

Civil Defense Backers Rap Shelter Foes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Civil Defense backers said today that House members who turned down a national fallout shelter program have thousands of "excellent" shelter spaces at hand for their own use.

As part of a national shelter survey—financed by Congress last year—the solidly built House office buildings have been found to afford acceptable shelter for 22,000 persons, with more than half the available spaces rated 10 times as safe as the minimum standard.

Additional shelter for congressmen and their staffs is available in the Library of Congress building and completion of a new \$80 million office building for House members next year undoubtedly will provide more and even better shelter in its underground floors.

Rep. Melvin Price, D-Ill., a member of the congressional Atomic Energy Committee and one of a handful of members on record as opposing Monday's House action, advised lawmakers of their relatively favorable position in today's congressional record.

Price said the congressional shelters were identified in a survey that turned up fallout shelter spaces for 60 million Americans in existing buildings and in some cases in caves, tunnels and other special structures.

Price and Rep. Chet Holifield, D-Calif., warned House members that in affirming an appropriations committee's veto on further federal spending for shelter construction they also were jeopardizing the program to put emergency stores of food and water in existing shelters.

"I hope the members will search their minds and hearts and give careful thought to whether they want to take the responsibility for depriving the American people of a basic means for protection and survival," Price said.

Guest at the luncheon meeting was Leon Hayes, new Drain High School coach and coach of the American Legion Junior baseball team.

Mrs. Finkbine Will Seek Abortion Outside Of Arizona

PHOENIX (UPI)—Sherri Finkbine, 30, gave up her battle for a legal abortion in Arizona and announced early today she will go elsewhere for the operation.

The decision was released by her husband, Robert, through the administrator of the hospital where the operation was to have been performed. Doctors have recommended the young mother of four undergo the abortion because of the possibility her child has been deformed by a drug, Thalidomide, which she took in the early stages of her pregnancy.

Finkbine said after a conference with her attorneys and doctors they would "seek help in a more favorable legal climate." He refused to say where that might be.

Mrs. Finkbine's chances for an abortion without risk of prosecution might be best in Japan, Denmark, or the Soviet Union.

Other states in the United States have laws similar to Arizona. A ruling by a court or state attorney general would be necessary to authorize the operation.

No Legal Restrictions
But in Japan, about 1,000 foreign women have abortions yearly. There are no legal restrictions, the operations are generally performed under clinical conditions and the price is about \$50. Denmark also offers legal abortion, for medical or social reasons.

Russia keeps the price of abortion high to discourage the practice.

Praying Negroes Jailed By Police

ALBANY, Ga. (UPI) — Police jailed 15 praying, hymn-singing Negroes and a white woman Monday night.

The action took place shortly after city officials went to federal court in an effort to end eight months of anti-segregation demonstrations which have resulted in scattered incidents of violence.

The latest group included only three men. The demonstrators were arrested in front of city hall when they refused to obey police chief Laurie Pritchett's order to move on.

The brief demonstration apparently caught Pritchett by surprise. He said word had been relayed to him there would be no demonstrations so that he could stay home and celebrate his 12th wedding anniversary.

Pritchett, who appeared to be annoyed, arrived on the scene dressed in a business suit rather than the uniform he usually wears.

Pritchett said the demonstration was not in keeping with a policy statement by the pro-integration Albany Movement that there would be no more night demonstrations.

The demonstrators arrived at the city hall in cars and were led in prayer by a Negro man dressed in overalls.

Those arrested included a white woman who identified herself as Miss Elizabeth Wycoff, a writer from New York City and a member of the Congress of Racial Equality.

The city went to court Monday to seek a permanent injunction to prohibit the movement from staging demonstrations. The hearing was recessed late in the afternoon.

But there are no legal restrictions.

Finkbine's statement, handed to Steve Morris, superintendent of Good Samaritan Hospital, shortly after midnight read:

"Despite medical and psychiatric opinions in the case, the courts have refused to confirm that the recommended treatment would be within the framework of the law. There have been repeated published suggestions of prosecution of this case, and since we and our physicians do not wish to undertake a solution that might be considered outside the framework of the law we have concluded to seek help in a more favorable legal climate."

Finkbine told Morris he would begin making financial and legal arrangements immediately "to carry out the decision."

A judge Monday dismissed a suit which was intended to insure Mrs. Finkbine, a local television personality, and the hospital freedom from criminal prosecution under Arizona law.

Morris said he gathered from Finkbine's comments the couple would lose no more time in arranging for the abortion. Doctors who recommended the abortion said it should be performed within two weeks, at the three months stage of her pregnancy, or a Caesarean section would be required.

Segregationist Governor Seeks Unprecedented Term In Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—Orval E. Faubus, the segregationist symbol of 1957 who has become the dean of the nation's governors, today bids for a fifth term—unprecedented in Arkansas history.

The major question in today's Democratic primary was not whether Faubus could be defeated, but whether he could be forced into a runoff primary Aug. 14.

None of his five opponents, including Faubus' political teacher and one of the governor's prize pupils, has predicted a victory today, but all have said they can push him into a runoff.

Voters also will decide whether Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., will receive a fourth term over Winston Chandler, Little Rock Conservative. It is Fulbright's first primary opposition since 1944.

Nomination in the Democratic primary is tantamount to election in Arkansas.

Faubus, 52, has been governor since 1954 and has been known internationally since the 1957 Little Rock High School integration crisis. His opposition to integration made him the first Arkansas governor to serve three

straight terms and subsequently four.

Faubus' longevity in office, rather than integration, was the main issue of the campaign.

Major opposition came from former Gov. Sid McMath, who found Faubus a weekly newspaper publisher and left him an accomplished politician; and from Rep. Dale Alford, D-Ark., who rode in as a staunch segregationist on the shorthairs of Faubus' third-term sweep in 1958.

Alford, first elected as a write-in against then Congressman Brooks Hays, was re-elected in 1960—again as a supporter of Faubus.

The other opponents are Kenneth Coffelt, fiery Little Rock lawyer, Vernon Whitte, South Arkansas lumberman making his first statewide race; and David Cox, eastern Arkansas cotton planter whose campaign allies have caused him to be thrown in jail twice.
