# Hatfield Orders Shortage Probe At Withycomb

SALEM (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield today named a special three man board of inquiry to look into the disappearance of \$8,000 worth of surplus property at Camp Withycombe in Clackamas County.

The Clackamas County Grand Jury studied the matter but last week announced its inquiry had ended. No indictments were returned.

Hatfield said the case "is not closed."

"To probe more deeply into the matter I have impaneled a board of inquiry composed of distinguished citizens who are familiar with military procedures," he said.

The three, all retired Army officers, are Arthur Lowe, Corvallis, Willis E. Vincent, Salem and Harold A. Taylor, McMinnville.

"They shall have access to whatever records are deemed appropriate. Our citizens are entitled to know what happened," Hatfield said. "Responsibility must be affixed for this irregularity."

The governor said "stern disciplinary action must be taken with those who participated or knowingly turned their backs on any wrongdoing. New procedures have already been instituted to prevent a recurrence of this type."

On July 6, Oregon Adjutant General Paul L. Kilover suspended Lt. Col. James J. Anderson as post commander at Camp Withycombe. Kilover said following the grand jury's announcement that Anderson's status was the same.

The board of inquiry will report directly to the governor. Taylor now owns a hardware and implement firm, Vincent is active in civic affairs in Salem, and Lowe is business manager of the Corvallis Gazette-Times.

John Elvin Beck, 30, Sutherlin, pleaded innocent to lewd cohabitation in the court of District Judge Gerald R. Hayes. He will be held for trial, with bail set at \$500.

# Man Hospitalized After Auto Hits Parked Truck

The driver of an automobile which struck a parked truck, driving it into a third vehicle, was taken to a local hospital for treatment of a cut chin about 9:30 a.m. this morning.

Roseburg City Police investigated the accident, which occurred just north of Carter Tire Co. on SE Stephens St.

Richard Clark Davis, driving a car for Shell Oil Co., was the man injured. He had to have seven stitches to close a cut in his chin at Douglas Community Hospital.

He told officers his attention was momentarily distracted by a dog or cat, in front of him and he was too late to swerve out to avoid hitting a late-model truck owned by Carter Tire.

The truck was rammed forward into a city light pole, twisting the pole around until it will have to be replaced, said City Engineer Ken Meng. The car also was knocked into another parked car just ahead of it registered to Jacqueline Smith, wife of Bill Smith, an employe at Carter Tire.

Heavy damage was caused to all three vehicles.

# More Thalidomide Is Traced To Sixty-Seven Physicians

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Food and Drug Administration said today its pill-by-pill check on distribution of the child-deforming Thalidomide traced down 67 physicians who still had supplies of the drug.

It said all such supplies were immediately destroyed or impounded.

The FDA said it had contacted 1,673 of the 1,231 physicians who were given the drug to administer to patients under a test program. Diligent efforts were being made to interview each of the 158 doctors who still had not been contacted, it said. The latter were on vacation at the time of the survey.

The FDA said the report was a first summary of its survey. Additional results would be announced as soon as tabulations are complete.

One of the most conspicuous omissions from the first report was figures on the number of pregnant women who had received the drug under the test program.

Thalidomide, which has been blamed for causing deformities in newborn infants when taken by women during their pregnancy, was never sold commercially. But it was given to the doctors for experimental use to test its safety and effectiveness.

The FDA has been conducting a nation-wide search to see whether any of the drug was still available and whether any of the doctors had given it to pregnant women.

# Police Held At Bay By Jefferson Youth

JEFFERSON (UPI) — State police said a 15-year-old Jefferson boy chased his mother and two sisters from their home here early today, armed himself with a shotgun and rifle, and held state and local police at bay for about 20 minutes.

Officers said they climbed a trellis to an upstairs window and discovered the boy, Robert Franklin Hay, asleep on the floor with his hand on a loaded shotgun.

The boy's mother, Mrs. Gertrude Hay, told officers the youth came home shortly before midnight, after drinking beer. He began to squabble with his mother and sisters and fired a blast from a shotgun over her head as she fled the house.

Officers said he ordered the other two sisters from the house but directed that one sister's 18-month-old child remain behind.

