Vets Administration Team Completes Roseburg Study

Future plans for treatment of patients in Veterans Administration hospitals will evolve from a study which included an inspection of the Roseburg VA facility this week.

Robert Kidder, hospital business manager, said a six-man team

from the VA central office in Washington, D.C., and a two-man team from the area office in San Francisco, Thursday completed a study of treatment of neuropsychiatric patients at the Roseburg hospital.

They began their study here Monday afternoon. Kidder said Roseburg is the third and last hospital to be studied by the teams. The other two hospitals are at Ft. Mead, S.D., and Topeka, Kan.

He said Roseburg was probably chosen for the study because it is the smallest of the neuropsychiatric hospitals operated by the VA. Kidder noted the teams were not inspecting the hospital's procedures in a rating type study. They were, however, trying to determine the need for improved medical care, he said. He noted this would come, for instance, in the field of geriatrics.

Members of the team from Washington, D.C., were: Dr. John J. Blasko, director of psychiatry, neurology and psychology services; Dr. A. J. Klippen, director of hospitals; Dr. R. H. Schmidt Jr., assistant director of medical services; R. N. Elwell, special in neuropsychiatric nursing service; J. B. Theobald, facilities requirements division; R. B. Wise, director of budget service department of medicine and surgery.

From the San Francisco office were: Dr. Ralph S. Meteny, new area medical director; and Dr. A. H. Perry, area chief of psychiatric service.

Belton Sees Merit In Acquiring Base

SALEM (UPI) — State Treasurer Howard C. Belton said late Thursday he sees merit in the idea of the state Land Board taking over the Tongue Point Naval Station at Astoria.

Belton is one of the board's three members. The others are Gov. Mark Hatfield, and Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. However, Belton said he would be "very much surprised if they gave it to us with no strings attached." The legislative interim committee on natural resources, which raised the possibility about acquisition of the Tongue Point site by the Land Board, said it might be possible for the state to get it free as an education property.

"That," Belton said, "is a legal question the board would want to resolve" with the federal government.

Belton said the possibilities probably will be discussed at the board's Aug. 14 meeting.

Testimony Shows Estes Had 'Man' In Ag Department

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., said today testimony shows Billie Sol Estes had "a man Friday" in the Department of Agriculture. But Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, cautioned against "premature" judgments in the case.

The two members of the Senate investigations subcommittee stated their views as the panel scheduled further testimony on Estes' cotton allotment transfers. No witnesses were announced.

Mundt's comments were occasioned by testimony Thursday about a memo, prepared about Jan. 24, 1962, which recommended that the department, in effect, approve Estes' disputed 1961 cotton allotment transfers and give him allotments for the 1962 crop year.

Joseph A. Moss, head of the department's cotton division, testified that he gave some "technical advice" for the memo although he disagreed with its recommendations.

He testified that it was written by Emery E. (Red) Jacobs, who resigned his post in the department under charges that he took expensive gifts from Estes.

Mundt called the testimony on the document "some of the most significant" heard in the long inquiry. He said, however, that he is not sure that its preparation was as described. He suggested that some "mystery man" in the department may have given orders for its drafting.

"It is evident," said Mundt, "that Billie Sol Estes had a man Friday in the Department of Agriculture who exercised a lot of authority."

Muskie questioned Moss closely Thursday about what happened after the memo was written. He stressed that the department a week later required a certification from Estes and certain other farmers that their allotment transfers were bona fide. He drew from Moss the statement that — as far as Moss knew — the proposals in the memo were made only by Jacobs.

Former President Abandons Plans For Tour Of Cologne

BONN (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower today abandoned plans to tour Cologne because he feared police were too few to handle the crowds.

Eisenhower's famous grin became only a tight smile when he left his hotel where an estimated 8,000 yelling, clapping Germans had gathered.

The former president lunched in Bonn with President Heinrich Lübke, a fellow "farmer." The two men had an hour-long private talk in Lübke's sitting room while their wives went upstairs to the Palais Hammerschmidt "flower room" to watch the boats go by on the crowded Rhine River at the foot of the presidential garden.

Brig. Gen. Robert L. Schulz, Eisenhower's aide, complained to railway station officials about Thursday's lack of crowd control. He asked police to put up barricades to keep the crowds and the press off the platform the Eisenhowers will use tonight to depart for Paris.

"All I want is dignity," Schulz told the station officials.

Gold Star Mother Of Year Charged As An Abortionist

RAPID CITY, S. D. (UPI) — This Black Hills city's Gold Star Mother of the Year has been charged with being an abortionist, climaxing a 12-year investigation.

Mrs. La Vange Michael, 67, selected Gold Star mother for 1962 two months ago, was arrested in a surprise raid on her home by city, county and state agents.

Sheriff Glenn Best said he began his investigation of Mrs. Michael and placed her home under surveillance 12 years ago when he was a deputy sheriff.

Mrs. Michael was freed under \$5,000 bond Thursday. Municipal Judge Jack Hunt continued her arraignment until Aug. 9 to allow her attorney, Roswell Bottum, brother of Sen. Joseph Bottum, R-S.D., time to study the case.

Isaac Chase, president of the city council, who presented Mrs. Michael with a spray of red roses in making the award of Gold Star Mother of the Year, came to her defense.

"She's not a common criminal," said Chase, chairman of the Veteran's Coordinating Committee. "She deserves the honor we gave her."

Chase said that if Mrs. Michael was guilty, it probably was because of "young girls coming to beg her to help."

Mrs. Michael, a 5-foot, 6-inch, 170-pound great grandmother with dyed red hair, was the mother of an airman killed in a crash in India in 1945. She has two surviving children, four stepchildren and one great grandchild. Her husband, Amos, died 31 years ago.

The raiding party, led by the Pennington County sheriff, went to Mrs. Michael's home on information supplied by a young Minneapolis, Minn., woman.

Best said three times before he had taken "death bed statements" from young South Dakota girls implicating Mrs. Michael in abortions, but the statements were repudiated when the victims recovered.
