

Roseburg Swimmers Ready For Emerald Empire Meet

Roseburg's swim team will be represented by a strong contingent of aquatic aces this weekend at the Emerald Empire swimming and diving championships in Springfield.

Roseburg placed fourth in the district meet last weekend with 185 1/2 points. Reedsport won the district championship, but is expected to meet Central Lane Y of Eugene in the conference championships. Central Lane wiped up in the other district meet held last weekend.

Brian Stults was the lone individual first place winner in the district action for the local team. Stults stroked home ahead of his opponents in the boys 9-10 breast stroke race.

The boys 13-14 200-yard freestyle relay team also picked up a first place for Roseburg. The quartet is made up of B. Pyle, Rob Williams, Chris Longfellow and Ron Frashour. Williams and Frashour provide Roseburg with strength in the boys 13-14 bracket. Williams finished second in the 100-yard freestyle and third in the 100-yard breast stroke. Frashour took a second in the district meet in the 50-yard butterfly race and finished third among the entrants in the individual medley.

Leading the girls into battle will be Pat Bonebrake, winner of third place in the girls 11-12 50-yard backstroke. Cathy McMullen, third place finisher in the 13-14 girls 50-yard butterfly, and Diane Yates, second place winner in the senior girls individual medley competition.

Bill Zimmerman, who recently turned 15, leads the Roseburg boys in the senior division. Zimmerman placed second in the district finals in the 100-yard breast stroke. Roseburg rates as one of the stronger entries in the diving competition. In the diving action will be John Weaver, Jeanne Forrest,

Frank Weaver, Miss McMullen, Charla Person, Ellen Epperly and Bill Weaver.

Swimmers from Central Lane Y of Eugene, Willamalane, River Road of Eugene, Sweet Home, Albany, Bend, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Medford, Reedsport, North Bend and Springfield will be on hand to compete against the local stars.

Packers Picked In All-Star Tilt With Collegians

State Team Impressive In Pre-Game Workouts

Coach Roy Thompson is busy molding what observers believe to be one of the strongest State teams in history of the Shriners' Hospital All-Star game.

Thompson, who coached the Roseburg Indians to the 1961 state A-1 championship, put his boys through a concentrated workout Thursday in preparation for the Aug. 11 game.

In Thursday's workout the Roseburg coach had Scott Eaton of Medford calling the signals for the offensive unit. Eaton was looking exceptionally sharp on both his hand-offs to the other backs and his passes to the ends.

Eaton's favorite target proved to be All-American end Ray Palm—who was also a prime target for Roseburg quarterback Paul Brothers throughout the 1961 season.

The beef of the backfield was provided by another Indian, Mike Flury. Packing the mail from his fullback spot, Flury displayed the powerful running that all but subdued Beaverton in last year's state championship battle which the Indians won 25-0.

For speed in the backfield Thompson was working with halfbacks John Ripper of North Bend and John Buller of McMinnville, while Klamath Falls' Dave Stippich alternated with the two speedsters.

Combining Flury and the fleet-footed halfbacks Thompson should have both the power for running the middle and the speed for sweeping the ends when his team tangles with the Metro All-Stars at Multnomah Stadium.

Defensive standouts in Thursday's session were linebackers Ken-

ny King of Roseburg and Don Causey of North Salem. Bob Roark, the fourth Indian suited up for the game, was showing well as offensive center and as a defensive end.

Gary Schmidt, Grants Pass, is the only player on the casualty list for the States. Schmidt is currently missing practice because of the flu.

The All-Star game will pit the State squad against the Metro 11, with kick-off time set for 8:30 p.m. (PDT) Aug. 11. To date each team has posted six wins and two games ended with the score deadlocked. The last victory for State was a 7-6 triumph in 1956, though last year's contest ended 19-19.

Proceeding the game will be a pageant at 7:30. All proceeds from the game go to the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children.

Howard Raps Base Blow To Give Dodgers 5-3 Victory Over Bucs

Rogers Hornsby ... Al Simmons ... Jimmy Fox ... Hank Greenberg ... and now add the name of Frank Howard.

Howard, the massive Los Angeles Dodgers outfielder, finally has learned the strike zone and is fulfilling his destiny as the most feared right-handed hitter in baseball.

If there are any skeptics, he has a .486 hitting streak for the past 10 games to prove he's on his way.

Howard broke up another ball game for the Dodgers Thursday night when he lined a bases-loaded seventh-inning single that drove home the deciding runs in a 5-3 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. The victory preserved the Dodgers' four-game National League lead, since the second-place San Francisco Giants edged the Chicago Cubs, 4-3.