The youth was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon and taken to Salem's juvenile detention facility.

# Saskatchewan Ratifies Agreement With Doctors

REGINA, Sask. (UPI) — Agreements that ended Saskatchewan's doctors' strike last month were ratified Thursday following the shortest session in the province's legislative history.

No dissenting votes were cast during three readings of the amendments at the one-day session.

Opposition members proposed six changes in the amendments during a stormy debate, but all were voted down.

The special session was promised as part of a government agreement with the province's College of Physicians and Surgeons that ended the 23-day doctors' strike. The amendments guarantee doctors the right to practice outside the medicare act and allow the continuation of private medical insurance agencies.

The amendments also provide for greater representation of doctors on the government's Medical Care insurance Commission which runs medicare.

# Missing Navy Plane Sighted

MANILA (UPI) — The Navy announced that the wreckage of a patrol plane missing with 13 persons aboard was sighted today on a mountain in the northern Philippines.

A Navy spokesman said there was no immediate word regarding possible survivors.

The plane, a P-5M, had been missing since Wednesday night when it failed to return from a routine patrol mission.

Two U.S. military search planes "positively identified the missing aircraft," the Navy said.

The wreckage was sighted at about the 2,000-foot level of the mountain in northern Luzon, northernmost point in the Philippines and about 80 miles north of Manila.

# Revised Lumber Shipment Bill Passes Senate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A completely revised bill to allow Pacific Northwest lumber producers to ship lumber to U.S. East Coast ports on foreign vessels under certain conditions was approved Thursday by the Senate Commerce Committee.

The bill by Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., chairman of the committee, was worked out in line with President Kennedy's six-point program to help the depressed lumber industry.

The legislation, as finally drawn by the committee, would provide lumber shippers a limited and temporary exemption from provisions of the Jones Act, which requires American flag vessels in the U.S. coastal trade.

The exemption would expire Jan. 31, 1964. Under it lumber shippers could use foreign flag vessels:

—When no domestic water carrier service is "reasonably available to the shipper."

—If the commerce secretary declares the domestic industry is being injured by foreign competition.

—When rates on a "substantially parallel" foreign route are at least 20 per cent lower than those on a domestic route.

Several Pacific Northwest lawmakers have introduced bills calling for exemption of lumber shipments from the Jones Act under certain conditions but the House Merchant Marine Committee has not yet acted on them.

The bills were offered in response to complaints by the lumber industry that Canadian producers could ship lumber from British Columbia to U.S. East Coast ports on foreign ships at rates much lower than paid by U.S. producers on American ships.

# Postmaster At Dillard Wins Remodeling Bid

Dillard Postmaster C. C. Fosback has been notified by the Post Office Department it has accepted his proposal to remodel an existing building at Dillard.

Fosback, the successful bidder, will remodel a one-story structure containing approximately 1,300 square feet of interior floor space.

Remodeled to government specifications, the post office building terms are under a five-year basic agreement.

# Roseburg Youth Admits Theft Of Pickup Tire

The theft of a tire and wheel from a pickup truck parked on SE Main St. July 28, has been cleared up, report Roseburg City Police.

Dennis Cliett, 1429 SE Reservoir, and a 17-year-old Roseburg youth have admitted the act.

Cliett pleaded guilty to petty larceny in the District Court of Gerald R. Hayes Thursday. He was sentenced to 60 days in the county jail and fined \$150 and \$5 costs.

The tire and wheel had been reported missing by Doris G. Plyer, 1102 SE Main St. Two boys picked up the same night for curfew violation were questioned. This later led to the information that one of them and Cliett were involved. The 17-year-old youth was turned over to juvenile authorities.

Both signed confessions and said they wanted the white walls off the tire. The tire and wheel were located in Cliett's car which broke down in Eugene.

# Army's Civil War Centennial Exhibit Will Be Popular County Fair Display

CAMERON STATION, Alexandria, Va. — A vivid presentation of the momentous events in American history from 1861 to 1865 will be unfolded for visitors to the Douglas County Fair with the arrival of the U.S. Army's official Civil War Centennial exhibit at the fair on Aug. 15.

