

College Quartet To Sing Sunday

The Envoys Male Quartet of Azusa College, Azusa, Calif., will sing at the 7:15 p.m. services Sunday at the Camas Valley Community Missionary Church, according to Olen C. Schlatter, pastor. The program will feature hymns, gospel songs and spirituals.

A similar program by the group will be given at 11 a.m. services Sunday at the Green Community Missionary Church.

The Envoys quartet is a typical sampling of the student body of Azusa College, an interdenominational institution, Schlatter reports. George Rosemier, baritone, comes from San Diego, Calif.; Ted Nutting, bass, is from Rupert, Idaho; second tenor Lowell Harris calls Dayton, Ohio, his home; and Dennis Marriott, first tenor, hails from Auburn, Calif.

George is a freshman this year, majoring in music. Ted has sung during the past years in various choirs and operettas. He has received honors in the State Oratory contests of Idaho and has been a recipient of many ribbons and medals in the Future Farmers of America.

Lowell Harris transferred to Azusa College after beginning a career in art. He has studied art in Salzburg, Austria, and served in the Medical Corps of the U.S. Navy prior to his college days. Merker On Active Duty With Unit

Maj. Frank F. Merker, manager of the Roseburg Veterans Administration Hospital, is currently on duty with his unit, the 321st General Hospital, in Tacoma, Wash.

His active duty training is taking place at Madigan General Hospital.

The Roseburg psychiatrist is chief of the neuropsychiatric section of the 321st, a reserve unit organized in April 1947. The unit left its regular training site at Vancouver Barracks for Madigan July 22.

Personnel consisting of 55 officers and 47 enlisted men are performing parallel type, on-the-job training on wards of the large general hospital. The training is designed to maintain the unit's ability to provide medical treatment in event of local or national emergency.

Under the command of Col. Ralph R. Sullivan, director of occupational health in the Oregon State Board of Health, the unit is composed of physicians, dentists, nurses, pharmacists, optometrists, bacteriologists, neuropsychiatric personnel, biochemists and those in administrative services.

ASKED FOR AUTHORITY

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. Conference of Mayors has asked Congress to give the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) authority to reduce the roar of jetliners.

Sam Moag Jr., chairman of the Atlanta, Ga., board of Aldermen, told a Senate aviation subcommittee Monday that the FAA should be vested with responsibility to prescribe aircraft construction and operating standards designed to minimize jet noise.

Junior College Program Said 'Voracious Tax Eater'

SALEM (UPI) — Private trade schools charged Monday that the Oregon Education Department is using a "hard sell" and "chamber of commerce approach" to promote the state's growing system of public community colleges.

A series of witness before the legislative interim committee on education described the program as overly ambitious, and said the state can't afford it.

The committee was told the program should be taken away from the education department, and put under higher education.

William E. Richardson of the Portland Electronics College, a private school, described Oregon's junior college program as a "voracious tax eater."

He said the system "serves little purpose other than to duplicate the present services of the private schools, and at a tremendous cost to the Oregon taxpayers."

Stanley Church, Lake Oswego attorney, charged that the education department attempted to "sell" a community college in Clackamas County on the basis that the state would pick up the tab "and local taxpayers wouldn't pay anything."

Voters in the county rejected the plan in May, he noted.

Church submitted six recommendations for curbing the program, which he called "one of the greatest threats to fiscal responsibility" in the state.

Church said the entire history of the community college law, from 1957, is that the schools should serve more remote areas—not heavily populated areas such as Clackamas County.

He proposed that:

- A majority of voters in a proposed community college district be required to approve a petition for a new college, instead of 10 per cent. This is the petition that sets up an election.
- The state pay 25 per cent of building costs, instead of 75 per cent.
- The state pay one third of operating costs, instead of two thirds.
- Tuition be at least as much as at a four year school.
- All community college elections carry a price tag.
- State money for such schools come from basic school support—property taxes — instead of the general fund.
- Church said that since college transfer courses are being offered, junior colleges should be put

Pan Am Union Slates Strike

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ten thousand members of the Transport Workers Union employed by Pan American World Airways will go on strike at midnight Friday, it was announced Monday.

The union said its 2,000 members employed by the airline at the government's Cape Canaveral missile base will not participate in the strike "in the national interest."

TWU President Michael J. Quill and Vice President James J. F. Horst, director of the union's Air Transport Division, charged that Pan American "has deliberately provoked this strike" by refusing to bargain in good faith on all major issues. It said the company had "filibustered" in bargaining and "exhausted the patience of our membership who have been without a new contract since May 31."

The union has demanded substantial wage increases for its members, which are employed as mechanics, stewards, stewardesses and ground service personnel.

The announcement said TWU members will demonstrate Friday at Pan American installations here and in Miami, Cape Canaveral, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle, San Juan and Honolulu "to alert the public to the airline's shutdown."

Object Found On Coast Was Not Radioactive

HANFORD, Wash. (UPI) — Scientists here have decided that a small capsule marked "radioactive" and found on the Oregon coast actually was a large cork wrapped in lead foil.

They said it was not dangerous and did not belong to the Atomic Energy Commission.

The object was rushed to the Hanford Atomic Works for examination after it was found on a beach west of Tillamook by a 13-year-old Salem boy Friday.

Scientists said the word "radioactive" was printed on a piece of yellow tape around the foil. The standard radiation symbol used in the United States also was marked on the tape, they said.

The examination came after the cork was turned over to the Coast Guard at Garibaldi.

H. R. Cydell, public information director at Hanford, said that "a check showed the cork had no reading and was not dangerous." "We have no idea how it got on the beach and who put it there," he said. "It may have been put there as a prank."

Cydell said the cork could have been used as a stopper for some capsule containing a radioactive material at a hospital or a college laboratory.

He pointed out that Hanford uses rubber corks.

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Brown Park Water Is Salty, But Safe

Persons frequenting Douglas County's O. C. Brown Park at Dixonville have probably wondered about the water flowing through the drinking fountain.

W. E. Wierpach, Park Department supervisor explained today that while the water has come through the tests for safe drinking water in fine shape, there is a little to be desired in its taste.

When the well for the park's water was being drilled, Wierpach said, an insufficient amount of water for the facility's needs was located near the surface. However, by drilling to about 100 feet, a plentiful supply of water was located.

The only hitch was that the drill hit a salt pocket.

Consequently, while the water is free from harmful bacteria, it is not very good tasting.

Wierpach noted that one taste from the water fountain usually cures thirst. He did say that it is not harmful to human beings.

Main use of the water is for flushing the park toilets and irrigation.

The trouble at the park had occurred earlier at the Dixonville School. The school now draws from a surface stream and treats its water.