Raised Batting Average
During his torrid 10-game streak, the six-foot-seven Howard has made 18 hits in 37 tries, including four doubles, a triple and five home runs. He has driven in 21 runs and raised his batting average 26 points to .320.

And that's just about what manager Walt Alston and the Dodger braintrust had expected of Howard once he overcame his perplexity about major league pitching.

The Dodgers fell behind 0-3 in the early innings when Smoky Burgess hit a pair of Pittsburgh homers off Johnny Podres. Tommy Davis put the Dodgers back into the game with a two-run homer off Vernon Law and the Pirates led 3-2 going into the seventh.

A single and a walk off reliever Joe Gibson brought in Roy Face, who promptly threw wildly to first on Jim Gilliam's bunt and the tying run came home. Face intentionally walked Willie Davis and induced Tommy Davis to hit into a double play by way of home plate.

Delivered Winning Single
With two out and first base open, strategy dictated a walk to Ron Fairly, bringing up Howard. Big Frank delivered his two-run single and Larry Sherry blanked the Pirates in the last two innings to wrap up Podres' eighth victory.

In other National League games, the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 5-1. The Houston Colts blanked the Milwaukee Braves, 3-0, and the Philadelphia Phils beat the New York Mets, 9-4.

The runnerup Los Angeles Angels moved to within 5 1/2 games of the idle New York Yankees by edging the Cleveland Indians, 5-4, in the American League. The Boston Red Sox defeated the Chicago White Sox, 7-4; the Minnesota Twins rallied to beat the Baltimore Orioles, 6-3, and the Kansas City Athletics nosed out the Detroit Tigers, 5-4.

Don Larsen came to the rescue of Billy Pierce in the ninth inning after homers by Billy Williams and Andre Rodgers had brought the Cubs to within one run of the Giants. Larsen struck out pinch-hitter Bob Will to end the game and save Pierce's ninth win. The triumph also was the 198th of Pierce's major league career.

The Giants scored what proved to be their winning run on Ernie Bowman's squeeze bunt in the eighth inning.

Broglie Threw Four-Hitter
Ernie Broglie of the Cards pitched a four-hitter to beat the Reds, losing a shutout when he wild-pitched home a run in the ninth. Bob Purkey, who lost his fourth game after 16 victories, threw wildly on a pickoff play to give the Cards their first run and wild-pitched home St. Louis' final tally in the seventh. An error by catcher John Edwards also set up two Cards runs in the third.

Dick Farroll of the Colts held Milwaukee to five hits and struck out 11 batters to gain his eighth win against 13 defeats. Bob Aspromonte singled home two runs in the first inning and Jim Campbell promptly singled home an-

other tally off Lew Burdette. Art Mahaffey of the Phils pitched a five-hitter and also hit a grand slam homer to beat the Mets. The win was Mahaffey's 15th. Frank Thomas and Marv Throneberry each hit two New York homers.

In the AL, Art Fowler of the Angels retired Chuck Essegian on a foul pop with the bases loaded in the ninth inning to save the win over Cleveland. A pair of passed balls by Cleveland catcher John Romano helped Los Angeles take a 5-2 lead before the Indians rallied to score twice in the ninth. Reliever Don Osinski was the winning pitcher. Bubba Phillips hit a Cleveland homer off starter Bo Belinsky.

Twins Beat Orioles
Vic Power's bases-loaded two-run single highlighted a four-run Minnesota rally that beat Baltimore. This was the Twins' only hit during the rally. A passed ball by Gus Triandos and two wild pitches by Hoyt Wilhelm set up the winning runs and made Frank Sullivan the winner. Zoilo Versalles of the Twins and Jerry Adair of Baltimore hit homers.

Norm Siebern's three-run homer in the sixth inning led the A's to victory over the Tigers, the win going to Ed Rakow. Al Kaline hit a Tiger homer.

Don Schwall scored his fifth victory for the Red Sox, although he needed relief from Dick Radatz in the sixth. Luis Aparicio and Al Smith hit Chicago homers.

Eaton Holds Tight To Hardtop Lead

Don Hein dominated the hardtop races last week, but he only managed to pick up one point on Jay Eaton in the official point standings.

Eaton jumped 33 points to a 255 total, while Hein came up from 202 to 236. The two Roseburg aces are still running well in front of third place driver Bud Dix, Cottage Grove. Dix has a total of 196 points.

John Barron, another Roseburg racer is in fourth with 179 points, followed by Reedsport's Don Wilson with 155 points.

The remainder of the pack will be out to temporarily halt the leaders Saturday when the hardtops and jalopies will be running at the Roseburg Speedway. Time Trials Saturday will start at 7:30 p.m., with the racing action to get under way at 8.