This colorful and educational exhibit — produced by the Army's Chief of Information in collaboration with the Civil War Centennial Commission — will be on display through Aug. 19. Admission to the display is free and the public is encouraged to attend.

Electronic devices, push button controls, and the effective use of sound and light enable the viewer to grasp in a few minutes the vast scope of the Civil War and to understand its military significance as a milestone in the long history of Army progress.

One of the most popular features of the exhibit is an electrically animated diorama, permitting three-dimensional viewing of some of the war's major events. Cavalry charges, frontal assaults, and the plain hard fighting that characterized the war come to life too in a special film presentation.

The theme of this colorful and panoramic exhibit is the continuity of Army progress as exemplified by the military innovations introduced during the Civil War.

Among these were the advent of the big guns — forerunners of today's modern Army artillery — and the first large-scale application of medical techniques to the battlefield.

Enthusiastically Received This Army exhibit—one of three Army displays touring the nation in connection with the 100th anniversary of that great conflict—has been received enthusiastically everywhere.

Special praise has come from school officials and teachers who have found in the exhibit a medium for making history texts come to life.

The display has been awarded the National Civil War Centennial Commission's Silver Medallion, which was personally presented by one of the country's top Civil War authorities, Dr. Bruce Catton.

Accompanying the exhibit is a team of U.S. Army personnel to assist viewers interested in the military aspects of the Civil War.

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# Newspapers Report E. German Unrest

BERLIN (UPI) — West Berlin newspapers today reported growing unrest in East Germany as the first anniversary of the erection of the Communists' anti-fence wall neared.

The newspapers Der Abend and the Bild Zeitung said a "strike mood" was prevalent in many large factories and workers were protesting a serious food shortage.

The reports could not be confirmed. It was known in West Berlin that the Soviet zone now is suffering from one of its worst food shortages in years.

But Western officials said they had no reports of East German discontent and they had no reports of trouble was expected.

The Bild Zeitung said travelers from East Germany reported anti-Communist demonstrations in the Leuna factory in Merseburg and unrest in factories in Halle and Leipzig and the Zwickau Brown coal fields.

It said even old party members were speaking openly against Communist leader Walter Ulbricht.

Ulbricht flew to Russia two days ago on a trip that was feared to result in more Communist pressure on West Berlin.

# Overtaken Truck Kills Californian

ASHLAND (UPI) — Clarence Herbert Kopp, 33-year-old California truck line operator, was killed early Friday when a flatbed truck and trailer overturned in the Siskiyou Mts. about five miles south of here.

Kopp, operator of the Gem Freight Lines at San Leandro, Calif., was on his way to Medford.

State police said the truck left skid marks for 200 feet, went off the road and skidded another 250 feet through gravel along the shoulder before overturning.

# Assault Charge Lands Winston Youth In Jail

Robert Wesley Wormack, 19, Winston, has been arrested and lodged in the Douglas County jail for assault and battery, Winston police report.

Wormack was arrested at 1:40 p.m. Thursday on a warrant issued by Municipal Court Judge H. J. Kieve, for an alleged beating of John Black, 21, also of Winston, Wednesday night.

Black was taken to the Winston Clinic and was treated for an injured nose and four knocked-out teeth, said police. Bail was set on Wormack at \$200.

# Charles Laughton 'Holding His Own'

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Actor Charles Laughton, 63, who has built an international reputation for his screen interpretations, is struggling in private today with the most serious crisis of his career in Cedars of Lebanon Hospital.

Doctors said Laughton, operated on Tuesday for a collapsed vertebrae, was "holding his own" following a turn for the worse Thursday. His post-operation condition had gone from "satisfactory" to "poor" during the day.

British-born Laughton has been plagued by back trouble for years, and last June spent five days in New York's Memorial Hospital for cancer and allied diseases while receiving treatment for his back ailment.

Laughton came to Hollywood in 1932 to appear in "The Devil and the Deep Blue," and stayed on to create lasting marks in screen history.

Laughton and his comedienne wife, Elsa Lanchester, whom he married in 1929, became American citizens in 1950.
