

Cassius Clay Is Named 'Fighter Of The Month'

NEW YORK (UPI)— Unbeaten Cassius Clay, the brash young heavyweight contender who not only defeats all of his opponents but picks the round of the knockout, was named "Fighter of the Month" today by The Ring magazine.

Former Olympic champion Clay was awarded the fighter-of-the-month designation because of his 15th consecutive professional victory on July 20 in a fifth-round knockout over ex-contender Alejandro Lavarante of Argentina. Twenty-year-old Clay of Louisville, Ky., said, "I'll knock him out in the fifth round," and did it. It was his 12th kayo in his 15 starts.

The Ring also boosted confident Cassius from ninth to seventh in its ratings.

Big Mike DeJohn of Miami Beach and Syracuse, N.Y., returned to the ratings at No. 10 by virtue of his upset win over Robert Cleroux, heavyweight champion of Canada. Cleroux sank from sixth to ninth.

Eddie Machen of Portland, Ore., kept his No. 2 heavyweight rating although held to a surprise draw by Cleveland Williams of Houston, Tex. Williams rose from eighth to sixth.

Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach, who had been No. 10 among the heavies, was shifted to the light heavyweight division at No. 8. Apparently Willie and The Ring figure he can do better as a 175-pounder. The long inactive Erich Schoepner of Germany was dropped out of the light heavies.

In the middleweight class Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., climbed from seventh to fifth because of his impressive victory over welterweight contender Teddy Wright of Detroit.

Estelle fanned 13 Dodgers and walked four while twice retiring nine men in order. Eugene wrapped it up with two runs in the second and three more in the third.

Mizell Victim Of Extensive Pitcher Shuffle

Three major league pitchers—Frank Lary, Ray Sadecki and Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell—were hit with bad news at practically the same time.

It was worst of all for the 31-year-old Mizell, one-time ace of the St. Louis Cardinals' pitching staff, on whom waivers were asked by the New York Mets Tuesday for the purpose of giving him his unconditional release.

Lary, a 23-year-old game winner last year who has been troubled by a sore arm most of this season, was placed on the disabled list by the Detroit Tigers and may be through for the year.

And Sadecki was optioned to Atlanta of the International League by the Cardinals after being told there was "no room" for him by St. Louis manager Johnny Keane.

Fined By Keane

Suspended and fined by Keane two months ago because of a poor performance, the 21-year-old Sadecki said, "I just can't figure this thing. Keane just said I don't fit into his plans. It's all kind of funny."

Sadecki, who received an estimated \$50,000 bonus when he signed with the Cardinals, has a 6-8 record with them this season but lost four of his last five decisions. In Sadecki's place, the Cards brought up pitcher Paul Toth, who won six and lost seven for Atlanta.

Mizell was obtained by the Mets from the Pittsburgh Pirates on May 6 and had an 0-1 record with Casey Stengel's club. He has a major league lifetime record of 90 victories and 87 defeats.

The Mets announced they were calling up infielder-outfielder Sammy Drake from Syracuse of the International League where he was batting .256.

Won Only Two

Lary won only two games for the Tigers this year and lost six. In placing him on the disabled list, the Tigers called up Howard Kopitz, a 24-year-old right-hander from Denver in the American Association. Kopitz had a 23-3 mark with Birmingham of the Southern Association last year and recently was released from the Army.

The San Francisco Giants brought up infielder — outfielder Carl Boles from El Paso of the Texas League and sent rookie Manuel Mota to the same club. Boles has a .323 batting average at El Paso while Mota's average with the Giants has slipped to .138.

The Giants also announced that third baseman Jim Davenport may undergo X-rays for a swollen ankle he suffered before Monday's All-Star game in Chicago.

Roseburg's All-Stars suffered from tournament jitters and bad breaks in their first game in the Oregon Babe Ruth Tournament now under way at Klamath Falls.

The local contingent fell 9-4 before the onslaught of the potent Cleveland team of Portland.

Roseburg got off to a bad start on the first play of the game when Doug Matson was injured sliding into the plate. Matson appeared to have been hit on the head by part of the catcher's protective gear, and was taken to a Klamath Falls hospital. The Roseburg player was reported to be okay, but was kept in the hospital overnight for observation.

