Douglas County will offer for sale of 40 parcels of tax-foreclosed lands at a public auction Aug. 15 on the Courthouse steps. The sale is scheduled to start at 10:30 a.m., reports Land Agent Robert E. Kischel.

Involved in the annual sale will be parcels totaling about 200 acres scattered through central Douglas County. Much of the land has been platted or subdivided, Kischel said.

Wounded EX-Con Said Recovering

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — A recently freed Oregon convict was on the road to recovery today and faced a transfer soon from the hospital to the state penitentiary.

William L. Rhoades, Salem, Ore., was shot between the eyes early this week in a gun battle with police Lt. Everett Krueger. The shooting occurred when Rhoades pulled a gun after the patrolman stopped him for a routine motorist check.

The hospital here listed Rhoades in "fair to good condition." His recovery was attributed to the deflection of the bullet downward. Authorities said he would be moved to prison when he was well enough.

Rhoades, still conscious after the shooting, told authorities at that time he was driving a stolen vehicle containing stolen goods. He was released from the Oregon prison June 16.

Everest Conqueror On Northwest Tour

TIMBERLINE LODGE (UPI) — The man who conquered Mt. Everest relaxed overnight with his family on Oregon's Mt. Hood before continuing Friday to other campgrounds in the northwest.

Sir Edmund Hillary, his wife and their three children are touring outdoor facilities in the United States before reporting to the Secretary of Agriculture on their suitability for foreign visitors.

The tall explorer, whose terrain has ranged from the Himalayas to the South Pole, relaxed by Still Creek Thursday night and commented, "I'm very impressed with your small, secluded forest camp."

The Hillarys' travel in a station wagon, towing a small trailer that folds out into a tent and kitchen. They arise at dawn during their trip through Oregon they also camped in the Rogue River National Forest.

Hillary said the best thing about the trip, which has covered 3,000 miles so far, was not the financial saving, but the companionship and the "chance to see what America is really like."

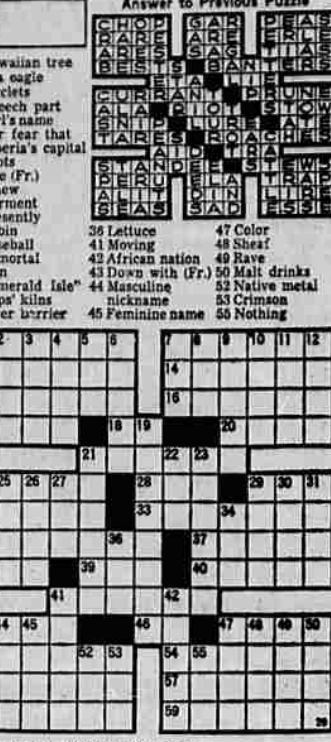
