# Lockwood Nine Set For State Semifinals

Lockwood Motors reached the state American Legion Junior baseball semifinals for the second consecutive year Sunday by handing the invading Capps Motors team of Bandon an 8-4 setback.

The victory made it two straight for the Roseburg nine over Bandon in a best-of-three series to decide the Area IV winner. Roseburg had opened with a 6-2 victory Friday at North Bend.

In the semifinals Roseburg will play the winner of one of the other areas—probably David Douglas, victor in Area III with a 6-1 triumph over Corvallis in the final game. The dates and site of the semifinal battles have not been announced to date.

Sunday's game was a mixture of a little of most everything in baseball—with the most prominent feature being the errors. A total of 17 errors marked the game—13 by Bandon and four by Roseburg.

The miscues accounted for most of the scoring, or at least figured heavily in it.

Bandon was the first to capitalize on mistakes, scoring twice in the top of the first inning. Roseburg tied the score with single unearned runs in each the first and second innings. Bandon then jumped out in front 4-2 on another break handed it by the Lockwood Motors team in the top of the third. The local crew went on to tie the game in the third, then moved ahead 7-4 with three markers in the fourth.

From the time Roseburg took the lead in the fourth inning it was never seriously threatened again. The final insurance tally crossed the plate in the sixth for Roseburg.

Perfect Mound Record

Lyle Charon kept his perfect mound record intact as he worked the first seven innings for Lockwood Motors. Charon was tagged for four hits, gave up five walks

and struck out five. The Bandon runs all came while Charon was on the hill. Lefty Jon Burnham came on to put the side out in the last two innings and protect Charon's win. Charon now has a 7-0 record.

Doug Giles came through with a fine mound performance for Capps Motors, but shaky support proved costly to the young right-hander. Giles gave up seven hits, walked two and struck out nine.

Glen Fortune's triple and Jim Beamer's double were the only extra base blows dished out to Roseburg by Giles.

Ol' Roseburg's seven hits, Tom Hobbs accounted for two. Hobbs was 2-5 with singles in the third and sixth innings. Hobbs drove in two runs with his base raps.

First baseman Ron Sutherland led Bandon at the plate with a single and a double in three official appearances. Three of the five walks issued by Charon went to lead-off batter Spencer Groshong.

In the first inning Bandon came through with two runs as Groshong and Giles dented the plates. Groshong led off with a walk and was sacrificed to second by Sutherland. Giles singled and John Conrad walked to load the bases. An error a possible double play ball allowed one run to cross the plate.

A second miscue on the throw back in from the outfield made it two.

Come Back

Roseburg came back when errors on Gordon Avery and Dennis Arana's grounders allowed a single run to score in the first, then tied up the count when four Bandon miscues allowed one run to score in the second. A double play with the bases loaded saved Bandon from a continuation of the problem in the second.

In the top of the third Bandon came to life again. Groshong started things moving with a walk and Sutherland followed with a single to left-center. Giles attempted a bunt sacrifice which was fielded by Arana, who threw wild to third

base with Groshong continuing on to the plate. With a two-and-two count on him, Conrad laid down a perfect squeeze bunt to bring the speedy Sutherland home.

Glen Fortune led off the third inning with a triple for Roseburg, and scored on a Bandon error. Arana went to second when his popped fly was dropped and scored on Hobbs' single to tie the game at 4-4.

Deadlock Broken

Roseburg broke the deadlock in the fourth when Charon singled to right to start the inning. Charon went to second on a wild pitch, third on Marv French's outfield fly and scored on Avery's single.

Avery went on to second by virtue of an error, took third on a passed ball, and both he and Arana, who had walked and stolen second, scored on a miscue.

A double by Beamer and a single by Hobbs gave the winners an insurance run in the sixth.

Double plays highlighted the

few moments of defensive brilliance. Roseburg turned in three twin-kills to half possible Bandon rallies. The visitors cut down the home team two at a time to end an uprising in the second inning.

### San Diego Splits With Mounties While Portland Takes 5-4 Loss

San Diego's Padres have had things pretty much their own way in the Pacific Coast League of late, but the Vancouver Mounties

put a few lumps in the pudding Sunday night.

The Redcoats, after being shut-out for two straight games by the league-leaders, scored a 13-4 victory over the Padres in the first game of a doubleheader. San Diego returned to form and won the nightcap, 4-2, but the split allowed second place Salt Lake City and the other first division teams, Tacoma and Hawaii, to gain slightly on the Padres.

Tacoma turned back Seattle, 12-7, Salt Lake City defeated Spokane, 3-2, and Hawaii beat Portland, 5-4.

Vancouver's victory was due largely to the hurrying of veteran moundman George Bamberger who came to the hill in the fifth inning and shut out the Padres for the remaining four and two thirds innings.

