State Doctors May Have Received Harmful Drug

PORTLAND (UPI) — The University of Oregon Medical School Hospital here received a shipment of Thalidomide, the drug linked to defects in unborn babies, last year. But none of it was distributed to patients, a spokesman reports.
Dr. Norman David, chief of the hospital's pharmacology department, said he received the shipment, but didn't authorize its distribution.
A spokesman at the State Board of Health said it was "possible" that some Oregon doctors received the drug as part of the manufacturers' testing program but added "that was a matter between the firm and individual physicians."
