

Strike Called Against Two Aluminum Firms

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — The Aluminum Workers of America (AFL-CIO) called a strike at midnight Tuesday night against the nation's two largest aluminum producers, Aluminum Company of America (Alcoa) and Reynolds Metals Co.

The walkout involved 16,000 union members, 7,000 of them employed by Reynolds and 9,000 working for Alcoa, and affected thousands of other employees of the companies.

In a subsidiary walkout, two of five craft unions walked off the job at Reynolds' McCook, Ill. sheet and plate plant, idling 2,900 employees, most of them represented by the United Steelworkers Union (AFL-CIO).

Reynolds said the strikes affect 290,000 tons of its primary aluminum production capacity.

Began Survey

Officials of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service immediately began a survey for the Defense Department to determine the effect of the walkouts on the nation's armament and missile production.

Talks between company and union officials continued into the early minutes of Tuesday morning, when the aluminum workers negotiators announced the strike. The talks then broke off.

A meeting of union negotiators was scheduled at 11 a.m. EDT today and federal conciliators hoped to arrange more talks toward settlement.

The strike affected Alcoa plants at Chillicothe, Ohio; Cresson, Pa.; East St. Louis III; Lafayette, Ind.; Riverdale, Iowa; Lancaster, Pa.; Massena, N.Y.; Vancouver, Wash. and Wenatchee, Wash.

Five At Louisville

Reynolds plants affected included five at Louisville, Ky.; two at Sheffield, Ala.; Massena, N.Y.; two at Richmond, Va.; one at Bellwood, Va.; and one at St. Louis.

Nine other Reynolds plants at Hurricane Creek, Ark.; Bauxite, Ark.; Arkadelphia, Ark.; Jones Mills, Ark.; Corpus Christi, Tex.; Longview, Wash.; Phoenix, Ariz.; Troutdale, Ore.; and McCook, Ill. have contracts with the United Steelworkers covering production workers.

Workers at Alcoa's Lafayette, Ind., plant anticipated the walkout by an hour, leaving their jobs at 11 p.m. CDT.

Chief issues in the stalled negotiations for a contract replacing the pact which expired at midnight were job security and protection of production workers against displacement by automation.

Edward Stahl, president of the union, said it has lost 5,000 members in the past three years due to automation.

Both company and union officials said there was agreement on the wage clause of a proposed contract.

Things Looking Up For Man Once Branded A 'Turncoat'

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI) — How long does it take a man to live down the charge that he betrayed his country?

For Otho G. Bell, 31, it was about 10 years.

Bell was one of several soldiers who were dishonorably discharged from the Army after being accused of collaborating with the Chinese Communists in a Korean prisoner of war camp.

For years, Bell said, he was shackled to the brand "turncoat." But during the past year or so, things have improved for Bell, his wife, Jewell, and their four children.

Bell said he had encountered "no prejudice whatever" in recent months. Just one year ago, he had said he would "rather hang" than continue life branded as a turncoat.

He said he makes his living doing odd jobs but he added, "when there is work to be found, I'll find it."

Bell has built a wooden house on some land he purchased in a rural district east of here.

"There's still a lot to be done," he said motioning to the unpainted walls and cluttered interior.

"But I'm getting there." Bell remained in Red China for 18 months after the end of the Korean War. But he steadfastly denies that he was a traitor.

He said he hoped that his case would be brought to court eventually so that he would get the chance to clear his name.

The U. S. Supreme Court ruled that Bell, and others who remained with the Communists, could not be tried by courts martial on collaboration charges because the Army lost jurisdiction when it discharged them.

In another case, the Supreme Court ruled that Bell was entitled to \$1,455 prisoner-of-war pay. That was more than a year ago, but he said he still has not received the money.

"The lawyer says I'll get the money sometime," he said, "but I haven't seen it yet."

Bell is a native of Mississippi, but said he has decided to make Washington his home.

By many standards, Bell still is far from successful, but he feels that he is on the way up.

"I was drawing relief for a while," he said, "but I don't need it now."

Finnish Police Break Up New Anti-Red Riots

HELSINKI (UPI)—Police used tear gas to break up another anti-Communist demonstration Tuesday night in rioting filmed by television cameramen from Moscow, sponsor of the World Youth Festival in this neutral nation.

Authorities said many of the several thousand participants in the fourth straight night of demonstrations were teen-agers. They theorized many were present for lack of anything better to do on a summer night.

The demonstration came as the festival observed its Soviet-Finnish "Youth Friendship Day."

There was no truncheon swinging or use of mounted police, as in previous riots against the Communist-backed festival. At least ten arrests were made and there were no serious casualties, police said.

(In Moscow, the government newspaper Izvestia said the rioting was caused by adults who supplied whisky to teen-agers, then urged them on with periodic orders.)

"The spectacle was well-rehearsed but the actors turned out to be very weak and the directors, people without taste," the newspaper said.

Police dispersed the crowd by tossing four tear gas bombs. They also closed down a snack bar used as a hangout by Finnish teen-agers.
