

Pee Wees Show Skills In Diamond Jamboree

The action was fast and furious Wednesday night when the first of three sessions of the Pee Wee Jamboree got underway at Legion Field.

Eight 12-13 year old teams, including an all-star team, participated in four 75 minute games. In the first encounter the Hucres Giants dumped the Fremont Pirates, 7-0. In the evening's second contest the Eastwood Cardinals outscored the High School Dodgers, 6-3. The Fullerton Braves clobbered the Green Cubs, 11-2, in the third contest and the Winchester Mets and the All-Stars battled to a 5-5 tie in the final.

Headed by Jerry Joelson's pitching and hitting, the Hucres club battled to the win over Fremont. Joelson allowed only two hits and no runs in the five innings, while helping his own cause with a triple.

The second game saw Eastwood taking the win behind Don Hobbs' pitching. In this game both Dave

Harris for the Dodgers and John Baur for the Cardinals collected two hits.

Although Green scored two runs in the third contest, it was unable to collect a hit off the slants of Fullerton's Gausnell.

In the final game a team composed of the best players from the six other teams squared off with the league champion Winchester club and battled to a 5-5 tie. Gordon Smith limited the All-Stars to five hits while his teammates got just two off three pitchers.

The Jamboree will resume action Monday, Aug. 6, when the 11-and-under teams will be in action at Legion Field. Starting time Monday is 6 p.m. Tuesday the 9-and-unders will take the spotlight in the final night of the annual Jamboree jointly sponsored by the Roseburg Kiwanis Club, the City of Roseburg and School District 4.

Contest To Choose Nation's Top Pro Athlete Sponsored By MEND

A voluntary health agency is sponsoring the nation's first popular vote to elect the outstanding professional athlete of the year.

The 1962 Champion of Champions Contest, which begins here on Wednesday, Aug. 1, will also give voters a chance to win donated prize offerings and help support medical research to find treatments and cures for crippling nerve and muscle disorders through their charitable contributions.

The combined sports election and contest is being sponsored by the MEND FUND of the National Foundation for Neuromuscular Diseases, with the support of its Honorary Committee of Champions and the Greyhound Corporation, through its more than 5,000 bus terminals and agencies where the balloting will be held for a six week period ending Sept. 15.

The honorary committee of famous athletes is headed by Kyle Rote, and includes such other all-time sports stars as Joe DiMaggio, Jack Dempsey and Mickey Mantle. As spokesman for the committee, Rote urged the public "to join in the fight to help mend America's muscles and end the crippling diseases which afflict an estimated 5,000,000 children and adults in the United States alone."

Voters will cast their ballots for the 1962 Champion of Champions from a slate of top professional athletes nominated by the Honorary Committee of the MEND FUND. The nominees, representing seven major sports categories, are Andy Bathgate, Jimmy Brown, Wilt Chamberlain, Bob Cousy, Pancho Gonzalez, Paul Hornung, Bobby Hull, Roger Maris, Willie Mays,

Arnold Palmer, and Floyd Patterson.

The 500 prize offerings include middleweight bicycles, ladies' wrist watches, transistor radios, camera outfits and Remson electric shavers. A special bonus prize consists of a Holiday for Two in Monaco, with round-trip transportation via Nice provided by Pan American Jet Clipper.

'Untouchable' Sets Redding Showing

The most spectacular drag race ever held in Redding, Calif., is billed for Sunday, Aug. 5.

"The Untouchable," an acceleration machine powered by the jet engine from a F-86 fighter plane, will highlight the action and provide the spectators with an awesome display of speed and power. Driver Glen Leasher will pilot the 10,000 horsepower machine down the drag strip at speeds of near 250 miles per hour. The car is 28 feet long, weighs 4,500 pounds and burns fuel at the rate of one gallon per second. Two high parachute, released by an electronic control system, brake the "engine on wheels" to a stop after the one-fourth mile acceleration run which takes less than seven seconds.

Sundays exhibition runs will be made at 1:00, 2:00 and 3:00 p.m., and will mark the final appearance of "The Untouchable" before its owners, Romeo Palamedes and Harry Burdick, take it to the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah for an assault on the world's land speed record.

In addition to the jet car, three other Bonneville-type cars will be in action at Redding, plus a full line of dragsters, roadsters, and other entries to head up the competition.

Track officials will open the gates at 8 a.m.

Nifty No-No Gives Boston 1-0 Victory

Who says the art of pitching is dead? This is the major leagues' greatest season for no-hit no-run games in 45 years.

As Casey Stengel would say, just look it up.

The latest no-hitter by Bill Monbouquette of the Boston Red Sox Wednesday night in Chicago was the fourth in the majors this season.

You have to go back to the deadball days of 1917 to find a year when as many as four different pitchers threw no-hitters. (There were six that year.)

Of course, there were four no-hitters in 1951, but two of them were pitched by Allie Reynolds, and another, by Bob Feller, actually was a no-hit, one-run game.

Missed Perfect Game
Monbouquette, 25-year-old right-hander from Medford, Mass., hurled his 1-0 masterpiece against the Chicago White Sox and missed a perfect game only because he walked Al Smith in the second inning.

