Complaints

William Paul Fowler vs. Tracy and Stella J. Mask, Kenneth L. and Jane Doo Gray. Suit to collect \$2,876.49 alleged owing on property sold by plaintiff to the Masks and assigned by them to the Grays, or foreclosure against two lots in Kinney's Addition to Roseburg.

Charles T. Parker Construction Co. vs. John Hanley, dba H & P Logging Co. Plaintiff demands judgment against the defendant for \$446.88 alleged due for equipment purchased from Parker-Schram Co., which has been taken over by Parker with the death of Schram.

Elsie A. Perkins vs. Phyllis Candelaria. Plaintiff demands judgment for \$25,000 general damages and \$500 special damages for injuries allegedly suffered in an accident on Umpqua Street in Sutherlin March 28, 1962 at 5:15 p.m. across from the Sutherlin Post Office. Plaintiff states she was a passenger in a car, which was parked heading north along the easterly margin of Umpqua St., and that the defendant drove her car into and against the rear of the parked car.

Judgment

B. F. Goodrich Co. vs. H. Norman Berna and Helen Manchester. On stipulation of the parties for settlement of a "doubtful and disputed" claim, plaintiff granted judgment against the defendants for \$3,200, with prejudice and without costs to either party.

State of Oregon, by and through its state Highway Commission, vs. E. V. Weaver, and others. Decree entered granting defendants sum of \$50, as stipulated in an agreement, plus \$350 for attorney fees and costs. Property consists of .53 acres lying in the E. Maloney Donation Land Claim.

Appeal Filed

Leon Teller vs. Joe Heideck. Defendant appeals to the Supreme Court of Oregon from a judgment entered June 6, as defendant's motion for new trial was disposed by order entered July 6.

People Are Eating Less Food Now, But Pay More For It Than In '61

WASHINGTON (UPI)—People are eating a little less food per capita in 1962 than they did in 1961, but are paying more for it, according to the Agriculture Department.

In a review of the national food situation, the department said food consumption per capita for 1962 as a whole now is indicated to be fractionally below 1961.

During the first half of 1962, retail food prices increased slightly and in June were almost 1 per cent higher than a year earlier. Price increases were sharper than usual for fresh fruits and vegetables, and there were moderate increases in prices of cereal and some other food products. Higher prices for these foods were partly offset by seasonal declines in retail prices of some major livestock items.

The department said that although retail food prices may decline some from mid-year levels, they are expected to average about the same as during the last half of 1961.

The department said meat production in the last half of 1962 will be up slightly from the first half and may be about the same as a year earlier. Retail prices are expected to be average as high or a little higher than the last half of 1961—possibly a little lower for beef and higher for pork and lamb.

Retail prices of frying chickens probably will be higher during the remainder of the year, as supplies are declining seasonally and are well below a year ago.

Supplies of vegetables and deciduous fruits for fresh use, while seasonally large this summer, are about the same as last summer.

Canned and frozen citrus juices are in larger supply than a year earlier, and prices are expected to continue below 1961.

Because of the population increase and a change in the pattern of buying, consumer expenditures for food in the first half of 1962 were about 3.3 per cent higher than the first half of 1961. The department said the bill for marketing and processing food rose in response to rising incomes. Apparently, with higher incomes, people bought higher priced foods.

The farm value of food marketed changed very little with marketing and farm prices averaging about the same as a year earlier.

The department has set the final national average support price for 1962-crop rice at \$4.71 per

hundredweight, the same as the minimum price announced in January. This is 76 per cent of the Aug. 1 parity price of rice.

The 1961 rice crop also was supported at \$4.71 per hundredweight. The Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS) said the world rice production in 1961-62, excluding Communist areas, was nearly as large as the record harvest of 1960-61.

The current world crop, harvested from August through July, was estimated at 148.3 million metric tons of rough rice, compared with the record 149.5 million of 1960-61.

The 1961-62 world rice acreage of 212 million acres approximates that of 1960-61.

Republicans Might Be Content If Democrats Win 88th Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI)—On the record so far of the Democratic controlled 87th Congress, Republicans might be content if the Democrats won the 88th Congress to be elected in November.

A Republican presidential nominee in 1964 then might reasonably hope to duplicate the triumph of Harry S. Truman in 1948. Truman made the Republican controlled 80th Congress his principal 1948 campaign issue. He said the 80th was the worst, ever, a do-nothing Congress.

