

Hein Dominates Racing Action During Weekend

Don Hein, 1961 driving champ, finally got into gear Saturday at the Roseburg Speedway to dominate the weekly hardtop action.

The Roseburg driver won the third heat race, then came back in the featured A-Main event to post his first major victory of the season. Hein edged out Jim Standley and Jay Eaton, both of Roseburg, in the thrilling A-Main.

Eaton added to his leading point total by winning the A-Trophy dash.

Jay Gardner, Brandon, and Lloyd Tucker, Drain, topped the B drivers in the hardtop action. Gardner placed second in the first heat and won the B-Main event. Tucker won the B-Trophy dash and the second heat race.

Vern Dykstra, Larry Burge and Clarence Silvers, all of Roseburg, won the jolopy races. Dykstra took first in the trophy dash. Burge won the heat race and

Silvers took top honors in the main event.

In the first lap of the jolopy trophy dash the crowd was brought to its feet when David Johnson in car No. 12 and Sam Gosso in car No. 15 tangled in front of the stands. Johnson's car did a complete roll and Gosso's vehicle ended "bottoms-up." Johnson returned to race again, but Gosso was out with a broken radiator. Neither driver was injured.

The A-Main event in the hardtop racing saw Jay Eaton and John Barron tangle on the east turn. Both cars returned to the track after the accident, with Eaton put at the back of the pack for causing the mishap. Barron came back after changing a bent wheel.

Racing action is scheduled again next week, with time trials starting at 7:30 p.m. Both the jolopies and the hardtops will be circling the track.

Roseburg Babe Ruth All-Stars Capture District Title, Enter State Tournament

Roseburg's Babe Ruth all-stars captured the District IV crown Saturday to earn a trip to the state tournament at Klamath Falls this week.

Roseburg squelched the attempt of a valiant Curry County team in the finals of the District tournament at Legion Field. Curry County came up through the losers bracket to win North Douglas, 22-6, Saturday afternoon, then came on strong to win the opener of the finals, 6-4, over the Roseburg crew.

The new District IV champs bounced back strong to win the second game of the finals, 6-3.

Mound Duel

The final game of the tourney saw Curry County's Pete Payne and Roseburg's Rusty Hubbard fight it out in a low-scoring mound duel. Hubbard issued nine hits to Curry County, while Roseburg collected four off Pete Payne. However, Hubbard walked only two and Payne issued nine free passes. Strikeouts favored Payne, 12-5.

Collecting Roseburg's four hits were Hubbard, Mike Cashner, Doug Matson and Bruce Wassum.

Local Swim Team Captures 4th Spot

Roseburg's aquatic aces finished in fourth place in the District III meet of the Emerald Empire Conference held at Reedsport Saturday.

The local swimmers picked up 185½ points to edge out Medford for fourth place. Medford was fifth with 172½ points. Reedsport's Aqua Braves won the district title with a whopping total of 418 points. North Bend finished in second place with 313 points.

Ron Frashour, Kathy McMullen, Brian Stulls, Jeanne Forrest, Bill Zimmerman, Rob Williams and Diane Yates were picked by coach Larry Lermo as the leaders of the Roseburg contingent.

First Top Award

Stulls won Roseburg's first top award in the 9-10 boys 50-yard breast stroke race. Stulls swam the course in 44.1 seconds for the victory. The time turned in by the Roseburg youngster is the best chucked up in the state this year.

Roseburg's other first place in the swimming action came in boys 13-14 200-yard freestyle relay. Williams and Frashour teamed up with Chris Longfellow and B. Pyle to stroke across the finish line ahead of the opponents. The quartet of Roseburg stars was clocked at 1:53.7.

In the diving competition Miss McMullen won the 13-14 girls bracket and Miss Forrest placed first in the 11-12 girls division.

Two of the outstanding races of the day featured Williams and Zimmerman. Williams fought to a tie for second in the 100-yard freestyle race for boys 13-14. Zimmerman, who only recently turned 15 and jumped to the senior boys division, placing second against his older opponents in the senior boys 100-yard breast stroke race. Zimmerman came in very close to winner B. Stillmaker of North Bend. Zimmerman was clocked at 1:11.0, just three-tenths of a second off the pool record. Stillmaker is an 18-year-old competitor.

Coming Meet

All swimmers who finished among the top six in Saturday's finals will compete this coming weekend at Springfield in the Emerald Empire Conference Meet. Eugene's Central Lane Y and

Reedsport are figured to be the powers at the conference meet. Central Lane took its district title, and earlier in the year beat Reedsport by 122 points in a dual meet.

Pretty soon now, the Yankees, with a fat five-game lead in the American League, will send their scouts out to collect information for the World Series.

Here's a tip for them, free of charge. They'd better concentrate on Howard.

Howard did an unmerciful job on the Giants Sunday for the third straight game as the Dodgers breezed to a lopsided 11-1 victory and extended their national league lead to four games.

The outsized outfielder drove in five runs with four hits, including a homer, his third in as many games with the giants and his 20th of the season.

Don Drysdale clicked off his ninth straight win and 19th of the season with a six-hitter. The only run off him was Willie Mays' 32nd homer leading off the seventh.

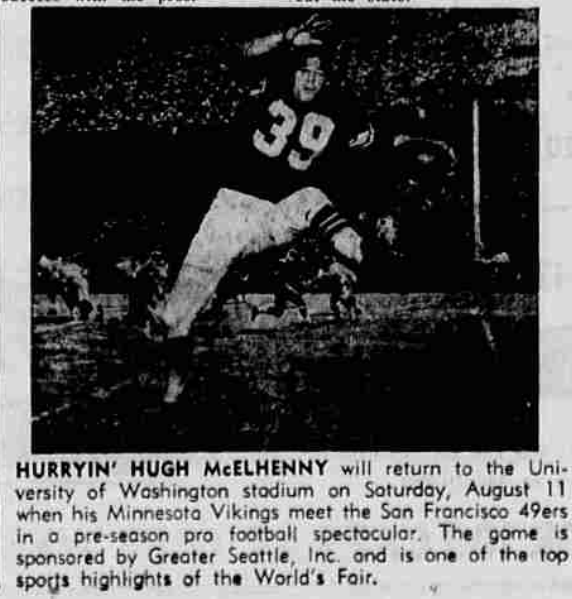
With all the teams taking a break today because of the second All-Star Game, the Dodgers are sitting pretty with a four-game winning streak and eight victories in their last nine starts.

The Yankees are in even better shape despite their split with the White Sox Sunday. Chicago snapped a five-game Yankee winning streak with a 6-2 victory in the nightcap after losing the opener, 7-4.

Charley Maxwell, always at his best on Sunday, hit three homers for the White Sox, including two in the nightcap. Juan Pizarro, kayoed by a five-run rally in the first inning of the opener, came back to gain his 10th triumph in the finale by holding the Yanks to one hit in 4 1/3 innings after relieving starter Mike Joyce.