Oddly, Monbouquette had been knocked out of the box in his four previous starts and had not pitched a complete game since June 29. He had been dropped from the American League All-Star staff because of his ineffective pitching during the past month.

It was a pressure-packed game. The Red Sox did not score for "Monbo" until the eighth inning when Lou Clinton singled with two out following hits by Jim Pagliaroni and Pete Runnels. Clinton also helped Monbouquette defensively by leaping against the wall to grab Charley Maxwell's bid for a hit in the second.

Early Wynn, bidding for his 298th victory, was the loser.

Standings Unchanged

The season's three earlier no-hitters were pitched by Bo Belinsky of the Angels, Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers and Earl Wilson, Monbouquette's Red Sox team mate.

While Monbouquette was making the big news of the day, the situation atop both league standings was status quo.

The New York Yankees swept a doubleheader from the Washington Senators, 6-4 and 5-2 in 11 innings, and the Los Angeles Angels remained six games behind them by beating the Cleveland Indians twice, 2-1 and 8-4 in 10 innings. The Detroit Tigers also swept the Kansas City Athletics, 6-3 and 9-1; and the Minnesota Twins beat the Baltimore Orioles, 3-1.

In the National League, the two top contenders both lost. The Pittsburgh Pirates walloped the Los Angeles Dodgers, 9-1; and the Chicago Cubs edged the San Francisco Giants, 3-2 in 10 innings. The Cincinnati Reds defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-1; the Milwaukee Braves shut out the Houston Colts, 3-0, and

the Philadelphia Phillies beat the New York Mets, 11-9.

John Blanchard's three-run homer in the 11th gave the Yankees their nightcap victory before 48,147 fans, largest crowd ever to watch a professional sports event in Washington. The hit broke up a 2-2 duel between Whitey Ford and Dave Stenhouse. The triumph was Ford's 11th.

In the opening game, the Senators made four errors in the third inning to sabotage starter Bennie Daniels and help the Yankees get off to a 6-1 lead. Rookie Jim Bouton pitched a seven-hitter for his fifth victory. Bud Zipfel hit a Washington homer.

Dean Chance pitched a five-hitter for the Angels' opening win over Cleveland, losing a shutout on John Romano's ninth-inning homer. Los Angeles scored four runs in the 10th inning of the nightcap, breaking a 4-4 tie when Ruben Gomez of the Indians balked home a run. Bob Botz was the winner in relief.

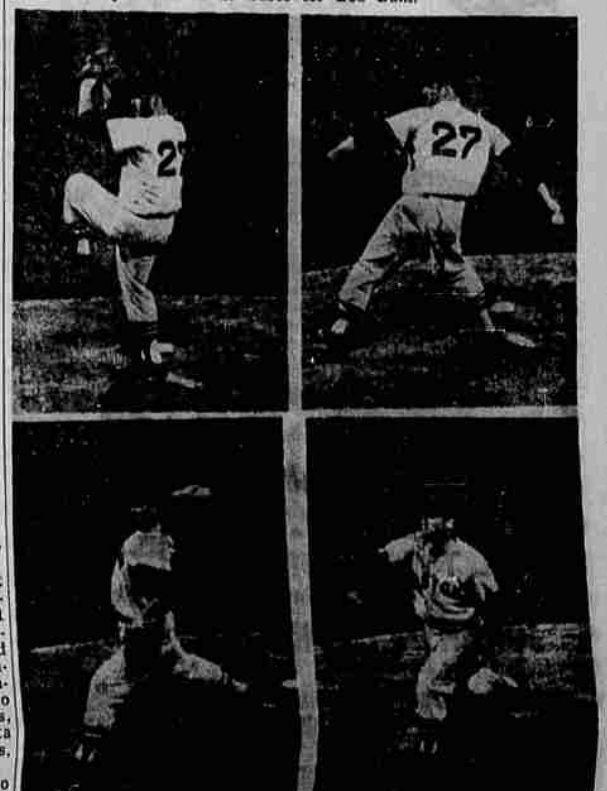
Detroit capitalized on 20 bases

on balls and four nightcap errors by Kansas City to sweep a twin bill. The Tigers rallied for three runs in the ninth to beat Granny Hamner in 10. Al Kaline hit a Detroit homer. Rookie Howie Koplitz pitched a seven-hitter to win the second game, yielding a homer to Norm Sibers.

Minnesota pitcher Jim Kast scattered nine hits and drove in the tie-breaking run in the 11th to beat Robin Roberts and the Orioles.

In the NL, Bob Friend pitched an eight-hitter for his 12th win as the Dodgers committed three errors. Bill Mazeroski hit a Pittsburgh homer and John Roseboro hit for the Dodgers' only run.

George Altman's two-run homer in the 10th inning and Don Cardwell's clutch relief pitching earned the Cubs their win over the Giants, who lost their fourth straight game. Billy O'Dell was the victim of Altman's blast. Cardwell retired the last two hitters in the 10th to save the win for Bob Buhl.