The righthander, who celebrates his 37th birthday Wednesday, also got two hits and drove in three runs. His record now is 8-7. Jay Ward had a homer and four RBIs in the contest for Vancouver.

San Diego took the second game behind the relief pitching of Ray Ruppelmeier. He took over from Howie Nunn after Nunn was lifted for a pinch-hitter in the fifth inning. Ruppelmeier pitched shutout ball for the final two innings of the seven-inning game.

Tacoma banged out 13 hits off six Seattle pitchers and three of the blasts were homers. Neil Wilson, with two of the round trippers and a single, drove in four runs. Faye Throneberry hit the other circuit clutch for the Giants. Don Carlson, last of three Tacoma pitchers, gained the victory, his fifth against two losses. Elmer Singleton, who started for Seattle, took the loss, his seventh in 13 decisions.

A clutch single by Billy Williams in the eighth inning gave Salt Lake its victory. Tony Washington had set things up in the fifth when he banged out a two-run homer.

Hawaii got its win when pinch-hitter Herb Plews doubled home the deciding tally in the bottom of the eighth inning. Islander right-hander Ben Johnson went the distance for his eighth win against four defeats.

## Mantle Is Doubtful Starter In Classic

CHICAGO (UPI) — Limping Mickey Mantle was a doubtful starter today for 1962's second All-Star game, in which the favored National League sought to make it a "sweep" by sending southpaw Johnny Podres against the American League's Camilo Pascual.

Mantle suffered a slight strain in his left knee running out an infield bouncer in Sunday's second game against the Chicago White Sox, and Yankee manager Ralph Houk, who also manages the AL All-Stars, said he would wait to see how the knee was before making up his mind about starting the sometimes fragile Yankee star.

If Mantle is unable to play, then Al Kaline of the Detroit Tigers, named Sunday by Houk to replace the ailing Jim Landis of the White Sox, more than likely will get the call as Mickey's replacement.

Outside of Mantle's doubtful status, the same players who started the first All-Star game in Washington earlier this month, again will take the field at 2 p.m. EDT at Wrigley Field, home of the Chicago Cubs, with the Nationals a 6-5 favorite to win their second All-Star game of the season and square the series at 16 victories each with one tie.

Spain Has Sore Elbow

Podres, who got the call to start today's game when Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves, Hutchinson's first choice, came down with a sore elbow, has been the Los Angeles Dodgers' "stopper" since Sandy Koufax hurt his pitching hand. He, too, is a late replacement, taking teammate Don Drysdale's place on the NL squad.

Pascual, the Minnesota Twins right hander who probably has the best curve ball in the business, got the call from Houk in what may be the last of the two-game a year All-Star classics.

Besides Mantle's "if" status, there was the problem of the

weather to contend with. In the event of rain — and the weather forecast said there might be scattered thundershowers — the game would be moved back to a 4 p.m. EDT start. Wrigley Field was the only major league baseball park without lights.

Alternate Date Set

Should no game be played today, a final attempt will be made to get the game in Tuesday, starting at noon EDT. No NL games are scheduled for Tuesday, but the AL has three night games on tap. That would mean the AL All-Stars would have to leave immediately after the game on Tuesday to join their respective clubs.

The two All-Star Game business began in 1959 in an effort by the players to enrich their pension fund. But it looks as if the leagues — and Commissioner Ford Frick, too — will have no more of the two-year business, although the players unanimously went on record as favoring the continuation of the present format.

That means the nationals will start with Dick Groat, pirate shortstop, leading off, followed by Roberto Clemente of the Pirates in right field, Willie Mays of the Giants in center, Orlando Cepeda of the Giants at first, Tommy Davis of the Dodgers in left, Ken Boyer of the Cards at third, Del Crandall of the Braves behind the plate, Bill Mazeroski of the Pirates at second, and Podres on the mound.

Rollins Leads Off

For the Americans it will be third baseman Rich Rollins of the Twins leading off with second baseman Billy Moran of the Angels next in line. Roger Maris of the Yankees, playing right field, will bat third, followed by Mantle or Kaline in center, Jim Gentile of the Orioles at first, catcher Earl Battey of the Twins, Leon Wagner of the Angels in left, Luis Aparicio of the White Sox at short, and Pascual pitching.

### Sutherland Babe Ruth 9 Wins Division Title

Sutherland's Babe Ruth team won the international division title of the Douglas County Babe Ruth League with a 6-2 record.

Earlier it had been stated that Tennille won. However, Tennille finished the season with a 5-2-1 record in league play, battling Winston to a tie. Ties are not replayable in Babe Ruth ball, and as a result the Sutherland team won undisputed control of the league crown.
