Highway Department Tells New Park Extension Plan

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon Highway Commission released a massive report on outdoor recreation Tuesday and said Oregon needs at least 15 new parks by 1975, plus 4,000 acres to expand 22 existing parks.

The 128 page report covers the state's recreational needs for the next 13 years, and said top priority should be given to shoreland and to other desirable lands "which are likely to become unavailable."

Findings of the study include: —Oregon tops all other states in per capita use of state park facilities.

—The favorite recreation of state park visitors is picnicking, with swimming and fishing second and third.

—The federal government, despite huge land holdings in Oregon, has been skimping in developing such land for recreation.

On the last point, the report noted that in 1961 the state and counties spent \$3.3 million on recreational development while the federal government—owning about half of Oregon—spent only \$2.9 million.

"The conclusion is inescapable," the report said. "The course of Oregon's recreational development during the next 13 years will depend in large measure on the action of the federal government."

The tremendous growth in state park attendance indicates that the Oregon park system will be short of space by 1975 unless steps are taken to speed up development, the report said.

The commission predicted a 100 per cent boost in use of parks by 1975, to 58.7 million visitors. The 1960 figure was 23.9 million visitors.

The 15 areas recommended as sites for new state parks between now and 1975 included: —Bridal Veil Falls, in the Columbia Gorge. —The Clackamas River. —Nestucca Sand Spit, Tillamook County. —Sauvie Island near Portland. —Bullard's Beach on the Coquille River. —Eel Lake north of Coos Bay. —Triangle Lake between Eugene and the coast. —Washburne area, on the Coast. —Deschutes River. —Mosier Battlements, a series of rock formations. —Pistol River adjacent to the coast. —Upper Rogue River. —Fort Rock, now being developed. —Hell's Canyon Reservoir, Snake River.

Additions were recommended to these state parks: —Bald Peak, Cape Lookout, Champoe, Crown Point, Dabney, Fort Stevens, Nehalem Bay, Collier, Wallows Lake, Hat Rock, Catherine Creek, Bandon, Sunset Bay, Susan Creek, Umpqua Wayside, Bandon Wayside, Harris Beach, Loeb, Floras Lake, Tou Velle Mayer and Cline Falls.

Circuit Court

Complaints

State Industrial Accident Commission vs. Hammersmith Lumber Co.; Douglas County State Bank and Small Business Association of California. Plaintiff asks award of \$1,049.86 plus interest on a first cause of action and \$33.28 plus interest on second cause of action or foreclosing liens on five lots of Plat G of the Sutherland Land and Water Co. and log mill equipment. The suit involves plaintiff under Workmen's Compensation Act. Plaintiff asks that rights of other defendants be declared inferior and property be sold to satisfy the liens.

Benjamin David Clark vs. Lester and Evelyn Richardson. Plaintiff asks decree ordering defendant to build plaintiff a suitable dwelling on a portion of certain Douglas County real property and if construction is not started in 60 days, foreclosing defendant from property. Plaintiff alleges defendants breached contract executed Aug. 28, 1961, in which they were to build a house for plaintiff and pay \$5,000 on an installment basis in exchange for other area of the property on which the house is located and containing a total 50.06 acres. Plaintiff also asks award of \$100 for stanchions allegedly removed from the premises and attorney fees.

Tracy L. Fields vs. Ervin Weathers and Basil Weathers. Plaintiff asks award of \$1,858 plus interest, costs and disbursements. Case involves loan which plaintiff allegedly made to defendants on June 19, 1959, no part of which, according to the complaint, has been paid.

Misaligned Rail Proved In Railroad Crash

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI)—The theory of the misaligned rail as the cause of Saturday's tragic Steelton train wreck has moved from conjecture to fact.

Pennsylvania Railroad officials announced the misalignment was felt and seen by the two-man engine crew of the ill-fated "baseball special" who tried to stop the train just before the last three cars plunged into the Susquehanna River, killing 19 persons.

Howard C. Kohout, Philadelphia regional manager for the PRR, said engineer John F. Shue, Roy-alton, managed to bring the nine-car train to a halt within 1,000 feet but the back cars had already jumped from the tracks.

"After suspecting he (Shue) was going to have trouble, he tried to stop," Kohout told a news conference here.

In another account of irony, Kohout said the section of track involved in the wreck had been rehabilitated and realigned only Friday by railroad work crews. He said the maintenance personnel replaced ties and raised the track to "good alignment."

What sent the track out of line so soon after the work had been completed is a question still to be answered by the Pennsylvania's own inquiry and a joint investigation to start Aug. 20 by the state Public Utility Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Kohout said the train had just left the Harrisburg station, traveling "something below 70 miles per hour," and "accelerating" when the engine crew spotted the misalignment.

"We are satisfied the crew made every effort to have the train operated safely," Kohout said. "They tried to stop it before the train went over."

Montgomery Ward Store Plans Bigger Display Area

Just one year ago, on Aug. 3, Montgomery Ward & Co. opened its large new store on NE Stephens St. at its intersection with Garden Valley Blvd.

As a part of the end-of-week anniversary celebration, a huge 8x8-foot cake will be cut and served to customers. Free pony rides for children, gold fish dip, and other offerings are the further anniversary offerings.

Baptist Church Books Congolese Missionary

The Rev. Justin Walusal, Baptist leader of the Republic of Congo will speak at the First Baptist Church of Roseburg this Friday at 7:30 p.m.

The Rev. Mr. Walusal is studying at Berkeley Baptist Divinity School in California under a scholarship given by the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society. He is general secretary of the Baptist Churches of Basala, which is part of the Vanga field. He has been pastor for eight years and has ministered to a congregation of over 1,000 members. He also directed a village school system including several thousand students.

A member of the Bayazi tribe, Rev. Walusal attended the Baptist School at Vanga. At Kimpese he was graduated from the normal school and the theological school. He is married and has several children.
