Wage Up Over 1961 Pay

SALEM (UPI)—The state Employment Department said Tuesday that the average weekly wage of production workers in Oregon in May, 1962, held about even with April, and was up \$2.33 from May, 1961.

Contract construction workers continued to have the highest average weekly wage among all production workers. In May they received \$135.78 on the average, up 68 cents from the previous May.

Steelhead Proposal Is Set For Friday Talks

SALEM (UPI)—Sponsors and opponents of the November ballot measure to declare steelhead a game fish in Oregon will appear before the legislative interim natural resources committee at Astoria Friday.

The proposal got on the November ballot by initiative petition, circulated by sportsmen.

Game Bird Season Set Along Lines Of 1961

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Oregon Game Commission says dove, bandtail, pigeon and snipe hunters will have identical hunting seasons as last year.

The season hunts for this year were adopted within the framework of the federal migratory bird rules as outlined by the Department of the Interior, the commission said.