The Democrats had nominated HST reluctantly. They didn't expect him to win. The Truman-Alben Barkley ticket won and carried a Democratic Congress into office as well. Grateful Democrats promptly rewarded HST and Barkley at the taxpayers' expense. The President's salary was hiked from \$75,000 to \$100,000 annually and he was voted a \$50,000 annual tax-free expense account.

Congress voted also to raise congressional salaries and provided tax free expense accounts for the vice president and speaker. Congress appropriated \$2,500 to provide for Barkley a gold medal. These rewards were symbolic of Democratic surprise and delight at finding their party in control of government after a campaign they had entered with little hope and no confidence.

Badly Marked Record

The record of the first Kennedy Congress is badly marked. A smart campaigner could turn such a record against a Democratic presidential nominee in 1964. Republican congressional campaigners expect to harvest votes on that issue this year.

They combine hope with confidence that the voters will return a Republican majority to the House of Representatives in November.

If so, President Kennedy's 1964 re-election campaign will be underwritten by an effective alibi for whatever may afflict the Democrats in the new 88th Congress. The composition of the Senate is such that the Republicans cannot win control. Senate terms are staggered so that only one-third of the seats regularly are filled at any congressional election. A Republican controlled House in the 88th Congress, however, would blur the issue of responsibility for what Congress does or does not accomplish.

Program Largely Defeated
The record of the current 87th Congress is not blurred. Congress would look better if it were. This is the eighth month of this congressional session. Most of the Kennedy program has been defeated so far or stymied. The elderly gentlemen who chair the two appropriations committees wrangled for weeks on a question of protocol. Only now is the appropriations log-jam beginning to break up.

The Senate lost itself in a filibuster against the space communications bill. The filibuster was conducted by New Deal-Fair Deal-New Frontier statesmen who long have denounced the filibuster technique as an obscenity. The ease with which these liberals have risen above principle fits the pattern of this 87th Congress. The pattern is not one to increase the respect of the voters for the national legislature or for the legislators.

The Democrats are offering the Republicans a real chance to pick themselves up off the floor.

Fiscal Analyst Traces Welfare Caseloads To Family Dissolution

SALEM (UPI)—A fiscal analyst for the legislature is convinced mounting welfare caseloads in Oregon are "directly traceable" in most instances to dissolution

of families, and unemployment. Cleighton Penwell of Salem, analyst with the Legislative Fiscal committee, tied dissolution of families to heavy increases in the Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) program, and unemployment to another big category of welfare — General Assistance (GA).

In a report to the committee titled "The Cause of Public Dependence," Penwell described family dissolutions as divorce, separation, desertion, and cases of unwed mothers.

In the past 10 years, the number of Oregon welfare recipients has grown 26 per cent, to 32,423 cases in 1961. Penwell noted that in this period, ADC caseloads gained 130.8 per cent.

He suggested a number of guides in studying ways to reduce public dependency, including:

— Grants and services should not be set at levels that encourage long term dependence.

— No action should be taken which would put Oregon at a disadvantage with neighboring states in terms of attracting welfare recipients.

— No welfare grant should exceed the normal income level of any substantial segment of the gainfully employed.

Penwell said welfare laws are very liberal, and that the best method of cost control is to intensify analysis at the time appropriations are being made by the legislature.

Penwell also reported that: — The State Welfare Commission will spend only about \$1,073,853 of the \$3.3 million appropriated for the new state medicare program, turning \$2.2 million back. It was estimated that 55,000 persons over 65 were eligible. But Penwell said only 7,016 applications were received the first eight months of the program. And of those only 4,948 persons were found eligible.

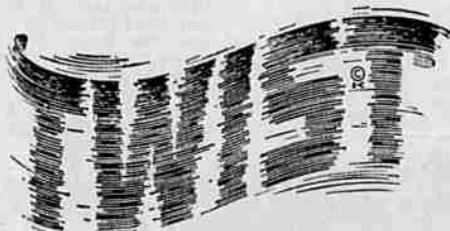

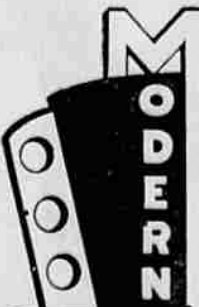