In the bottom of the opening inning the local crew ran into trouble as Cleveland scored three runs, then went on to add five more in the second to take a commanding 8-1 lead.

Gordon Jones proved the big stick for the Roseburg team in the first game, going 2-4 at the plate. Bruce Wassom's two-run round-tripper in the fifth inning provided Roseburg with most of its scoring punch. Butch Watson collected the fourth Roseburg hit of the game.

Mike Gates tossed the win for Cleveland, allowing only four hits. However, coach Bob Colley reported that if it had not been for 3 Roseburg errors the game would have been a tight one.

Miss Century 21 Rockets Over Gold Cup Course With Fast Time

SEATTLE (UPI)—Bill Muncy Tuesday gave his fellow water jockeys a mark to shoot at when he rocketed Miss Century 21 over the Gold Cup race course here at an average speed of 114.328 miles an hour.

The speed was tops for the opening day of qualifying runs for the hydroplane racing classic which takes place on Seattle's Lake Washington next Sunday. Six boats out of a probable 17 entries made the grade in Tuesday's runs.

Muncy had to take the former Miss Thriftway out twice to rack up his top time and to pocket \$100 donated for the top speed of the day. The first time he had the C-21 on the course he registered an average of 111.111 mph, which at the time was only second best, but third to qualify.

However, the Gold Cup defending champion was not to be denied. An hour before the course closed at 5 p.m. he spun the C-21 out of the pits and wheeled her around in lap times of 114.165, 114.894 and 113.924 mph for the 114.326 average.

The second qualifier was Miss Seattle Too, driven by Dallas Sartz at an average of 112.188 mph. \$ Bill, with Rex Manchester at the controls, was the first qualifier at an average of 97.180 mph. And the crew of the Lompac, Calif., boat as well as her driver won a night out on the Dominion Monarch, a hotel ship berthed here for the Seattle World's Fair.

The fourth qualifier of the day was Gale VII of Detroit, entered by Lee Schoenith and driven by Bob Schroeder at an average of 94.737 mph. Schroeder tried to boost the speed of Gale VII on a second try but failed by more than a mile an hour.

Bob Miller, the airline pilot from Everett, Wash., was fifth to qualify as he put Miss B & I

through her paces at an average of 93.750 mph.

Then Wild Bill Cantrell of Detroit brought Schoenith's other entry, Gale V, out on the water for the second time of the day and made the grade with an average run of 112.344 mph, the second best for the day.

Don Wilson of Palm Springs, Fla., tried to get Miss U.S. into the qualified bracket before the course closed down for the day but the Coast Guard's red flares ruled him off the water. Miss U.S. had been out several times but the holder of the world's straight-away mile record for propeller-driven boats appeared to be having fuel injection trouble.

To qualify, a boat must go three laps around the three-mile course at an average speed of 90 miles or better. Only the fastest 12 boats, based on qualifying runs, will be allowed to race for the Gold Cup, the symbol of speed-boating supremacy throughout the world.

Duden Out In Front In Northwest Open

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Bob Duden, the veteran pro from Portland, turned in a two-under-par 70 Tuesday to grab a one-stroke lead at the halfway point of the Northwest Open Golf Tournament.

Duden will take a one-stroke lead into today's final 36 holes. His 70 Tuesday gave him a total of 137.

Jim Peterson of Vancouver, Wash., who led after the first day with a blazing 66 at Riverside Country Club, came in with a 72 for a 138 total.

Amateur Dick Barrett also shot his way into contention. The Vancouver, Wash. golfer fired a 67 for a total of 140, tying him with De Ross Kinkade, another amateur from Cottage Grove, Ore. Jake Wershekul, Seattle amateur, came in with a 73 for fifth place at 141.

The field was trimmed to the low 60 and ties after Tuesday's round.

Lockwood Motors of Roseburg will host the Murray Construction team of Bend in the first game of a best-of-three series Thursday night at 8 at Legion Field. Friday the Roseburg and Bend teams will resume the playoff battle at Bend at 8 p.m. The third game if needed will be played at Bend's Municipal Stadium at 8 p.m. Saturday.
